

Linn Expects Record Voting

Townsend Clubs to Rally Today, Albany Hall; Dances Begun

ALBANY, Oct. 31.—Reports from the office of the Linn county clerk are that there are 15,713 registered voters on the books, an increase of 995 since the last election.

A heavy vote is expected in the 54 precincts of the county. It is expected to exceed all previous elections. Approximately 100 sealed ballots were received at the county clerk's office from voters who will be unable to be at their regular voting places on election day.

ALBANY, Oct. 31.—Charles M. Hester, 78, a resident of the Seio community since 1931, died at the Albany General hospital, and funeral services were held from the Mortimer funeral home at 10 o'clock this morning. Burial was in the Houston cemetery.

Mr. Hester was born September 17, 1858, in Fredericktown, Mo. In 1900 he went to Montana where he remained until 1910 when he came to Portland. A year later, he went to Seio where he engaged in farming. Four daughters and two sons survive. They all live outside of Oregon.

She had been away from Albany for the past 10 years. Surviving is a foster daughter, Venita McFall of Bay City, on sister, Mrs. Olive Misher of Albany, and one brother, Oren Hogan of Camas, Wash. Mr. Hamer died in 1925.

Mr. and Mrs. Bud Cross are announcing the birth of a 6-pound 12-ounce girl Friday.

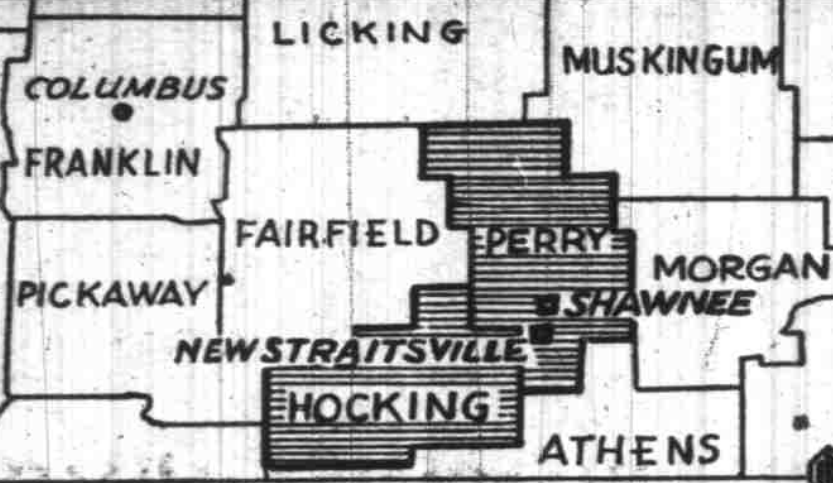
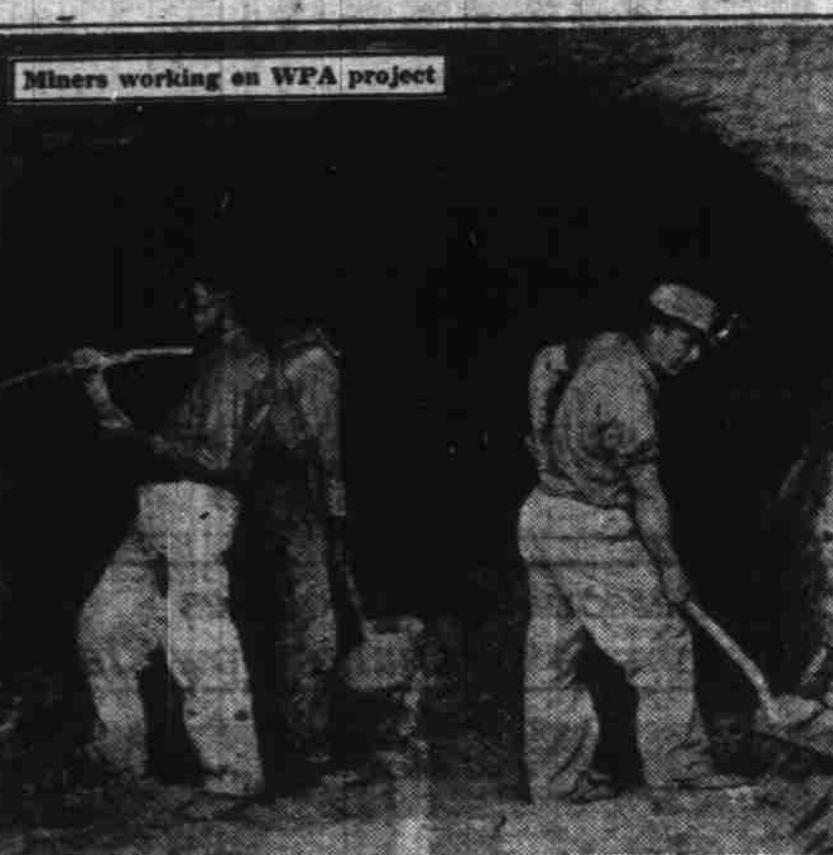
All three babies were born at the Silverton hospital.

Mine Fire Fought; Started in '84



Work is progressing rapidly on the \$360,000 federal WPA project which mining engineers hope will check the world's greatest mine fire. This blaze has been raging underground in southern Ohio since 1884, destroying more than \$50,000,000 worth of coal. Massive barriers of non-inflammable material are being laid down in huge ditches and used to fill tunnels in an effort to confine the blaze to its present limits in the hope that it will burn itself out eventually. The fire started when a mob of miners fired a loaded mine car and ran it down into a mine between New Straitsville and Shawnee because of labor difficulties.

McNary Wins Big Majority in Dallas High Poll; Thomas, VanWell, Hooker, Dunn, Boyston Favored For County

DALLAS, Oct. 31.—A straw ballot was taken at the Dallas high school on Friday. The students voted by "precincts," each roll room being considered a separate precinct. Voting was secret and everything was done to have the voting resemble a real election.

The results were as follows: For president, Alfred M. Landon, republican, 99; Franklin D. Roosevelt, democrat, 210; Norman Thomas, independent, 1; William Lemke, independent, 2; and John W. Aikin, socialist-labor, 0.
