F. C. Dillard, Medford contractor, \$733,359 for the 7.03-mile section between Fairmount reservoir and the Turner hills. King Brothers, Portland, made a proposal for 1000 feet of special form steel pipe for creek crossings.

Bidding was termed "very satisfactory" by Engineer Koon.

Widespread industrial interest in the project was evidenced by the fact that the city water department received 42 requests for sets of plans and specifications.

The water construction committee may meet informally yet this week to discuss the bids but probably will not decide upon its recommendations until a few hours before Monday night's council meeting. Alderman Brazier, C. Small, spokesman, said, Engineer Koon did not expect to complete his analysis of the bids until the end of this week at the earliest and stated he might not be ready to make his recommendations until Monday.

Taking advantage of lowest unit prices among the eight bids probably will not make a great difference in the final contract amount since the bidders in most cases specified that they must receive virtually the entire job if the prices they submitted were to stand.

Wood Unit Prices Are Found Higher
Chances that wood pipe might appear in the final award were dimmed by the fact that preliminary study of the bids showed the unit prices on wood to be above those of the low steel-concrete proposal.

The earliest possible date by which the pipeline can be completed under last bid is approximately one year. A contractor's year contains 240 working days. Construction of concrete pipe could be started a few days after the contract award date but it would require 11 to 15 weeks to lay steel pipe on the working site, Engineer Koon estimated.

Almost without exception bidders submitted provisions exempting them from time limits in case of strikes, lockouts and riots. Since steel pipe would be shipped by ocean freighters from eastern mills, a waterfront strike would halt operations should a steel pipeline be decided upon.

Invention Parade To Start Tonight

Devices Originated Here in Films; 2 Showings Set, High School

Inventions of Salem residents, including the diesel converter on which manufacture has already started, will be seen in "Inventions on Parade," the first movies of northwest inventions to be shown at the Salem high school auditorium tonight in connection with motion pictures of Bonneville dam, talkies and colored film of the Pendleton Round-Up and a comedy. Two complete showings, at 7:30 and 9:30 o'clock, will be run.

The show is sponsored by the Salem high school Future Craftsmen and will run Thursday night also, with a complete change in program. John T. Anderson, who with the Salem chamber of commerce, sponsored the first inventors' show in Oregon in Salem about two years ago, is directing the shows tonight and tomorrow night.

The diesel manifold and carburetion unit now being manufactured by the Salem Diesel Converter Co., 1170 E. 4th ave., on a street, West Salem, and used successfully by a number of farmers in this area, came to the market following the inventors' show two years ago. Anderson expects a similar history from inventions to be shown this public and potential manufacturers tonight.

Four Collaborator
The diesel converter was originated by Ray Stumbo, Lee Cottew, C. A. Guderian, instructor at high school machine shop and Robert Wanch whose diesel heating experience assisted the others in their ideas of mechanical requirements for the converter. They started their work four years ago, spending two years in developing it to a practical unit for manufacture. The first ones were used on tractors 18 months ago, and after two full seasons of work have been declared entirely satisfactory.

Recently, Tom Wood of Salem, has been appointed to active management of the plant and is now working out production schedules, increasing capital and making plans for volume production. Either gasoline or diesel oil is used through the converter, with guaranteed savings of 20 per cent, Wood states.
The plant is now equipped to turn out 20 units a day. The converter can be designed for any gasoline engine. Wood cites one instance where the converter, used on a farm tractor, cut consumption from 70 gallons of gas to 48½ gallons of diesel oil, and costs from \$9.45 to \$3.85.

ers' association unofficially stated that many in the organization had expressed themselves willing to change back to the nine months basis at the expiration of present month's salary and if those who stayed were refused the pay, it would be in the form of a penalty for remaining.

He also stated that teachers who left the employ of the board in June were given a half month's salary and if those who stayed were refused the pay, it would be in the form of a penalty for remaining.

Additional business to come before the board meeting included the postponement of action on bids for disposing of the Park school. Only one was received for purchase of the building alone, the other being a bid for the strip of land on which the building stands, and then action on the whole piece of property included in the grounds. Action was postponed for two weeks while the committee considered the advisability of using available WPA funds to wreck the building. As the bids for the building were considered, members of the board suggested that there might be greater financial profit if the work was done under the supervision of the board, and materials were sold.

Three of seven counties which reported their registrations for the November election Tuesday have more democratic than republican voters. These are Deschutes, Harney and Klamath counties.

Harney and Deschutes counties joined the democratic ranks for the first time. Klamath county was in the democratic column in 1934.

Counties reporting more republican than democratic registrations Tuesday were Curry, Lincoln, Malheur, Tillamook, Washington and Wheeler. The republican registration in Wheeler county this year was nearly three times as great as that of the democrats.

Twenty five counties have reported their complete registrations while two counties sent in partial registrations. It probably will be late in the week before all of the registrations are received at the state department and tabulated.

Democrats lead in only eight of the 25 counties which have reported their complete registrations.

In these 25 counties the republicans reported 110,390 registrations as against 93,359 registrations for the democrats.

State Hospital's New Building Is Approved, Board

The new Oregon state hospital building, completed recently at a cost of \$190,000, was accepted Tuesday by the state board of control. Approximately \$90,000 was allocated by the federal government.

The structure will accommodate approximately 140 patients, but this will not adequately relieve crowded conditions at the institution.

An overflow of 210 patients are now being cared for. There were 2400 patients in the hospital Tuesday.

Drain Project Has Engineering Okeh

The D street storm sewer project here has been approved by the engineering division of the WPA at Washington, D. C., and probably will receive a final okeh and allotment of funds within a short time, Ivan Oakes, state director of operations, yesterday notified J. E. Smith, Salem district director.

Because this project will give at-home employment to a large number of men, the state WPA office rushed its approval as soon as it was submitted and sent along a special request for its prompt approval, Smith said.

The project will consist of building a solid concrete 42-inch diameter sewer from Church and D streets eastward to the city limits. Its cost is estimated at \$135,000 of which the city will bear \$30,000.

Halfway Mark in Y. Drive Reached

The halfway mark was passed Tuesday in the Y.M.C.A. enrollment week campaign, when 117 members were signed up for total contributions of \$2229 to make the total 491 members and \$3807.

The high division for the day was the Breakfast club group headed by Dr. C. A. Downs, with 23 members for a value of \$565, but Co. Carle Adams' team still holds the lead with 131 members and \$2170.

At the report luncheon at noon today special music will be furnished by Rev. and Mrs. M. R. Campbell. It was announced by A. E. Larimer, in charge of the campaign.

Jury List Choice Is Under Attack

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Charges of irregularities in selecting names for the 1937 circuit court jury list were made today by the Blackstone club, an organization of attorneys, at a conference with circuit judges.

Objections were made to the selection of the first 2000 names on the basis that persons named as laborers were eliminated and others because of their age or similar reasons.

Government leaders took advantage of the lull in fighting to strengthen physical defenses of the capital.

There were persistent rumors that government militiamen in a desperate counter-attack drove fascist columns back almost to the gates of Toledo.

Corporal Nichols was one of the soldiers chosen to form the provisional company or crack unit of the U. S. army which was at the San Diego fair, both the past year and in 1935.

He believes the San Diego exposition was better in 1935 than the past year, though he says the grounds were prettier in 1936. He reports that two other Salem boys, Johnny Graber and Don Jackson, were in the provisional company formed for the exposition. Here the soldiers served as escort for dignitaries visiting the grounds and also held retreat formations.

Million Exceeded On Job Insurance

Collections by the state unemployment compensation insurance commission passed the million dollar mark Tuesday, officials reported.

Morris Dunn, chairman of the commission, will leave Friday night for Madison, Wis., where he will confer with the unemployment compensation insurance commission of that state. The Wisconsin commission is now paying benefits under the act.

Payments in Oregon will not begin until the year 1938.

The commission yesterday received \$404.25 from the earnings of the federal unemployment trust fund for the third quarter of 1936, the federal treasury department today advised State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman.

The government report said a detailed statement of the earnings would be sent later.

Oregon collected approximately \$800,000 toward the trust fund under the state law, the commission reported.
