## Linfield Leads In Conference

Willamette, Whitman Have Perfect Records; Three Games This Weekend

With three teams yet to lose a game and four yet to win one, the Northwest conference will get into the fourth week of its new round robin schedule this weekend.

Linfield, which has already played half of its quota of six games, has taken an early lead with two wins and one tie to its credit. The Wildcats, who meet the University of Portland Pilots at Portland Saturday in a non-conference game, are tied with Whitman and Willamette, each winner in one game.

Willamette, which defeated Albany 42 to 0 in its only conference game, will get down to the job of defending its title this week when the Bearcats meet the College of Idaho Coyotes at Caldwell Saturday. The Coyotes lost to Linfield 45 to 0.

Game at Oregon City  
Whitman, making a serious bid to re-establish itself as the king pin of the Northwest loop, will take on Pacific at Oregon City Friday night in its second game of the conference season. Coach Nig Borleske's big Missionaries defeated Albany college 33 to 0 playing "under wraps" while Pacific lost its only conference game to date to Linfield 21 to 6.

Albany college, this year under a new coach, Don Faber, has started out in its usual cellar location. The Pirates, after dropping games to Willamette and Whitman by big scores, journey to Tacoma this week to mix with Roy Sandberg's Puget Sound Loggers.

Puget Sound's only conference clash, with Linfield, resulted in a 7 to 7 tie and again last night the Loggers, along with Linfield and Whitman, are a serious threat to Willamette's two-year supremacy.

## Students to Hear Political Roundup

## Lincoln Building Fate Is at Issue

The Salem school board is expected tonight to make a final decision as to whether or not both the Park and the Lincoln grade school buildings, unused since the Bush school was opened, shall be razed. WPA approval has already been given a project for tearing the old structures down, clearing the sites and salvaging materials that may be of use elsewhere in the school system.

Tonight the board will open bids for the purchase of the Park building and any or all of the land on which it stands. Because of crowded conditions existing at McKinley school, there has been some suggestion that the Lincoln building might be left standing until it is certain that it will no longer be needed.

The directors will also face the problem of teachers' salaries, created last week when the instructors objected to receiving half-monthly pay. A majority of the board has indicated it may approve immediate payment of the other half-month salary the teachers claim is due under their contracts rather than delay it until next September.

## Gophers Near String Record

19th Straight Victory Is Taken But by Narrow Margin, Observed

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.-(P)—That ancient force which never has lost a decision—the law of averages—is stalking Minnesota's great gridiron victory string.

Today, still twitching after Saturday's close call against Nebraska, the Golden Gophers boasted a record of 19 consecutive triumphs—one one short of Notre Dame's modern record. But, before the close of the campaign, Minnesota, starting with Michigan Saturday, must must five big ten foes and the University of Texas, and the old law, which catches them all sooner or later, will be working for the opposition.

The Wolverines, who gave the Gophers their last beating in the final battle of the 1932 season, do not figure to stop Minnesota short of 20 victories. Nor do Iowa or Wisconsin. There is plenty of danger, however, in Purdue, Northwestern and Texas, and the law of averages may collaborate with any of them to halt the glorious march.

Barely Squeeze In  
The numbers came within 68 seconds of catching up with Minnesota Saturday. Although they had outplayed a fine Nebraska eleven most of the way, the Gophers appeared stuck with a scoreless tie. However, Bud Wilkinson tossed a beautifully timed lateral pass to Andy Uram who raced 75 yards to a touchdown, just in time to keep the winning streak intact.

Notre Dame found out about the law of averages not once, but twice. The fighting Irish of 1919 and 1920 won 18 straight and added two more in 1921 before Iowa put on the brakes with a thrilling 10 to 7 victory. Starting 10 years later, in 1929, Notre Dame, under the late Knute Rockne, won 19 games in a row, and made it 20 in 1931 under Hank Anderson.

That long string was snapped in the second game of 1931 in the rain and mud at Soldier field when Northwestern fought the Irish to a scoreless tie. Notre Dame prolonged its term without defeat to 26 games by adding five more before Southern California scored that dramatic, last-period 16 to 14 triumph at South Bend.

## Wills and Budge Doubles Champs

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 12.-(P)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody, one-time queen of tennis, and Don Budge, America's ace internationalist, won the Pacific coast mixed doubles championship today by taking a third set, 6-4 victory over Helen Hull Jacobs, Wimbledon titleholder, and Henry Culley of Santa Barbara.

## Temple Owls Win Over Boston 14-0

Two aerials that wiped out 45 yards enabled Gordon Smith to score from the four-yard line in the second period and late in the final quarter a 49-yard heave, Gus MacCall to Vic Lewis, another backfield replacement, put the ball in position for MacCall to drive over from Boston's three-yard line.

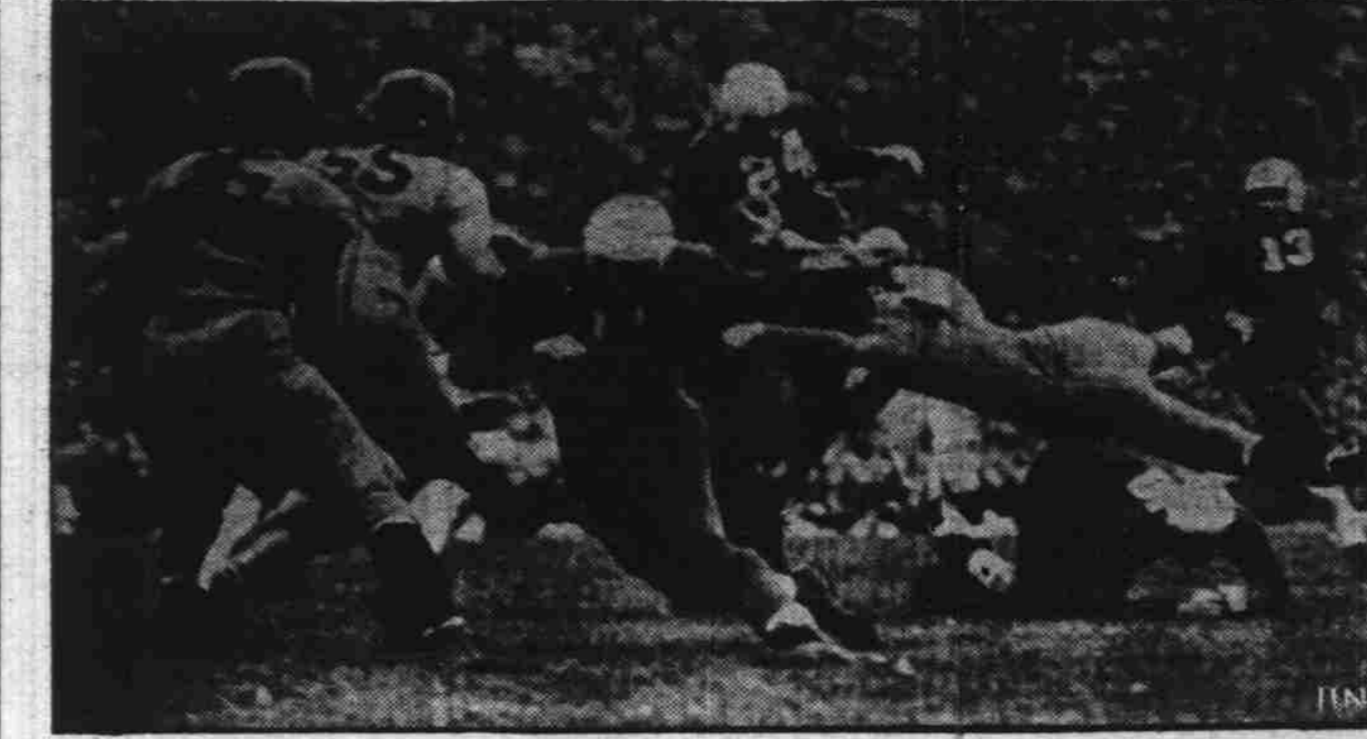

City Champ, Dark Horse Lose Sunday; Tourney Closes This Week

Millard Groves, recently graduated from the junior ranks but recognized as one of Salem's top notch golfers, having played in the championship flight of the state amateur tournament this year, and Jack Nash, consistent top-flight campaigner in local competition for several years past, will contest for the Salem Golf club's championship in the 36-hole finals of the annual tournament next Sunday.

They reached the finals Sunday when Groves, with his putter performing favorably, eliminated Bob Taylor, former club champion and present city champion, 4 and 3 to equalize a similar defeat Taylor handed him in the semi-finals of the city tournament last spring. Nash, playing equally consistent golf, defeated Dr. C. E. Bates, last of the "dark horse" contingent, 3 and 2.

Finals in the other flights will be played this week as follows: First—Flanery vs. Mapes. Second—Flaher vs. McDowell. Third—Dr. Higgins vs. Petre or Hunter.

Fourth—Baldock vs. Judge Belt. Fifth—Lloyd vs. Gabrielson or Porter.

Mapes was three under par on the second nine Sunday for an 18-hole medal of 71, one under par, as he defeated Thomson 4 and 3 to reach the first flight final.
