Palmateer, department vice commander of the American Legion, program in charge of teachers and parent-teacher association.

Thursday, 7:30 to 9 p.m.—Englewood, tour of building and explanation of school work by children; Highland, short program, reception in auditorium and parent-teacher visiting; Washington, program of music and dramatics by children, tour of building; Parish junior high, music under direction of Margaret Simms, play under direction of Lois Millard, physical education demonstration supervised by Etta White; senior high, parent-teacher visiting, and at 8:30, motion pictures and band music in auditorium.

Friday, 7:30 to 9 p.m.—Grant school, short talks by Gretchen Kreamer, music supervisor, and Mrs. Briedwell, display in classrooms. The theme for this year's education week is "Our American Schools at Work."

SILVERTON, Nov. 6.—Funeral services for Erik Johnson, who died here this morning, will be held from the Immanuel church at 2 o'clock Monday with Rev. J. M. Jensen officiating. Interment will be at Evans Valley cemetery. The Ekman Funeral home is in charge of arrangements.

Johnson was born in Jantland, Sweden, May 26, 1846. He came to the United States at the age of 40 and lived in Nebraska and Kansas, coming to Silverton in 1914 where his wife died five years later. Survivors include three children, Alvina Stragey of Nebraska, Emma Overlund and Ida Jorgenson of Silverton; brothers, Nils of Howell Prairie and Moss of Astoria; eight grand children.

National Income To Rise in 1937

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A 10 per cent jump in the national income next year, lifting it to \$66,000,000,000, was forecast by the bureau of agricultural economics today in reporting prospects for increased demand for farm products. The bureau said most of the prospective improvement in demand for farmer's goods would be due to domestic conditions. It predicted not only the 10 per cent jump in national income, but a similar increase in industrial production and slight gains in commodity prices.

As to the outlook for larger foreign outlets for American farm products, the agricultural economists said recent trade agreement developments and the indirect effects of devaluation and tentative stabilization of foreign currencies had resulted in some improvement.

Chief Hutton Will Instruct Firemen

A training program for fire fighters in Marion county will soon be organized under the direction of H. H. Hutton, chief of the Salem fire department, who attended the five day meeting of the Oregon fire instructors' training school at Salem October 26 to October 30.

In recognition of his work at the training school, Mr. Hutton was awarded a certificate issued by the state board for vocational education, the state fire marshal's office, the state fire chiefs' association, and the League of Oregon Cities, at a banquet which marked the close of the school. Instruction was given the students in methods of teaching in order that they might be qualified to conduct classes in various parts of the state and plans were made for the formulation of the first state-wide training program for the firemen of Oregon.

The training program is being organized on the same school basis, which has proven to be successful in New York State and Virginia, and each of the men who attended the school at Salem will organize a series of classes in his county. Classes in most counties will be planned in connection with the county firemen's association.

Ulrich Is Named On Relief Board

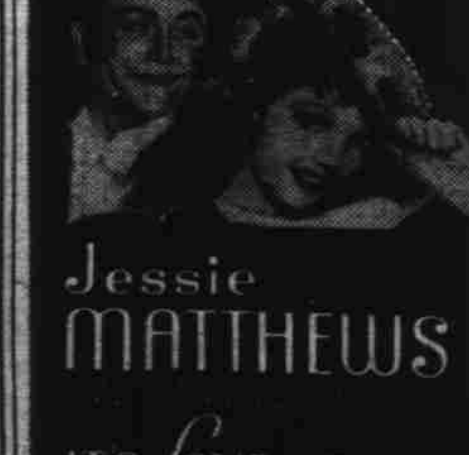

As a result of the heavy vote cast in the presidential election Tuesday, several precincts in Marion county will have to be divided. U. G. Boyer, county clerk, said yesterday. Boyer said that under the law whenever more than 500 votes are the case in a precinct it is required that it be split up.

Because the votes in several precincts ran far over the 500 figure counting boards were late in getting the final tabulation of the vote cast. Precinct No. 1 was the last to report, coming in at noon Thursday.

Besides No. 1, precincts No. 2, No. 14 and the Fairgrounds are over the 500 mark with a possibility that several more may be when the final check is made.

MONMOUTH, Nov. 6.—An automobile collision here Thursday morning at 8:30 knocked out corner supports of the wooden marquee fronting Monmouth hotel, broke one large window and cracked a second, and laid the highway stop sign low.

Morris Langberg of Booth, Oregon, was driving north accompanied by his wife and Mrs. I. Peterson of Eugene. Just as he made the intersection turn at the west side highway with Main street, another car driven by H. T. Sapp, Monmouth, going east toward Independence, collided with the Langberg's machine. According to spectators, Langberg's car struck Sapp's broadside, and the Sapp car appeared to swerve and hit Langberg's machine at the rear. The Sapp car shot forward, striking the hotel with damaging force.

Mrs. Langberg, recently out of the hospital from an operation, was badly shocked, and was taken into the hotel where Dr. F. R. Bowersox attended. Mrs. Peterson suffered a knee injury. Sapp, traveling alone, and Langberg reported no serious injuries.

Fewer WPA Jobs To Be Available

A tapering off in the number of jobs to be supplied by the WPA in Marion county and vicinity was predicted yesterday by J. E. "Jim" Smith, district director, and T. J. Sheridan, labor relations manager. The local district yesterday received a maximum job quota of 2000, or approximately 40 below the number of men and women now employed on work relief projects.

WPA funds set aside for Oregon will be exhausted by next March 31 if the present rate of payroll expenditures were to continue, Smith said. Originally there was sufficient money available to insure maximum operation through next June but diversion of funds to midwest drought relief has cut Oregon short.

No employees will be discharged under the 2000 quota for the present but assignment of new workers to projects probably will be curtailed sharply, Sheridan indicated.
