

# Election Races Warmest at Silverton Since 1916, City Tickets

## Mayor Garver Has Opponent

Vote on Presidency Is Expected to Prove Close One

**SILVERTON, Oct. 31.**—An unusual amount of interest is being displayed in politics at Silverton as Nov. 3 nears. A high tension is felt in the local situation which has not been present at Silverton since the election of 1916 when a strong local political fight was on.

Seldom is there much opposition to the city ticket. At best there is usually contention over but one or two places. This year John Porter is the only man running for local office who can be comparatively sure of winning. Mr. Porter is being offered for councilman by both the democrats and the republicans. Now recovering from an operation, he does not expect to be sufficiently recuperated to come downtown to cast his vote.

**Interest in Mayor Race**  
The interest centers first in the race for mayor. Mayor E. W. Garver, republican, is a candidate to succeed himself for the third term. Prior to his election four years ago he served for several years on the city council. He is now manager of the Silverton cold storage and locker system across from the city hall.

Mayor Garver is being opposed for his office by Wilbur Moffett, democrat, who has not yet taken a hand in city affairs. Moffett came here five years ago from Fairdale, N. D., and owns the former Klaus store on Pine street and James avenue.

Almost of equal interest is the race between George W. Hubbs, republican, who is city recorder for several terms, and George Cusiter, democrat, who is the present recorder.

A race with which the city has as yet scarcely become acquainted is that between M. G. Gunderson, republican city recorder for the past 16 years, and Clifford Hue, democrat. Mr. Hue entered the race after the primaries when his name was written in for nomination. He was formerly employed under Mr. Gunderson when the latter was president of the Coolidge & McClellan bank.

Candidates other than Mr. Porter for councilmen are Mr. Porter's nephew, Errol Ross, republican; C. B. Anderson, incumbent, republican; A. W. Green and P. W. Nofsker, democrats. Three councilmen are to be elected.

**McNary Is Favored**  
The Roosevelt-Garner club of which Frank W. Ray is president, has made itself more strongly felt than any republican organization, but there is considerable conjecture whether or not the strength will carry over into the election booths. It is expected the Roosevelt-Landon race will be closer at Silverton than it would have been a year ago. Charles McNary and James Mott are both expected to carry at Silverton but the attorney generally has in anybody's job as far as early predictions can be made at Silverton. The same applies to the position of sheriff. Both A. C. Burk and James McGilchrist have become well known by sight at Silverton during the past few weeks. U. G. Boyer will undoubtedly carry the Silverton district, as some prominent democrats have been heard to remark that he will have their support here.

Alf O. Nelson is a candidate for reelection for justice of the peace of the Silverton district, and S. A. Pitney for reelection constable. Both are republicans. Pitney is being opposed by Ed Amo, former night officer of Silverton, and a democrat. Nelson is unopposed.

Silverton has a habit of voting no on state measures and it is expected that it will not deviate from this custom election.
