furnish planking for the roadway above the Smith ranch. WPA labor will be employed.

For the Mill City improvement, the court voted to make an inspection tour either Monday or soldiers' monument in the court Tuesday. The road, if the improvement is made, will serve a number of families and will allow the cooperative lumber mill better access to timber holdings in the section.
