

\$46,535 Increase Proposed by Polk County Budget Committee

Hearing Set November 27

Total Budget \$379,609;
Tax Required Would
Total \$311,766

DALLAS, Nov. 7.—The members of the Polk county budget committee met here this week and drew up a tentative budget for 1937. The total estimated expense is \$379,609.32. The probable estimated receipts for the year are placed at \$67,842.67, leaving the amount to be raised by direct taxes at \$311,766.65.

The budget as drawn up by the committee is \$46,535.39 more than it was in 1936. Part of this increase is necessitated by the failure to levy \$15,260 of last year's budget due to an extension error.

Increases Made
Also it is not expected that so much will be received in 1937 from delinquent taxes. In addition some slight increases were made in the widow's pension fund, for a salary increase, in the road equipment fund and for land's disease control.

The members of the Polk county budget committee are: P. O. Powell, chairman; Paul B. Wallace, secretary; Ralph Dodson, Judge George Hawkins and County Commissioners C. C. Gardner and Fred Gibson.

A public hearing on the proposed budget is to be held at the Polk county court house at 10 o'clock Friday morning, November 27.

Manning School History Retold

GERVAIS, Nov. 7.—The Manning school is being repaired, the board having decided to put it in condition to be used during the remainder of the school year and take steps toward building a new building. The old building was built in 1872 and had rotted away; the chimney was about to fall and the building was declared unsafe. New sills are being put in; the chimney is being propped and other repairs, amounting in all to about \$100, are being made.

This is one of the first school buildings erected in this section of the county. It was first built on the Scott Jones place a mile south of Gervais and was later moved to its present location 1 1/2 miles farther south. It was named the Jones school and the name has never been officially changed, though after it was moved to the Manning neighborhood the name became the Manning school by common usage.

Erection was completed November 13, 1872. S. W. R. Jones, father of Scott Jones, was a diligent worker in getting the district organized and was a member of the first school board. Most of the pupils and several of the teachers have been from the Jones family. Jesse B. Jones was the first teacher; John Jones, a son of Jesse, who died, was one of the teachers and W. T. Rigdon of Salem at one time taught this school; Sylvia Jones Briley is mentioned as one of the most successful teachers. Mrs. Thompson is the present teacher.
