Mrs. Brown's parents were William French and Delilah Ann (Cleaver) Eastham, pioneers of 1848. They came in the train of Belivar Walker and settled on a homestead near Monitor, where Mrs. Brown was reared. Flew Union Flag

As a young girl, Mrs. Brown and her sister, Viola, at the outbreak of the Civil war, constructed a union flag, the first to be used in this vicinity. The flag, flying over the Eastman home, was the cause of a bitter quarrel between union sympathizers and those of the Confederate sympathies. The majority proved to be union-minded, however, and the flag was permitted to fly.
At 16 Mrs. Brown began teach-

ing and taught in many of the early schools in Marion county. W. S. Jack of Silverton, who is now past 70, is one of Mrs. Brown's early pupils. The first public library in this end of Maron county was established at the Eastman home at Monitor, and some of the early records were in Mrs. Brown's possession when she

Edna Eastham and James Madison Brown were married at a double wedding, the other couple being Mr. and Mrs. Jake Mc-Claine, associated with the early financial history of Silverton, Mr. Brown was a son of Mathew and Lucinda (Davis) Brown, Grandchildren Survive


