## Mother Kills Two Children, Herself In Front of Train

**NORTHWOOD, N. D., Nov. 19.**—(AP)—Kneeling before an onrushing train, her babies clasped in her arms, a Northwood mother tonight killed herself and her two small children near here. The mother, Mrs. Belle Paulson, 30, left behind an incoherent note, telling of her intention to destroy herself under the train wheels, and begging her husband, Ray, "to forgive me—I hope I will see you again."

Killed with her were an infant son, Roumaine, a year old, and a second son, O'Clair, six. The older boy was thrown clear of the tracks by the impact of a Great Northern passenger train bound for Breckenridge, Minn. He was taken, still living, to a Northwood hospital, where he died without regaining consciousness. Mangled beneath the wheels of train, bodies of the mother and her infant son were taken to Northwood by the train crew.

## Federal Bank Case Disputed

**Ladd and Bush Claims Its Mortgage Upon Johnson Case Supersedes**

In an answer and cross-complaint filed by Ladd and Bush bank in the case of Federal Land bank against Carl H. Johnson and others, the defendant bank alleges that it has a claim superior to the plaintiff's mortgage and asks that the Johnson property be sold to satisfy its claim of \$2070 and the balance be applied upon the note held by the plaintiff.

The federal bank filed the foreclosure suit for \$7272 and asked that in addition to the sale of the real estate, 45 shares of land bank stock be sold to satisfy the claim. The stock was put up as security for the loan by the Marion-Polk national farm association which approved the loan.

Ladd and Bush allege in their answer that the defendant Johnson and others borrowed \$2000 from them in 1928 and gave a mortgage as security. In 1933 the note was renewed and increased to \$2070. They allege that their claim holds priority over the federal mortgage.

## Technocrat Tells Of Group's Belief

**Disintegration of Entire U. S. Economic System Ahead Is Warning**

America faces disintegration of its entire economic life because of its failure to accept Technocracy's challenge to apply science to prosperity, in the opinion of Jonathan F. Glendon, Los Angeles lecturer, who spoke at Laboy hall here last night under auspices of the Salem Trades and Labor council.

"We are dependent upon energy conversion for our very existence," Glendon declares. "If the processes of conversion of extraneous energy were stopped at a given moment, more than three-fourths of the people on this continent would starve to death in less than 30 days."

Depleting a steady increase in unemployment as the accompaniment of industrial modernization,

Glendon predicted "the limits of social tolerance will be reached before the latter part of 1940." Technocracy, Inc., institute which he represents, is in constant communication with 25,000 men and women in positions of economic responsibility in order "to prepare conditions which will avoid bloodshed or anarchy in the transition to the new society," according to Glendon.
