Temperance Union Votes Resolutions

**Mrs. Lydia Lehman Named
President at Annual
County Meeting**

A number of resolutions were adopted at the 44th annual convention of the Marion County Women's Christian Temperance union held this week in the W.C.T.U. hall here with the Salem union entertaining.

Officers elected for the year were: Mrs. Lydia Lehman, president; Mrs. Jennie Nunn, vice-president; Mrs. Avis Cannon, recording secretary; Mrs. Mildred Gillette, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Jennie McClellan, treasurer.

Mrs. Nedra Buck, state W.C.T.U. president, gave the main address, stressing the new plans of work for the year, among them the new membership plan. Each state in the union is to take for its study a foreign country in preparation of the world convention which will be held in Washington, D. C., in June, 1937. Oregon's country is Korea.

The resolutions, unanimously adopted, were:

1. We re-affirm our stand for total abstinence from alcoholic beverages.
2. Repeat has strengthened our belief as to the soundness of national prohibition and the necessity for its re-enactment.
3. Temperance education is handicapped when it has to contend with millions of dollars spent by liquor interests to mis-educate the public. Therefore we believe it necessary to continue and enlarge our program of alcohol education, both to make known the nature and effects of alcohol and to express the sophistry and hypocrisy of the program of the liquor interests, falsely called a "temperance" program.
4. Gambling: We oppose the legalization of lotteries or other forms of gambling, no matter for what purpose, as subversive to the best interests of society.
5. Constitutional government: We believe in the constitution of the United States of America and in our representative form of government. We believe that neither executive nor judicial branch should seek to change the constitution.
6. Youth: Our educational program is designed to offer young people a better understanding of modern problems, and we commend to them the activities and studies of our youth's temperance council.
7. Narcotics: We believe that the federal government and the states should cooperate in uniform legislation for the prohibition of narcotic drugs, including opium, heroin, morphine, cocaine and marihuana. We urge greater concern on the part of parents, teachers, pastors and civic organizations to protect the youth from exploitation by distributors of these drugs.
8. Peace: We reaffirm our conviction that difficulties between nations should be settled by conference and judicial action, and that by the building of warships we can not promote friendships.

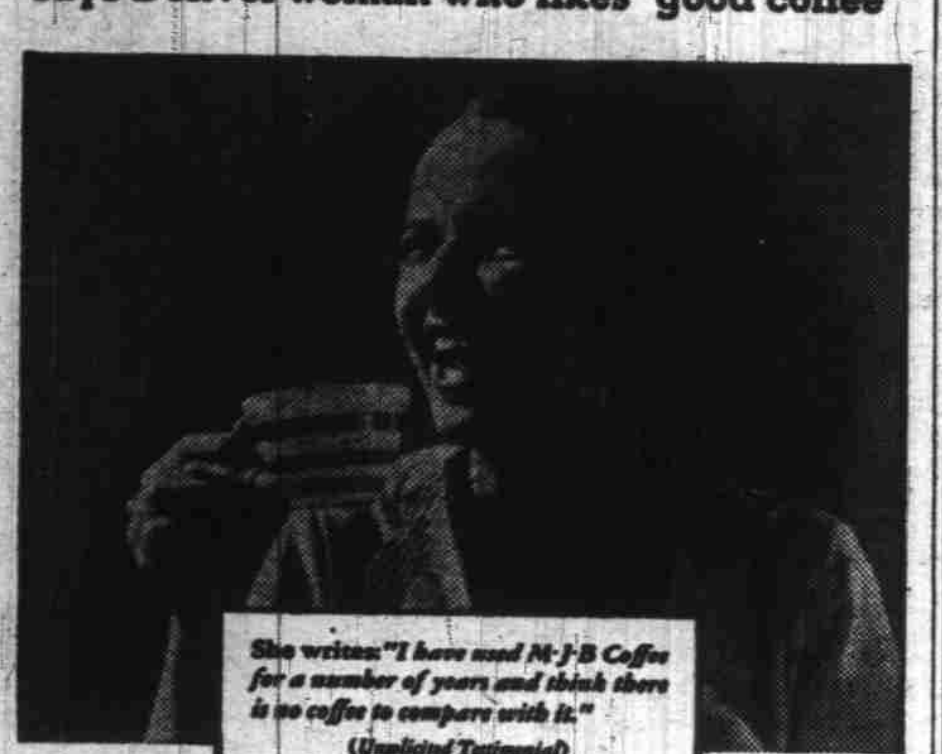
