

Parade Prize Winners Told

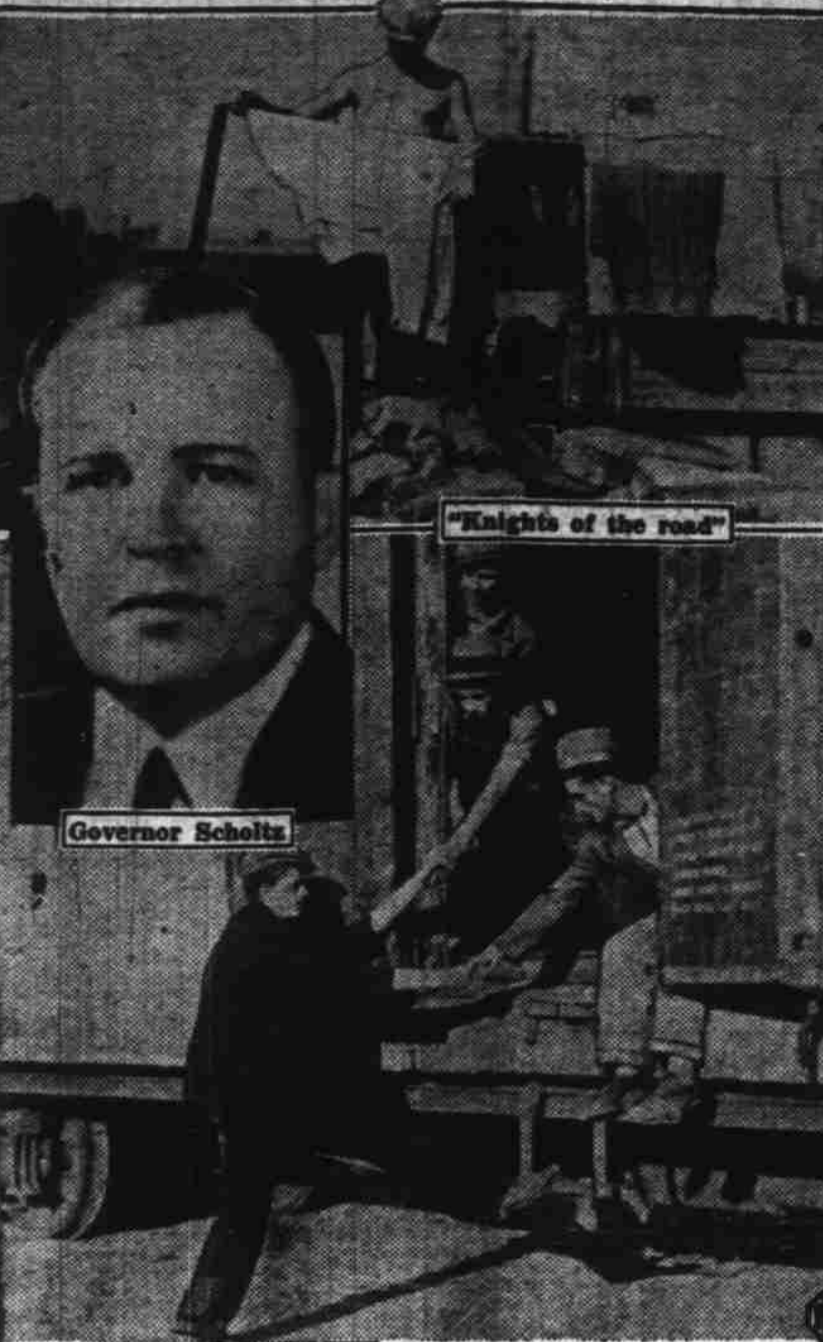
Armistice Day Is Fittingly Observed by Groups At Woodburn

Plea for Peace Made by Elkins

Band Makes Appearance at Armistice Program At Monmouth

MONMOUTH, Nov. 12.—Speaking before a large audience in the auditorium of the Oregon Normal school Wednesday morning, Rev. W. A. Elkins, minister of the First Christian church, and an overseas veteran, made an eloquent plea for peace. He quoted the words, recently made by the President of the United States: "We choose peace."

He spoke of the amazing revelations recently made that 21,000 men became millionaires from wartime munitions enterprises; and lauded the stand taken by the American Legion with its million members to take steps to legally enact through congress a measure whereby no man or man become rich from the blood-money of war, again.

Urges Stand for Peace "Let us let the world know that we stand for construction, not destruction," he exhorted the young people in his audience. "Let us hold aloft the olive-branch of peace, and receive in our hearts to stand for peace and betterment, for intelligence and enlightenment, to carry out the purposes and plans for peace progress and its uplift."

The band, directed by F. C. Ellefson, performed splendidly. Dr. V. V. Caldwell announced that musicians were participating from Dallas, Independence, Monmouth and Salem.
