Only Three Linn County Towns Get Higher Assessments in 1937 Levies; Albany School District up 3 Mills

ALBANY, Nov. 19.—W. C. Templeton, Linn county assessor, has announced the 1937 tax levies for Linn county municipalities, only three of which show a higher millage than those for 1936. The total amounts which will be raised by these levies in Albany and school district No. 5, which includes Albany, will be \$69,413.10 and \$75,372.25.

The Albany levy which is 18.1 mills, is one tenth of a mill greater than that of last year, and the total tax is \$3,779.48 greater. In school district No. 5, the levy is increased from 15.3 mills to 16.1 mills making a total of \$16,444.98 more to be raised than for 1936. The increase in the school levy is due, according to school authorities, to the increased debt service, which it is claimed is at its peak this year.

Brownsville has the highest levy

for the municipalities, being 42.2 mills while Halsey has the lowest, 21.4, although that is a trifle higher than for 1936.

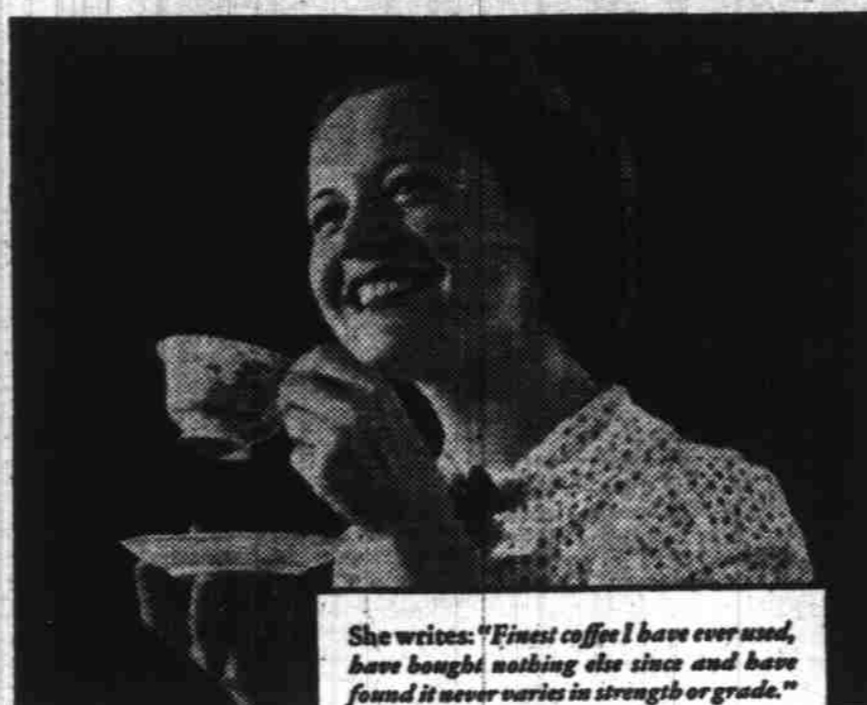
Lebanon's levy is also a trifle higher, being fixed at 21.9 mills which is 3 of a mill higher than that of 1936. Harrisburg is placed at 27.5 mills as against 30.1 for 1936; Scio is 21.9 mills as against 22.1 mills for last year and Sodaville's 1937 levy is 14.4 mills. Last year it was 14.6 mills.
