

Landon Issues His Challenge

Insists Upon Statement of Roosevelt Stand on Constitution

In forty-eight hours, the American people will know the measure of your confidence and your duty and your faith in their wisdom.

In his address, the nominee reviewed his position as outlined in previous speeches, taking agriculture, industry, unemployment, social security, spending and the constitution in turn. After each summary he asked where Mr. Roosevelt stood and then gave his own reply.

The answer is: No one can be sure.

Political Creed of Candidate is Given

Landon listed these "basic principles of my political creed":

"I believe in our constitutional form of government—a government established by the people, responsible to the people, and alterable only in accordance with the will of the people.

"I believe in our indivisible union of indestructible states.

"I believe in the American system of free enterprise, regulated by law.

"I believe in the liberty of the individual as guaranteed by the constitution.

"I believe in the rights of the minority as protected by the constitution.

"I believe in the liberties secured by the bill of rights and in their maintenance as the best protection against bigotry and intolerance, whether of race, color or creed.

"I believe in an independent supreme court and judiciary, secure from executive or legislative invasion.

"I believe that in the future, as in the past, the hopes of our people can be realized by following the American way of life under the American constitution.

"I believe in the principles of civic righteousness exemplified by Theodore Roosevelt and I pledge myself to go forward along the trail he blazed."

"Tell us where you stand, Mr. President."

Townsend Aide to Defend Roosevelt

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Sheridan Downey, attorney for Dr. F. E. Townsend in the congressional pension plan investigation, announced today he would urge Townsend's vote for President Roosevelt in the forthcoming election.

Dr. Townsend has denounced Roosevelt and urged his followers to vote for Governor Alf Landon, republican presidential nominee, in the states where the name of William Lemke, union party candidate, does not appear on the ballot. Townsend previously named Lemke as his first choice.

Downey stated he would address Townsendites by radio tomorrow night from San Francisco (NBC blue network, western hookup, 8:15-8:30 p. m. P.S.T.) under the auspices of the democratic national committee.

Man Decapitated, Princeton Wreck

PRINCETON JUNCTION, N. J., Oct. 29.—(AP)—One man was decapitated and at least six others injured tonight when the Cleveland, crack Pennsylvania railroad flyer, was wrecked here, blocking the railroad's four-track main line.

Ten of the 13 cars, mostly sleeping cars, left the track. The train broke between the 7th and 8th cars and the engine, traveling at 75 miles an hour, dragged the forward seven cars almost a mile.

The man killed was riding in the 7th car which was dragged on its side and crushed.

The wreck was blamed on a wheel dropping off a car in the middle of the train.

Princeton and state police sought to establish the identity of the man killed.

Kitsap Gets New Murder Mystery

BREMERTON, Wash., Oct. 29.—(AP)—A large portion of a scalp found 10 feet up in a slender tree 15 feet from the mutilated torso of a man added mystery tonight to what authorities said appeared to be another gruesome Kitsap county murder.

Prosecutor Maurice D. Bresnan said he did not believe the death was the result of a blast, as evidence indicated the head, left arm and upper torso were severed from the body by a knife before the remains were partly burned in a bonfire.

The several parts were still missing tonight as darkness halted investigators.

Bresnan said the body was that of a man about 35 or 40 years old, weighing about 150 pounds. He estimated the torso had lain in the wooded section for from 10 days to two weeks.

The scene of the discovery was a half-mile from the Seabeck road three miles from Erland's Point, where six persons were massacred in the "mass murders" of 1934.

Monmouth-Sheridan Game Looks Like Tough Battle; Polk Players Traveling

MONMOUTH, Oct. 29.—Monmouth high school will meet Sheridan high school Friday afternoon, in football conquest. The hosts defeated Monmouth 13 to 0 in 1934, but Monmouth revenged herself in 1935 with the same score, reversed.

In a game here last Friday, Monmouth took a 39 to 0 victory from Scio high. To date Monmouth has played five games losing to Dallas and Independence, tying with Gervais, and defeating Scio there and here.

Reinstatement of Bales, Alsea Plea

GOVERNOR ASKED TO CHANGE BOARD IF NECESSARY, WALDPART GROUP

WALDPART, Ore., Oct. 29.—(AP)—A demand that Mack Bales be reinstated in charge of the Alsea hatchery, even if it was necessary to "fire the (fish) commission" to effect the change, came to Governor Charles Martin today during his brief stop here while en route to survey the fire damage at Bandon.

A delegation told the governor Bales was removed by State Senator of Hatcheries Hugh Mitchell for "being too honest with the people of Waldport." Dr. Gill Edwards, presiding at the conference, said the people of Waldport had paid more money in poundage fees and licenses than Lincoln county received in benefit from the hatchery.

"What do you want me to do, fire the whole commission?" the governor asked. "I thought the hatchery was to be abandoned."

"Yes, if necessary fire the commission but we want Bales reinstated," was the answer. "The hatchery apparently will be continued," Edgar Ledgerwood is now in charge.

The governor asked the Waldport delegation to meet with the executive and C. C. Going, member of the fish commission, at Marshfield tomorrow.

The governor's party was delayed slightly near Independence when an escorting police car took to the ditch and the governor's machine swerved from the road when a truck passed. No one was injured. The truck driver, Milton J. Lehman, Monmouth, was taken into custody.

Workers Pouring Off Coast Ships

SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Maritime union workers, responding to a strike call from the Pacific union negotiating committee in San Francisco were trooping off ships and piers early today for the indefinite duration of the walkout.

R. B. Collins, president of the International Longshoremen's association local 3512, said longshoremen would remain on the ships long enough to fasten down the hatches to prevent cargo spillage.

P. B. Gill, business agent for the sailors union of the Pacific in Seattle, announced strike calls had been sent to all crews which remained aboard ships pending action by the joint committee.

Eugene-Portland Airline Proposed

EUGENE, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Harry Young, who Monday asked the city council for a five-year lease on the municipal airport, stating that he planned to start a feeder airline between Eugene and Portland and later expand it to include Medford and intermediate points, Thursday declared that he was backed by nearly \$100,000 furnished by several local men, and would start his service whether the council granted him the lease or not, even if it meant taking his field and base plan to "a nearby town."

Negotiations have already gotten under way, he said, for the purchase of two multi-motored 14-passenger planes, and a full crew of mechanics and pilots has been already arranged. Operations will open with two scheduled round-trip flights to Portland per day, with an estimated fare of \$7.50, and will be boosted to three trips per day after a month's operation, according to his statement.
