Ruby Koker Is Given Damages

\$403 Against One of Two Defendants; Youth Is Sentenced, Paroled

Damages of \$403 were awarded Ruby Koker against Woodrow Wilson by the jury which heard the \$6,498 damage action brought by her against Lillie and Woodrow Wilson. The jury, with Myrtle E. Hoss as foreman, found for the defendant Lillie Wilson. The case has been in circuit court here since Tuesday, and went to the jury about 2:30 o'clock yesterday. The jury made its findings in about three hours.

Milk Board Files Answer in Court

This section has had no material change in milk conditions since the milk control board entered the order under which operation is now conducted, the conducted, the control board says in answer filed yesterday in the suit brought against it by W. E. Savage and Bruce Fox.

The board points out that due to great amount of seasonal work here this Salem shed is subject to some fluctuation in the milk supply, with heavy surpluses at some periods of the year and little or no surplus at other times.

The control board sets out that its order established quota to producers to give each his fair share of the normal demand and protect him from seasonal changes. Surplus milk is sold for factory purposes, thus helping to maintain a fair distribution among the producers, of whom there are now 21 Grade A and 75 Grade B shippers in this milk shed.

Burgess Eligible For New Club on Law Enforcement

Patrolman Louis A. Burgess of the Salem police force is eligible to membership in a new coast to coast law enforcement organization whose formation has been announced from Washington, D. C., this week by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation. The organization will consist of police officers who have been graduated from the bureau-sponsored national police academy at the national capital.

Asked about the organization, Burgess said yesterday he had not yet heard about it but had received an invitation to attend the graduation of 34 officers from the third session of the academy last Saturday. Burgess was graduated from the second session, which lasted for three months in Washington, D. C., last winter. Saturday's graduates brought the academy's roster of alumni to 81.
