

Prisoners' Board Opinion Withheld

Van Winkle Awaits Ruling on Aldrich Case, Due Shortly, He Says

No opinion on the responsibility of the county court and state for the care of prisoners returned to the county jail under commitments of sentences by Governor Martin will be forthcoming until the habeas corpus writ of William H. Aldrich has been decided, I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general yesterday advised the county court. The Aldrich writ heard on the legality of the transfer so any decision in that case would have direct effect on the question of care of the prisoners.

Van Winkle told District Attorney Trindle that investigation regarding the question was being held up until the circuit court had made its ruling. The case is now before Judge L. G. Lewelling on briefs. An early opinion is expected.

The information was obtained after Judge J. C. Siegmund asked Trindle at the court meeting yesterday when the opinion was to be given.

"The situation is a serious one with us," said the judge. "The jail is overcrowded. These boys who escaped the other day were shoved into the women's cell because of an overcrowded condition and this would not have been necessary had these prisoners been in the penitentiary to which they were sentenced. The county is also put at extra expense as wards of the juvenile court who

have to be kept in detention pending their hearings now have to be sent to the Deaconess hospital for the woman's ward is occupied due to every available space in the jail being taken up, even to sleeping in the corridors."

Hit-Run Charges Faced by Woman

Mrs. Hazel E. Logan, 42, of Hubbard, was arrested by state police yesterday afternoon on a warrant charging her with hit-and-run driving. Appearing before Judge Hiram Overton in Woodburn justice court, she was granted time until Tuesday at 10 a. m. to enter her plea.

The complaint against the woman was signed by Gerald Hershberger, Hubbard milk truck driver, who alleged his truck was struck by her automobile on the St. Paul-Newberg road Tuesday forenoon and forced into a ditch.

Mrs. Logan yesterday said that if her car hit the truck she was unaware of it.

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Howard Endorses Seal Sale Drive

MADRID, Nov. 27. (AP)—Reports here tonight said Joseph, 22-year-old son of Socialist Premier Francisco Largo Caballero, was executed by a fascist firing squad.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27. (AP)—Striking seamen signed a working agreement tonight with two affiliated steamship companies, operating of three freighters.

The pact was hailed at insurgent strike headquarters as the first break in their month long fight on Atlantic and gulf coasts against the opposition of owners and regular international seamen's union officers.

Joseph Curran, insurgent strike leader, said the Prudential Steamship company, operating the freighters Eastern Guide and Diamond Cement of San Francisco, and the Transoceanic Steamship company, operating the Santa Tecla of New Orleans, "settled on the basis of full west coast demands."

NEW YORK, Nov. 27. (AP)—Police arrested four men here today and announced they had confessed a restaurant holdup at Grants Pass, Ore.

Police said the four identified themselves as James Booth, 20, Kenneth W. Kasten, 22, Irvin and Harold Clark, brothers, 19 and 18 respectively, and that they waived extradition to Oregon.

The quietest admitted, police said, they had stolen an automobile at Roseburg, Ore., and driven it to Eureka.

Christian Giesy Funeral Is Held

AURORA, Nov. 27.—The funeral services for Christian Giesy, pioneer resident of this community, held at the Miller chapel here this afternoon, were largely attended.

Rev. Willis Bergen, pastor of the Piedmont Presbyterian church, Fortland, had charge of the services at the mortuary and the grave. The father of Christian was among the very early pioneers of Washington, which was a part of Oregon Territory when he first arrived in the Willapa region, and was later that year organized as a territory. He it was who led the eight men sent out as a pilot party across the plains from Missouri in 1853 for the Kell colony, of Missouri and Oregon, and so was a historic character.

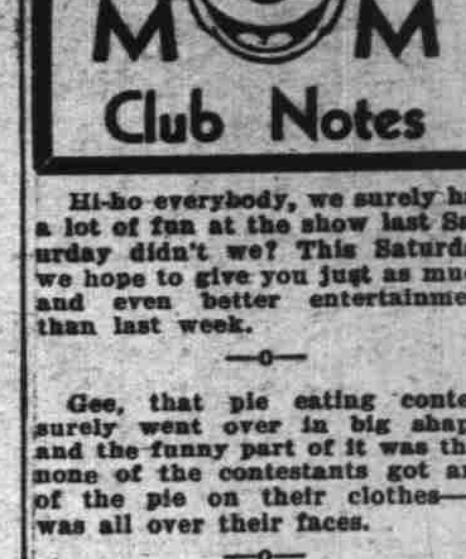
