Tacoma Firm's Offer with
Concrete and Steel
Use Is Accepted

of the four men who spoke here tonight have opposed us on every move we have made." Concrete pipe specified for the Salem line "is no more sewer pipe," he added. "It is spun pipe, has smooth surface and joints. It is admittedly the best for low head and has longer life than steel."

Small referred the engineer's recommendation to the council. The engineer's findings were, briefly:

1. General characteristics of the proposed line "are the most favorable of any submitted" as to longest life, "greatest sustained carrying capacity except that of wood pipe," and low maintenance costs.

2. The Tacoma firm is "a concern with long experience in such work, a company amply financed to carry out its obligations and one which bears an excellent reputation for doing its work expeditiously and well."

3. Fabrication of the pipe will be done in Oregon, more than one third in a factory within or near Salem.

4. The recommended bid is the lowest except that of a combination of wood and steel pipe; comparison on a money basis shows the wood-steel proposal to be \$27,632 lower than that for concrete and steel, but the saving is sufficient only to pay interest and depreciation charges on the wood section for about two years whereas 26 years' longer life is claimed for concrete.

Koon Declines to Discuss Bidders
Engineer Koon declined to be drawn into an argument as to the qualifications of Crick, whose bid Goodenough, Williams and O'Hara spoke for.

"It doesn't seem to me necessary that we enter into such a controversy here before the council," Koon replied when Goodenough suggested he had taken "backhanded slaps at Crick" in his recommendation statements to the committee. "They are not the low bidders and therefore I don't see any reason to discuss them."

"Are you or your partner now connected with the American Concrete and Steel Pipe company?" queried Williams.

"No, sir," Koon answered.

Although Alderman Dancy questioned the wisdom of buying any concrete pipe, he voted for the concrete and steel combination because he said, he was interested in the water system betterment and "I don't like to be branded as being an obstructionist."

The pipeline which the council voted to buy will consist of 34,250 feet of concrete line extending from Stayton westward and 52,150 feet of steel line running from the western end of the concrete section to the new reservoir on Fairmount hill.

**Vandenberg Hits
Roosevelt Again**

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 19. (AP)—Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) attacking the Roosevelt administration, told a republican meeting tonight that the November election offered a three-fold challenge to the American voter.

The challenge, he said, was based on the administration's "repudiation of the checks and balances theory of government," its doctrine of "economic scarcity" in curbing business, and "its failure to restore public credit to a healthy state."

Senator Vandenberg's speech was not broadcast and he declined comment on the cutting of part of his speech off the air Saturday.

"I will have something to say about that in Wilmington, Del., tomorrow," he said.

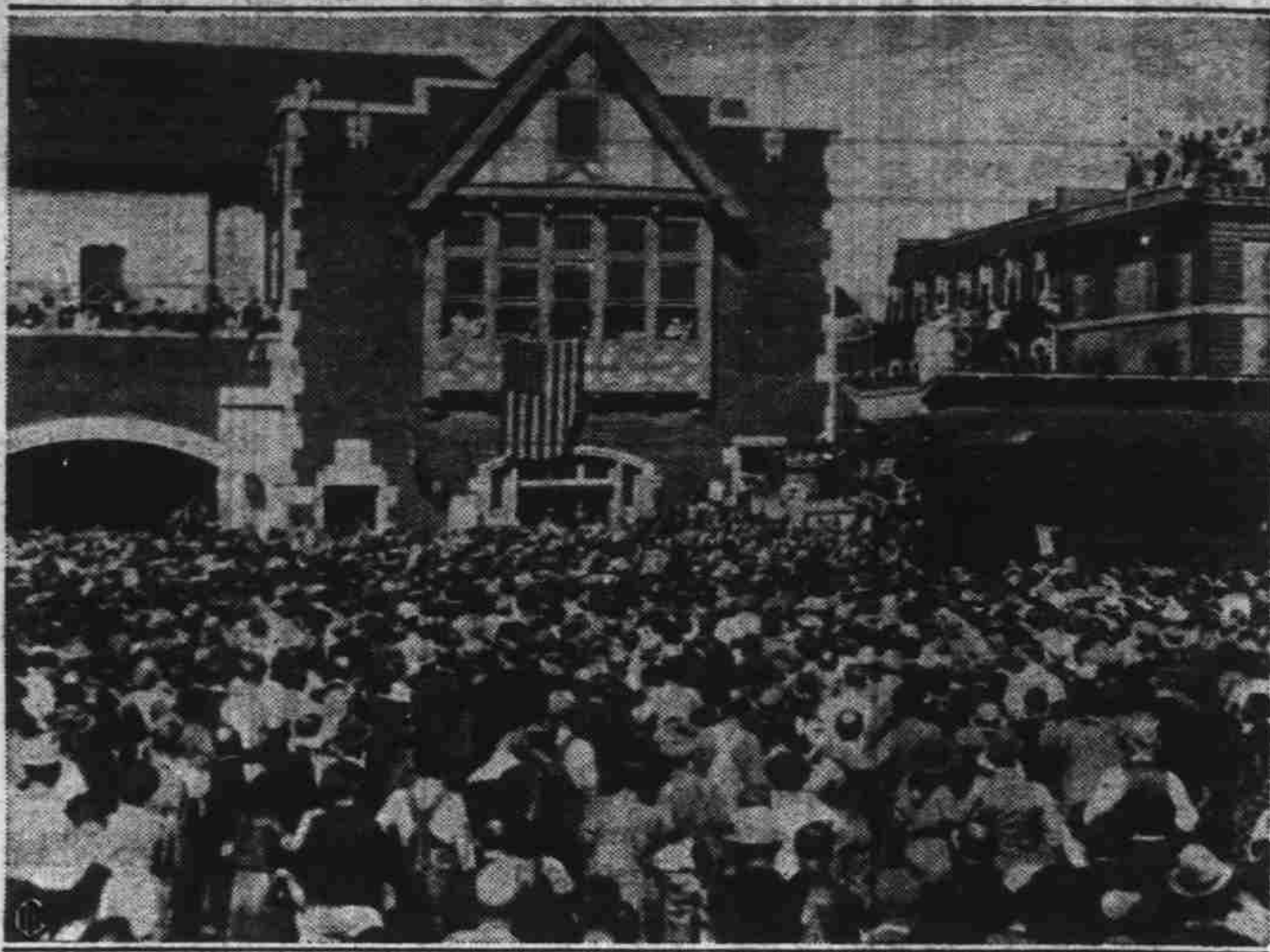

CLEVELAND, Oct. 19. (AP)—Canadian officials and representatives of the National Sand and Material, Limited, began today a preliminary investigation of the tragic foundering in Lake Erie of the sandcarrier, Sand Merchant, with the loss of 19 lives.

The Sand Merchant rolled over in a gale west of Cleveland Saturday night and sank. At dawn Sunday only seven members of the crew, including Capt. Graham Maclelland, remained clinging to the two upturned lifeboats from which they were rescued by other ships.

Eighteen members of the crew and Mrs. Bernard Dykwater, wife of the first mate, were lost. First Mate Dykwater was among the dead.

**Winter Fares to
South Announced**

Winter vacationists may go to Mexico City by train more cheaply than ever before at this season, as a result of new low roundtrip fares announced today by the Southern Pacific company.

Winter fares will be on virtually the same basis as the low summer rates and will be effective from October 16 through the entire winter. The reduced fares to Mexico are a part of Southern Pacific's general program of low winter fares to all points, in line with the rapidly growing popularity of winter vacations, the announcement stated.

**Port Debt Lower,
Reports Indicate**

Oregon port districts reduced their indebtedness \$616,223 during the past two years, State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman's biennial report will show, this despite the \$200,000 bonds issued by the port of the Dalles and the \$300,000 airport bonds of the port of Portland.

The ports of Astoria, Coquille river and Siuslaw reported no indebtedness the past four years, the indebtedness of the other 11 ports ranged from 24 per cent for the port of Nehalem to 17.33 for the port of Astoria. All ports reduced their indebtedness with the exception of the port of Bandon.

With the exception of the debt ratios of Astoria, Bay City and Coos Bay, all port ratios are less than 5 per cent of the assessed valuation, Holman reported.

The port of Port Orford, with a debt of \$54,100 made the best showing by reduction to \$41,750, while the same company, the port of Newport came next with a reduction from \$212,500 to \$168,000.

The total indebtedness of the port districts now stand at \$7,105,383.

**Import of Mexican
Cattle Is Decried**
Before an Albuquerque crowd estimated at 5000 by Police Chief Pat O'Grady, Landon said "livestock and sheep men of the southwest have specially good reasons to object to the policies of this administration."

"In the first nine months of this year," he said through loudspeakers on his rear platform, "more than 20,000 Mexican cattle have been imported into the southwest. These imports have deprived you of a broader domestic market and better prices."

"We republicans," Landon continued, "have no quarrel with the doctrine of reciprocity, which is republican in its origin, but in the language of our platform 'we condemn the secret negotiation of reciprocal trade treaties without public hearing or legislative approval.'"

Landon said his "primary duty" would be to restore foreign markets so that farmers, with unrestricted production, could have a "full crop at fair price."

Landon's statement on NRA referred to a statement by James Roosevelt, the president's son. He said that "as an individual" he saw "no alternative" but to ask for a constitutional amendment to make NRA purposes effective.

"The president," the republican candidate said, "must specifically deny that his son's views are his views. Otherwise the silence of the father will be the confession that the son spoke for the president when he gave us to understand that his father intended to perpetuate the NRA willy-nilly."

stop in a "series of tours" to strengthen the courage of his soldiers in the sections of Spain still supporting the Madrid regime.

**Barcelona Always
Loyalist Stronghold**
Barcelona, which, after Madrid, is Spain's largest city, has been a government stronghold since the outbreak of the civil war more than three months ago. Since the early days of the strife fascists have made little progress in the fighting in that region.

The government militiamen retreating on the southern front halted at Torrejon de Arzobispo, only 16 miles from Madrid, after having been pushed backward by a motorized fascist column rolling up from Illescas.

Somewhat to the west the advance guard of another fascist column reached Al Alamo, four miles from Naval Carnero, where Madrid forces are reported to be planning a major stand.

With the fascist garrison at Oviedo in the northwest, rescued by a body of insurgents who drove out the government troops following a long siege of the fascists in the city, the insurgents trucked food supplies in to their hungry fellows.

The defenders of Madrid organized an "army" of 3,000 taxicabs to be used, if necessary, in augmenting the regular methods of food transportation by lorries and double tiered buses.

All available men, and even boys, who could operate rifles were mobilized.

Hamlet Silent on Maritime Parleys

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19. (AP)—Daylong conferences were held here today between Rear Admiral Harry G. Hamlet of the U. S. maritime commission and ship owners and maritime workers in an attempt to reach a basis of understanding in the Pacific coast waterfront dispute
