

### Range Program Effective Here

40,000 Acres in County to Come Under Federal Land Move

Forty thousand acres of Marion county land, classified as range land, may become eligible for participation in the Oregon range improvement program under the 1936 agricultural conservation

program, according to County Agent Harry L. Ritchie, who has just received word that the state program has been approved. These rates and practices have been approved for Oregon. The following practices and rates of payment have been approved for Oregon:

1. Contouring: A permit of 60 cents for each acre furrowed on the contour.
2. Water developments: Developing of (a) Springs and wells, \$50.00. (b) Barn and pit or reservoir for leaching precipitation, 15 cents per cubic yard of fill or excavation.
- (c) Wells: For the drilling or deepening of wells, \$1.00 per linear foot.
3. Water spreading to prevent soil washing, 10 cents per one-hundred linear feet of permanent dikes constructed.
4. Range fences, 50 cents per rod for construction of range fences.
5. Fire guard, 3 cents per one-hundred linear feet.
6. Rodent control, 15 cents at infested area for pocketopher control.
7. Re-seeding depleted range land: (a) \$2.50 an acre for re-seeding with crested wheat grass. (b) \$1.25 an acre for re-seeding with slender wheat grass, western wheat grass or bromus grass. Grasses recommended for re-seeding depleted ranges are very limited and are not the one recommended for this section of the state. Recommended varieties for this area are being forwarded to Washington and it is hoped that certain other grasses and possibly mixtures of the legumes and grasses may be approved for areas where the grasses listed above are not adapted to the climate and soils.
- Any person who owns or operates any range land, except government land or public domain land, devoted to the production of livestock is eligible to make application for payment for the practices, providing the work was or is to be carried out between September 9 and December 15, 1936.
- Inspection Provided: Additional facilities have been provided for the administration of this program and U. S. forest service range examiners, assigned to the work by the AAA, will make inspection of lands covered by applications for the purpose of making recommendations and determining the grazing capacity. The recommendations made by the range examiners will be approved by the county agricultural conservation committee in accordance with approved range management for the state. The maximum payment allowed to any operator who meets the requirement of the above approv-

### Monmouth Still Has Dry Status, Held For Years

MONMOUTH, Nov. 5.—Ye old-time spirit of Monmouth asserted itself Tuesday in a local option ballot for and against the sale of beer here. Votes cast were 324, of which 224, of which 213 were against 111 for; showing under almost 2 to 1 the hopes for reinstatement of the sale of beer. As a matter of fact, no beer has been sold here since January 1935. Two years ago G. L. Russell received a permit from the state liquor commission to sell packaged beer. Russell was never li-

icensed by the city council. The ministerial association of Monmouth augmented by other citizenry forces, protested so vigorously that early this year Russell's permit was revoked, by the liquor commission. Monmouth has voted dry since its beginning. Prior to 1934, beer had never been sold here. The earliest adopted city ordinance banished the fact that no lot in Monmouth should ever be sold for a school, or forfeiture of title would ensue. That ordinance is still in force. Its primary purpose was to maintain a clean town for the student body of its school.
