Further Negotiations
The maritime commission telegraphed that it "desired, expected and urges owners and unions to negotiate and agree so that maritime operations continue without interruption" pending a commission investigation of the entire controversy.

This message answered a telegram from Harry Lundberg, sailors union representative, asking whether any instructions, agreements or understandings between the commission and the shipowners prevented a resumption of voluntary negotiations.

Lundberg had asserted the employers declined to attempt renewal of negotiations on the ground the maritime commission's request for an extension of old agreements had prevented them from considering the changes.

The commission pointed out that it had asked both sides yesterday to continue operating under "latest" agreements and said this might include any agreements mutually satisfactory.

Shipowners replied that they were willing to "carry out the proposal of your commission that operations continue under the latest agreements," but said they could not accept the last demands of the unions.

The demands called for union preference in waterfront hiring, cash instead of time off for seagoing men, an 8-hour day for ship's officers, cooks and stewards, and assurance that these conditions would be retroactive.

The shipowners notified the commission that the union proposal "could not be accepted."

Announcing the strike vote, union officials said the longshoremen favored it 2900 to 200; the cooks and stewards 595 to 5; the sailors 1875 to 136; firemen 1333 to 68, and the engineers a ratio of 6 to 1. Members of the seventh major union, the radio men, were being polled at sea by wireless.

The strike vote authorizes the calling a coastwide walkout at midnight tomorrow. Union spokesmen said the strike would be called without fail unless the shipowners yielded. The unions have a membership of 37,000 and claim the support of eastern unions.

Navigation Dams To Be Discussed

THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 27. — (AP) — A project for a series of dams on the Columbia river between Bonneville and the Snake river will be considered by army engineers at a conference here December 15.

The session was called at the request of citizens interested in presenting evidence on proposed improvements along the river. Col. Thomas M. Robins, division army engineer, said development should be centered along the entire stretch of water rather than at a dam near The Dalles.

A committee of local residents has been named to study the full scope of upper Columbia development, leaving army engineers to select the sites of the proposed dams.

21,000 at Labor Political Rally

NEW YORK, Oct. 27. — (AP) — John L. Lewis, president of the United States Mine Workers, coupled a denunciation of Governor Alfred M. Landon at an American labor party rally today with the challenge:

"This meeting demonstrates that labor is organizing politically. It is time for labor to organize. There is danger ahead."

An audience that jammed Madison Square Garden to its 21,000 capacity was augmented by outside crowds estimated by police at more than 8,000 who heard Lewis, Senator Robert Wagner, Governor Herbert H. Lehman and other labor and political leaders through amplifiers.

The American labor party is supporting President Roosevelt and it will seek to build a national labor party in 1940.

Alberta Province Seeks Huge Loan

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 7. — (AP) — Alberta has applied to the bank of Canada for a loan of \$5,000,000, it was announced tonight by Provincial Treasurer Cockcroft.

The money would be used to save default on a bond issue of \$1,250,000 due November 1 and redeem an issue of \$3,200,000 which was defaulted last April but on which interest payments were maintained. The provincial sinking fund contains enough money or bonds bought back by the province to redeem the two issues with an extra \$3,500,000.

The provincial government was turned down yesterday by the federal government when it sought a loan of \$834,000 to cover the November 1 issue. Finance Minister Dunning taking the stand the dominion government had no legislative power to loan money to provinces for other than relief purposes.

Robbed by Men He Paid for Passage

ROSEBURG, Oct. 27. — (AP) — George Remar, traveling to California from Montana, reported to the sheriff office today he had been slugged and robbed near Canyonville.

House; but campaign addresses have been scheduled for Wilkes-Barre and Harrisburg, Pa., Camden, N. J., and Wilmington, Del., Thursday.

Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, first NRA administrator, called on the president today, but Mr. Roosevelt denied there had been any discussion of a new NRA.

Reminded that his son James had been quoted as saying he planned a renewal of the old "Blue Eagle" agency, Mr. Roosevelt reported with a grin James also had been quoted as saying no revival was planned.

(The president's son was quoted by the Worcester (Mass.) Telegram as saying the chief executive planned to seek a constitutional amendment to continue the principles of NRA. Young Roosevelt later gave out what he said was a transcript of the speech which quoted him as saying he, as an individual, saw no alternative but a constitutional amendment if there was no other way to accomplish the purposes of NRA.)

Reference to Past Speeches Unclear
With reference to his suggestion that his speeches be examined, the chief executive said it would be unnecessary to go back more than a month or a month and a half. But those who have been following his addresses closely could recall few direct statements on the subject.

They recalled that in an address September 10 in Chicago, N. C. speech described by the White House as non-political—the president said most thinking people "believe that the national recovery act, during its short term of life, accomplished as much for the restoration of prosperity through the establishment of the minimum wage, the shortening of hours and the elimination of child labor, as any law put on the statute books of the federal government in the past century."

Browder Trouble Reaches Buffalo

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 27. — (AP) — Norman Thomas, socialist candidate for president, appealed to President Roosevelt and Governor Lehman tonight to "vindicate the right of discussion" in the present political campaign.

Thomas' appeal was prompted by the communist party's complaint today that doors of Buffalo auditoriums had been barred to Earl Browder, communist candidate for president. Browder's recent attempts to speak in Terre Haute, Ind., and Tampa, Fla., were blocked after disturbances.

Browder has been scheduled to speak in Buffalo Thursday.

Today communist party officials here said the use of the Eagles hall had been denied them and other halls had been barred to their candidate. Tonight, however, it was announced that arrangements had been finally made for Browder to speak in a hall now used by table tennis players.

22 Write Exams For Firemen Job

One of the largest classes in the history of civil service in Salem yesterday took examinations at the city hall to qualify for positions on the fire department employment list. Twenty-two young men wrote the quizzes prepared by Chief Examiner A. Warren Jones on geography of the city, spelling and simple mathematics of the minimum wage, the shortening of hours and the elimination of child labor, as any law put on the statute books of the federal government in the past century.

Successful applicants will be eligible to fill fire department personnel vacancies in the order of the grades they receive in the tests. As beginners they will receive \$112.50 per month when they are called for regular duty.

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fire at every anti-aircraft battery their pilots could pick out. The city's defenders blazed away at the planes without effect, although government planes did not take the air to fight off the invaders.

Some of the planes' fire ricocheted through the city's streets but no casualties were reported. Finally the aviators, their daily tour of terror finished, wheeled their heavy ships and soared away back to their own lines.

Leaders of the capital's defenders, claiming they had 250,000 soldiers and civilians in the field, said they expected a decisive battle within a "few days."

Human Avalanche Ready for Sortie

A human avalanche, they told the populace, was ready to be loosed against the fascists as soon as the big push was begun.

American newspapermen, captured by fascists on the battlefield, told their compatriots in Talavera de la Reina today that: "It is quite possible the militia will run from Madrid when it is attacked. Madrid can be taken in two days. There are many trenches around Madrid, but they are nothing more than shallow ditches such as the militia deserted at Navalcarnero as soon as the Moors got within rifle range."

The American embassy in Madrid issued a note advising Americans still in the capital the building would be reopened if the situation should become more serious.

Roosevelt Heads Menace, Declares Demo Ex-Senator

CHICAGO, Oct. 27. — (AP) — Former Sen. James A. Reed of Missouri told a republican rally here tonight President Roosevelt was "the head and front" of a "real menace in the United States." The Missourian said he appeared on the same platform with republican speakers because "there isn't any democratic party in the field."

"I have other reasons," Reed added. "One is that there is a new deal ticket in the field."

Elderly Woman Killed Although Driver Takes To Duck to Avoid Her

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 27. — (AP) — Mrs. Bertha Palmer, 70, of Portland was struck and killed by an automobile on the Pacific highway ten miles north of here. Gilbert G. Keppeler of Los Angeles, who drove his car into the ditch in an unsuccessful attempt to avoid hitting the woman, was not held.
