If the crop does not come up to expectations in the spring, it will be plowed under for a green cover crop, and sowed to a spring crop.

wire entanglements, hastily thrown up, and in deep trenches.

The aerial bombardment of Navacarnero began at dawn backed by heavy artillery.

The government militia fled the air and land bombardments as 16 fascist caterpillar tanks, eight in each flank, advanced slowly toward their trenches.

The tanks rolled over ditches and broke through barbed wire while fascist squads swept the Madrid militiamen with never-ceasing machinegun fire.

The retreat from Navacarnero left the fascists in command of the two key towns on the two main highways into Madrid from the south—the Talavera de la Reina, Maqueda-Madrid road and the Toledo-Madrid highway. Illescas was the second key town.

Ickes Avers F. R. Has Saved Nation

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes asserted tonight President Roosevelt "has saved America and the people know it."

Containing "recovery is here," he devoted a major portion of an address at a democratic gathering at Northwestern university to criticism of the editorial policies of Chicago newspapers supporting the republican cause.

Ickes addressed a crowd which filled most of the 4,000 seats in the gymnasium. He shared the program with U. S. Senator James Hamilton Lewis, Gov. Henry Horner of Illinois and others.

He referred to former President Hoover as "the world champion boondoggler," termed Gov. Alf M. Landon, republican presidential nominee, "a somewhat blurred carbon copy of Herbert Hoover," called Col. Frank Knox, republican vice-presidential candidate and publisher of the Chicago Daily News, "the Paul Revere of doom," and described Col. Knox and Col. Robert McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune, as "disciples of despair."

Police lines had been attached to the pole to keep the crowd in check as the presidential party passed. Several thousand surged forward on the ropes.

"If you want the answer to this talk about high taxes under this administration—there it is. Taxes are higher for those who can afford to pay high taxes. They are lower for those who can afford to pay less."

A few minutes before, he asserted: "Here is my principle: Taxes shall be levied according to ability to pay. That is the only American principle."

He described the principle of the undistributed profits tax of 1936 as "sound" but said that "if in its application, imperfections are discovered, they must be corrected for the good of American business."

Union of Fascist Youth Is Planned

BERLIN, Oct. 21.—(AP)—A new move towards welding Italo-German youth into a bulwark of European resistance against Bolshevism was announced tonight by Baldur von Schirach, reiche's leader for youth, in the presence of Count Alenazzo Ciano, Italian foreign minister, and 20,000 Hitler youths.

An institute for Italo-German youth leadership will be founded in Rome and Berlin, he declared, at a gigantic rally in the sports palace for the exchange of youth leaders between the two countries.

The idea of the exchange, he said, will be to familiarize young people in each country with cultural, economic and political conditions and achievements of the other, as well as further cementing friendly relations between the two.
