No Compensation For Illness, Held

Compensation for occupational disease may not be allowed under the Oregon workmen's compensation act, the state supreme court held in an opinion Friday. The opinion was written by Justice Rossmann and affirmed Judge Walter L. Toose of Multnomah county in a suit brought by Mary C. Ryan against the state industrial accident commission. The lower court held for the defendant.

The plaintiff alleged that while employed by Libby, McNeill and Libby, during the period 1929 to 1934, she suffered injuries which caused her to undergo medical treatment and later resign her position. She attributed her condition to poisoning from fruits.

The court held that she was suffering from an occupational disease which is not covered under the workmen's compensation law. "If the woman is to receive relief as a result of her condition she must obtain authority from the legislature and not from this court," the opinion read.

Assessed Values Ratio Here Lower

Two Oregon counties, Benton and Clackamas, show an increase in the ratio of assessed valuation to true cash value of property, for tax levying purposes, the state tax commission reported Friday. Marion county's ratio was lowered from 51 to 49 per cent.

The ratios range from 45 per cent in Polk county to 73 per cent in Jefferson county.

Counties where the ratios were lowered include Marion, Morrow, Umatilla, Wheeler, Lincoln, Malheur and Wallawa.

Vincent School's Health Is Good

An exceptionally low percentage of pupils at St. Vincent de Paul school here were found to show a positive reaction to tuberculin tests when the tests, administered Wednesday, were "read" yesterday, Dr. E. E. Berg, acting county health officer, reported. He said that out of 64 pupils given the skin test, only three gave the positive reaction. These three will be examined with a fluoroscope to ascertain whether or not they actually have tuberculosis.

The Commonwealth survey of the county health service in 1934 showed an average of 10 per cent of school pupils reacting positively to the tuberculin test, Dr. Berg pointed out. The average at the parochial school yesterday was 4.7 per cent.

Forest Purchase To Be Completed

Steps necessary to complete purchase by the federal government of 6595 acres of land in the vicinity of Mary's peak in Benton county, under the national forest reservation commission program, will be taken without delay, President Roosevelt assured Governor Martin on Friday. The purchase was approved a month ago.

President Roosevelt said it was his hope that this acreage would soon be under systematic sustained yield management as part of the Sielaw national forest.

Purchase of lands of the Ochoco Timber company is impossible at the present time because of insufficient funds, the president said.

President Roosevelt declared that while his interest in the forest land purchase was undiminished he had found it impractical to make additional financial allotments for forest land acquisitions at this time.
