### Munson Freed, Lewis Held Guilty and Receives Usual Sentence

A municipal court jury yesterday afternoon cleared A. A. Munson of drunken driving charges which were filed against him September 19. The case occupied three hours time in court. Charles Grant, Arthur H. Moore, S. H. Leach, Charles E. McElhinny, W. T. Ramsden and Wolfe Cohen were the jurors.  
H. H. Lewis, 162 Union street, whom police arrested Wednesday night on a drunken driving charge pleaded guilty late yesterday and received the court's customary minimum penalty, a \$100 fine, 30-day jail sentence suspended upon payment of the fine, one year's suspension of driver's license.
