Celebrated Saturday

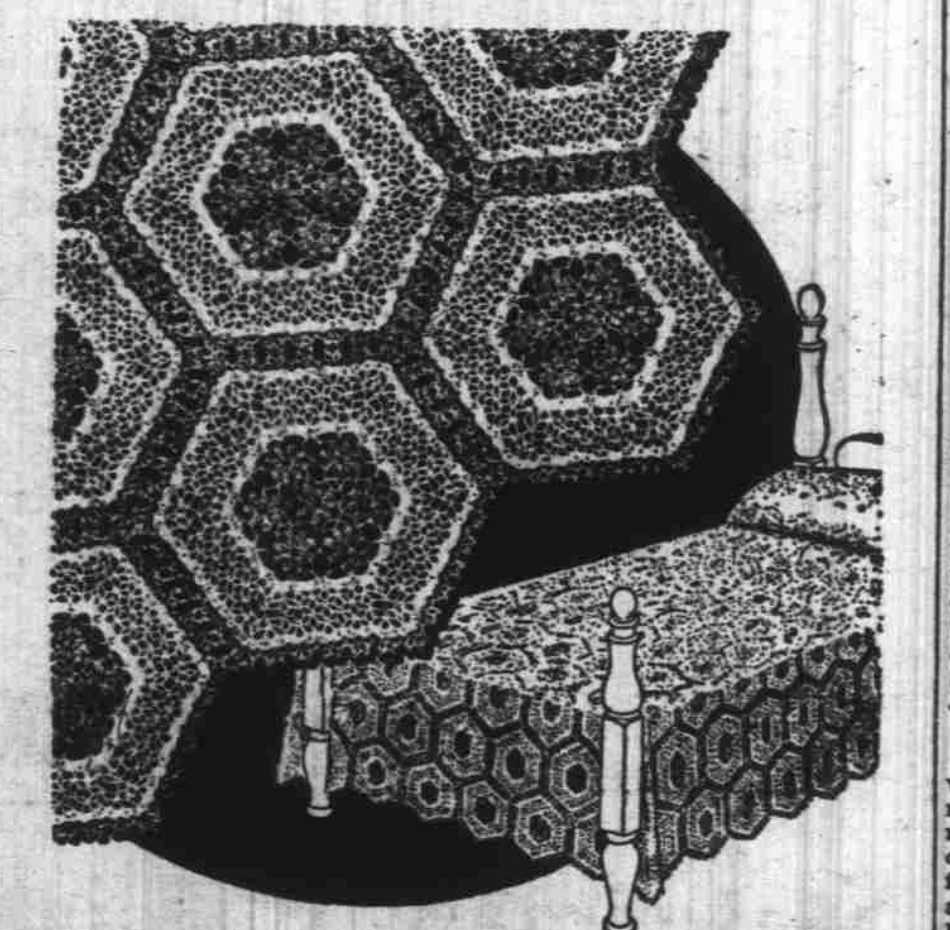

Too many men pay little or no attention to color details, with the result that no matter how expensive or how often renewed their clothes, they always look the same.

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Let Children Choose
Own Favorites in
Colored Things

MORE about the effects of color, this time the choice of color for children.

Most persons, unless they are color blind, develop strong likes and dislikes at a very early age, and to indulge this taste makes the sense more acute.

Just because the mother of a child has a liking for red or green, it's no sign that the youngster responds to the same shade. If your child has a normal color sense he is probably fond of one certain shade.

Try this experiment: lay some primary and secondary colored yarns or cloth on the floor, send the youngsters for one. His first choice is the one he'll pick up, keep this color and send him back for another. After a third is chosen, begin all over again and see if he consistently chooses them in the same order.

If the colors are quite clear, red, yellow, blue, green, purple and orange, he will probably choose his favorite every time. Some persons are blind to certain shades but are sensitive to others.

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Today's Menu

Round steak, though not the most popular in the world, has wonderful flavor when cooked a long while. Here's a menu built around this meat:

Jellied carrot-pineapple salad
Rolled beef, dressing
Fried egg plant

Apple tapioca with cream topping
With a saucer edge pour into the meat, brown on one side lightly. Cover that surface with regular bread stuffing and roll like a jelly roll, fastening with string. Cook until done in a 375 degree oven. Will take 2 hours or more.

The dessert suggested in the menu is regular apple tapioca and takes a topping made of whipped cream sprinkled generously with chopped nuts and cookie crumbs.
