### Death Penalty in Oregon 'Extinct'

#### Upjohn Suggests Capital Punishment Be Ruled Out Legally Also

The almost total absence of capital punishment in Oregon in the last 10 years has been a preventive of criminal development that should be perpetuated through prohibition of this type of penalty, Don Upjohn told the Salem Lions club yesterday in an address based on his 34 years' experience as a capital city newspaperman.

Upjohn declared a belief that what he considered a damaging effect on youth occasioned by the repeated publication of "the ghastly details" which accompany an offense punishable by death far outweighed the value of capital punishment as a deterrent to crime.

"I believe the children have a whole lot better chance of not becoming highway robbers and murderers if the sordid details of crime are not put before them," Upjohn said in summary.

The alternative case of a criminal sentenced to life imprisonment is one that is quickly forgotten, Upjohn stated. Juries, by refusing to bring in verdicts requiring the death sentence, have since 1927 in effect amended the state constitution "without changing a word of it," the speaker added in predicting that capital punishment would be abolished in the near future.
