Coffey Appeal Time Extended

Until January 9 to File Transcript; Lawyers Sign Stipulation

Under an order received from Judge Earl C. Latourette of Oregon City yesterday, Orey G. Coffey has been granted until January 9 for filing a transcript of appeal from his conviction of receiving a bribe while a member of the Salem police force. Coffey was convicted last June and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. He was released under \$5000 bond. Included in the transcript are notice of appeal, certificate of probable cause and the judgment roll. Bill of exceptions to the judgment was filed by Coffey November 2. Judge Latourette, in another order, granted an extension of time in which to file objections to the exceptions. The order granting the extension of time for filing the transcript of appeal was based on a stipulation signed by Ralph E. Mowdy, assistant attorney general, and special prosecutor; William H. Trindle, district attorney, and Paul R. Burris, defendant's attorney.

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Cost of Fighting Power District Scheme Listed Here by Electric Firm

Defeat of the People's Utility district measure for Marion county at the general election cost the Portland General Electric company \$355,153, a report of campaign expenses filed yesterday with the county clerk by W. H. Lines, treasurer of the company, shows.
Of the amount \$2050 was contributed to the Oregon Tax Review Publishing company, which in a separate statement submitted by Carl T. Pope shows total expenditures, including the power company donation, of \$2260.50. The balance of the fund was contributed by Salem businessmen.

Bethel Club Now Being Judged For Sectional Award

Bethel 4-H club which was awarded first choice among 60 Marion county clubs as the outstanding club in the national social progress contest is now being judged at Corvallis for the sectional prize. The Marion winner was chosen by Wayne D. Harding, county club leader.

The winner of the sectional award will be given transportation for ten of its members to compete for the national prize at Chicago during the week of November 23.
The Bethel club is led by Mrs. Carmalita Weddle. There are 16 members in the organization.

Health Group to Offer Programs

The Marion County Public Health association will present two health programs to community groups in the county within the next three days.
Tonight, the association will present "What Everyone Should Know About Tuberculosis" at the Silverton Hills community club meeting. Mrs. Irma LaRiche, nurse of the county health department, will be the speaker.
Monday night Dr. A. T. King will speak under auspices of the county health association at the big meeting of the Stayton Parents-Teachers association. A dinner at 6:30 o'clock will open the P-T-A event, and the program will follow at 8 o'clock. Dr. King will discuss "Care of Tuberculosis."

Postmaster Will Aid With Reports

Aid to employers in filling out the federal forms in connection with the federal social security act, will be provided by H. R. Carlson, postmaster, on the 16th and 21st of November. The first date is the day that the registration cards will be delivered by mail carriers and the last, the day upon which they must be returned.
The forms are to be distributed to all employers of one or more persons "in their business, trade or profession," with the exception of those who are exempt. Another form is to be distributed to all employers who come under the administration of the act. This will be delivered by the postoffice to the employers on November 24, and by them delivered to their employees.

Exemptions are made in a self-employed, railroad industry, agricultural labor, domestic service in a private home, casual labor not in the course of the employer's trade or business, service performed as an officer or member of the crew of a vessel documented under the laws of the United States or any foreign country, government service, state government service and corporations, community chests, funds or foundations organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, or for prevention of cruelty to children or animals.
