crease in the year's pack due to the short crop of cherries and berries. Strawberries and loganberries both fell down because of poor harvesting conditions. However, the roseberry pack showed an increase of approximately 10,000 cases. Apricots was short because the high price of the fresh fruit made packing impracticable, cannery said.

The 1933 pack for Oregon segregated into individual packs shows a wide variation of vegetables and fruits canned in Oregon. The estimated packs in cases are as follows:

Roosevelt Speeds On Way to Parley

ABOARD U. S. S. CHESTER AT SEA, Nov. 21.—(P)—President Roosevelt and his party sped down South America's east coast tonight for Rio de Janeiro, on the way to the inter-American peace conference at Buenos Aires.

The cruisers Indianapolis and Chester, bearing the United States group, left mountain-rimmed Port of Spain, Trinidad, at 11:15 p. m. after an eight-hour stop for refueling in Paria bay.

During the stay, President Roosevelt went fishing in a whale boat, but returned empty-handed three hours later. He wore old gray trousers, a sleeveless blue sweater and a soft white-clothed hat. Two secret service officers accompanied him.

Deputy Gov. A. W. Seymour of Trinidad visited the president aboard the Indianapolis, and James Roosevelt—the president's son—returned the visit with Capt. Paul Bastardo, a presidential aide.

Pension Meeting Called Saturday

A meeting of persons interested in obtaining more adequate pensions for elderly people in Oregon, will be held in the courthouse next Saturday afternoon, November 25, at 2 o'clock, a committee of local men sponsoring the move announced Saturday night. It was explained that this effort was not connected with any previously established pension movement.

Two objectives are mentioned in the call which the group sent out: pensions amounting to at least \$40 a month by the end of 1937, and elimination of the requirement that recipients declare themselves paupers. The meeting will be held in circuit courtroom No. 1.

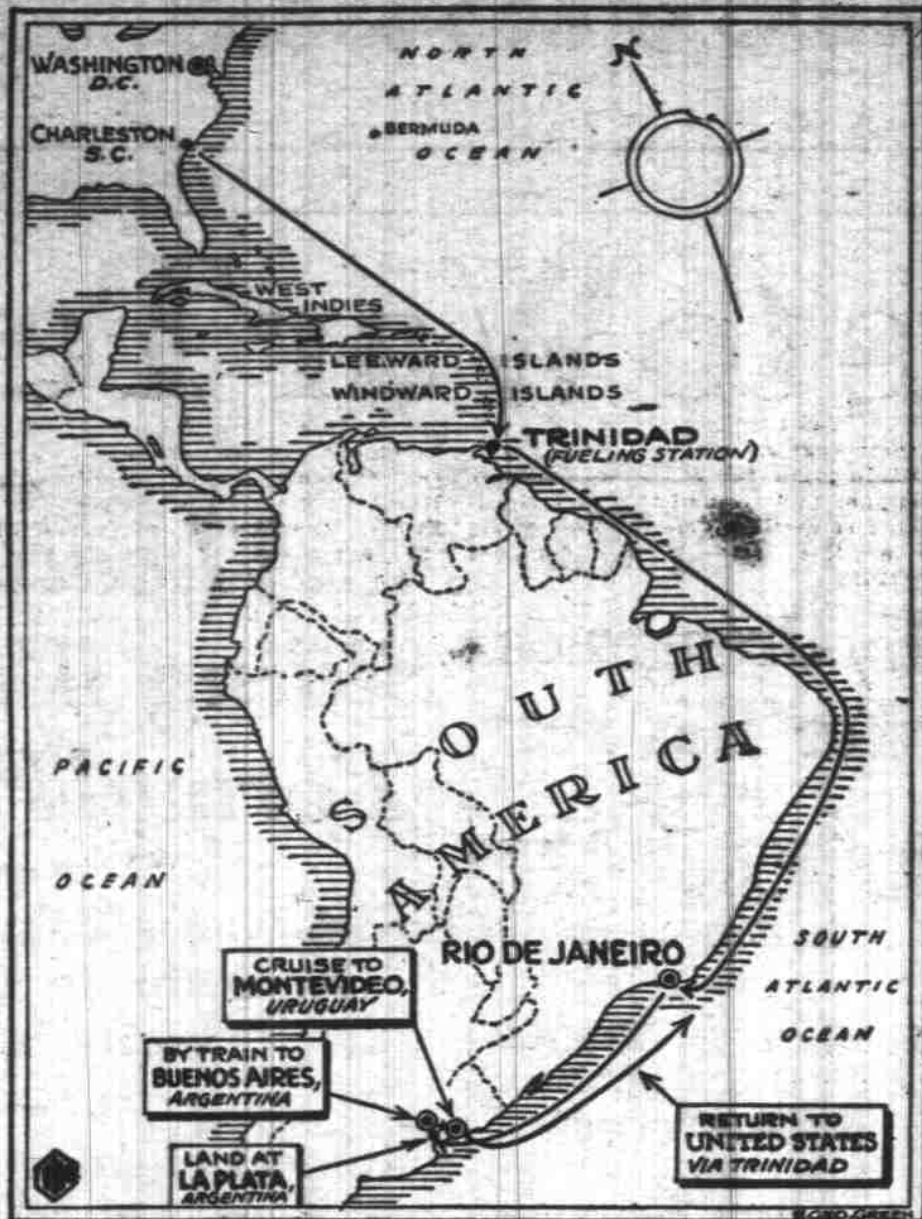

Itinerary of Roosevelt's Trip



More than 12,000 miles will be covered by President Franklin D. Roosevelt on his combination vacation and business cruise aboard the S. S. Indianapolis before he returns Dec. 14. Embarking from Charleston, S. C., the presidential party is en route to Trinidad, re-fueling station, in the windward and leeward islands, thence to Rio de Janeiro, arriving there Nov. 27 where he will spend the day as guest of President Vargas of Brazil. His next stop will be the port of La Plata where he will entrain to Buenos Aires, speaking at the opening session of the Inter-American conference Dec. 1. Leaving the Argentine capital the following day, he will cruise to nearby Montevideo, leaving there the afternoon of Dec. 3 for the return voyage to United States via Trinidad for another refueling stop.

Maritime Strike Spreads in East

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(P)—While officials of the International Seamen's union were claiming the "outlaw strike" of sailors on the east coast was broken, the heads of two more maritime unions issued a strike call to their members today.

William S. Brown, national president of the Marine Engineers' Beneficial association, and James J. Delaney, national president of the Masters, Mates and Pilots' association, announced members of their organizations had been called out effective Monday.

The strike call applied to both coasts and the union leaders estimated several thousand men would be affected.

The seamen's strike strategy committee said tonight it had obtained assurance from the Federation of Ports and Docks of France—a union the committee said included all the shore workers in the country—that they would not work in connection with American ships the strikers were seeking to hamper.

The S. S. Washington of the United States lines sailed from here November 18, for Le Havre, France.

Causes of Cancer Are Being Traced

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 21.—(P)—An Ohio State university chemist disclosed tonight that research in the age-old quest for the cause of cancer has led to composition of numerous chemical substances that produced the unconquered disease.

After two years of research in collaboration with an associate of Harvard medical school, Dr. Melvin Newman of Ohio said they had uncovered 10 different hydrocarbons—combinations of hydrogen and carbon—which caused cancer when applied to the skin of mice.

Some of the compounds, he said, are to be found in natural products; others were compounded synthetically in the laboratory for the purpose of study.

Soil Conservation Revision Is Urged

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—(P)—Grain belt farm sentiment for revision of the administration's soil conservation program to permit expanded plantings of wheat and corn next year was reported today by the AAA.

In view of Secretary Wallace's recent forecast that acreage in these crops would be increased next year, the recommendation of the farmers was regarded as a strong indication of the trend of next year's farm program.

The soil conservation plan, started this year, provided federal benefit payments to farmers for shifting acreage from those major commodities, classed by the government as soil-depleting, and also for soil building practices such as fertilizing.

Railroad Mishap Caused by Slide

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 21.—(P)—Two men were critically injured when a Western Pacific eastbound train struck an earth slide near Altamont pass tonight, railroad officials here said.

The injured, Thomas Tucker, fireman, and L. E. Maher, brakeman, were taken to a hospital at Livermore.

Attendants said Maher, whose left leg was amputated in an effort to save his life, may die.

Credit Expansion Curb Considered

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—(P)—Apprehensively watching a steady inflow of gold, the federal reserve board gave a strong indication today it may increase reserve requirements again, to curb credit expansion by "freezing" more than \$1,000,000,000 of excess bank reserves.

After a week of conferences about the effect of heavy gold imports on the national credit situation, the board, through Chairman Marriner S. Eccles, announced that "careful consideration" was being given to the question "with a view to taking such action at such time as appears to be necessary in the public interest."

Reserve officials said this indicated a probability that, unless the present situation changes, reserve requirements may be further increased in January or February, after funds withdrawn for the holiday season flow back into the banks.

On Aug. 15, the board increased requirements by 50 per cent to eliminate about \$1,500,000,000 of excess reserves as a basis of "possible injurious credit expansion."

Beheading Cases Suiyuan Province Solution Sought

CLEVELAND, Nov. 21.—(P)—Two men, described by police as eccentric, occupied cells today while detectives searched a dilapidated dwelling they shared for possible clues in the city's six headless killings.

The men were arrested in a ramshackle house near an isolated district in which several of the six decapitated bodies were found within the past year. A nondescript painting in the house depicted a medieval execution, a headman holding up a severed head with decapitated bodies lying nearby. Detectives Ralph Kennedy and Leo Duffin said.

The officers found five razor-edged butcher knives. An axe and hatchet, both stained, were found in a leanto shed.

The suspects said they were rag-pickers and junk dealers.

Steel Labor Plan Investigation On

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 21.—(P)—The Sun-Telegraph said tonight the national labor relations board is investigating the Carnegie-Illinois Steel corporation's employee representation plan.

It declared Robert B. Watts, assistant general counsel in charge of the board's prosecutions, and several "undercover" investigators are in town.

It pointed out the corporation's plan was drafted by Arthur H. Young, executive vice president of U. S. Steel corporation, who also originated the International Harvester plan, recently declared illegal by the board.

The investigators have questioned several Carnegie-Illinois employees. International Harvester appealed to the board ruling to the circuit court of appeals.

Daue Car Stolen, Police Notified

Desmond Daue reported to city police last night that his car had been stolen about 11 o'clock while parked in front of his brother's house at 240 Owens street.

Three men landed in the city jail last night on charges of drunkenness. They were Ed Slating, John Walter and Luis Anderson.

Yankee Aviators Help Both Sides

Fliers Don't Know Other Americans Opposing, Says Newspaper

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(P)—American aviators were pictured by the New York Sun today as fighting on opposite sides in the Spanish civil war, without realizing they are gunning for each other. Those fighting with the insurgents, the Sun says, are not aware that they are trading machine gun fire with brother Americans, in some cases their best friends, in the loyalist planes. And those with the government forces are equally in the dark about the identity of the pilots in the black fascist planes.

The American pilots, recruited in New York by agents for the two warring factions, are fighting for glory and money. They are paid a salary of \$1500 a month, the Sun says, plus a bonus of \$1000 for every enemy plane brought down.

"It is hard to estimate how many American pilots now are taking part in the battles above Madrid," the article continues. "Most of those recruited here during the last month or so are with the loyalist forces at Madrid, and undoubtedly aided in putting up the recent stubborn resistance against the rebel invaders."

Among those listed as fighting in Spain were Bert Acosta, who accompanied Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd on a trans-Atlantic flight to France in 1927; Edie Schneider, of Jersey City; Gordon Berry, and Major Fred A. Lord, who served with the British flying service in the world war.

U. S. Proposes to Close Consulates

Perkins to Barcelona to close his office and call upon an American naval vessel to take American citizens from there if changes in local conditions become unsafe.

Perkins earlier had informed the department he had warned all Americans in his district that the consulate was likely to be closed at any time without prior notice.

The insurgent high command has threatened to blockade Barcelona by sea. If this is done, state department officials said, a naval vessel would not be summoned there for evacuation duty but the consul would make his way to France overland. This would be designed to avoid possible international complications.

Four American naval vessels constituting the European squadron are stationed in nearby ports of France and Gibraltar.

In Madrid, 76 American residents were said by last reports to be huddled within the "thick stone-walled embassy as a protection against the crushing rebel artillery fire and bombing raids directed at the capital."

Dispatches from Madrid report the population already is suffering from hunger.

The embassy, however, has a supply of ration tickets and feeds 150 persons for three weeks.

Foreigners Flee Suiyuan Province

KWEISUI, Suiyuan, China, Nov. 21.—(P)—Foreigners, including Japanese, fled this province today because of the threatening eastern Suiyuan-Chahar border crisis—the result of alleged Japanese-sponsored invasions of the north China area.

American missionaries, scattered in isolate hamlets throughout the huge province, were among those evacuating. Dispatches from Paotou, western terminus of the Peking-Suiyuan railway, said Japanese and other foreigners were fleeing in fear of a sudden outbreak in hostilities.

Stuart Guntzel of Waseau, Wis., reached here from Tellingmiao to report the war zone appeared destined to engulf the northern Suiyuan frontier.

Recent Backers Landon's Guests

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 21.—(P)—Gov. Alf M. Landon entertained two of his presidential campaign supporters, former Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania and William Allen White, Emporia editor, at a dinner tonight but postponed until tomorrow a discussion of politics to attend a wedding.

After chatting informally with his guests at the dinner table, the governor and Mrs. Landon withdrew later to attend the wedding of Miss Josephine Burrow, Topeka, to Frederick M. Harris, Jr., of Ottawa, at the First Presbyterian church.

The dinner had been arranged for a discussion of future plans for the republican party.

Christmas Buying Surge Anticipated

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(P)—Merchants prepared today for an expected nationwide Christmas shopping surge, partly supported by industry's year-end outpouring of extra dividends, wage increases and bonuses.

The National Retail Dry Goods association estimated nearly 600,000 additional workers would be needed to handle the prospective increased holiday trade, the largest extra force since pre-depression years.

The nation's stores, the association said, have made "lavish plans" laid in large stocks of merchandise, and emphasized a "festive tone" more strongly than in any year since 1929.

Retail men are looking to the distribution of many millions of dollars next month to shareholders and workers for stimulus to trade gains already achieved on the rise in national income, the association added.

A tabulation of actions by about 265 companies the last month shows a total of approximately \$25,000,000 in dividends, including regular payments. The bulk is payable before Christmas, along with some \$50,000,000 in bonuses by a large group of companies.

shown to be businesses organized on a nation-wide scale, to which great corporations pay tens of millions annually. Strike breaking munitions, gas grenades, and machine guns are proved to be stocked by plants in every line of industry.

"Criminals, paid by business, march out of plants badged as deputy sheriffs, free to frame union men to prison. Big employers are shown personally instructing gangsters in the arts and tricks of destroying unions."

"Local public officials have been revealed as selling tear gas by night and by day, drilling vigilantes as 'law and order' leaguers to crush unions."

"The nub of the matter is that the senate must grant the La Follet committee adequate financing for lack of which its work is being stalled."

While the convention was in recess today, some of the delegates sympathetic with John L. Lewis' revolt, organized for a "united front" when the labor issue comes to the floor Monday.

PWA Expenditure For Health Given

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 21.—(P)—A report on PWA expenditures in Oregon for the nation-wide defense against disease was issued here today through Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the interior and PWA administrator. Oregon allotments have been as follows:

Oregon State college infirmary, grant \$28,800, loan \$71,200, total estimated cost \$100,000.

University of Oregon infirmary, grant \$54,000, total estimated cost \$120,000.

Blind institution dormitory at Salem, grant \$31,950, total estimated cost \$71,000.

Tuberculosis hospital at Salem, grant \$45,855, total estimated cost \$101,900.

Ward building for male patients at state hospital at Salem, grant \$81,900, total estimated cost \$159,639.

Nurses home in The Dalles, grant \$12,275, total estimated cost \$27,275.

The figures were released at Portland through the office of C. C. Heckley, Oregon PWA director.

Man Who Will Fight Nine Detractors on Monday Seems Unperturbed

BUDAPEST, Nov. 21.—(P)—Absence of goulash from the family dinner table—not the nine duels he intends to fight Monday and Tuesday evenings—bothered Dr. Franz Sargis tonight. Sitting down to his evening meal after a day of brisk practice with a cavalry sabre, interspersed by announcements he was "very confident," Dr. Sargis said he could not understand why a physician had forbidden the Magda, his pretty blonde wife, to eat the national dish.

Magda, who is expecting a baby, has been placed on a strict diet. The origin of the nine challenges, which must be fought within 48 hours under the time limit code, dates from the time last February that Magda disappeared from the home of her father, Eugene Darko, a university professor. That was prior to the wedding.

Budapest at once buzzed with gossip. There were remarks to the effect the doctor was marring Magda for her money; he was a "gigolo."

There were fist fights and some of the gossips offered public apologies. But Dr. Sargis, contending the lady's honor was involved, refused.

Magda's family was enraged by the publicity but Magda refused to give up her new husband.
