

Weisgerber Named on Little All-American

Weighty Team Chosen by A.P.

Willamette Places Third Time in Succession; Dick Is Praised

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—This year's "Little All-American," selected by Associated Press survey from the small-college footballers who romp the gridirons from coast to coast, presents an aggregation of talent that belies its designation.

With a line averaging 200 pounds and 6 feet 2 inches, from end to end, clearing the way for a quartet of unusually versatile ball-handlers, the team's manpower qualifies for competition in any league.

The selections represent the pick of players who annually perform only with such recognition as they get in their own ballistics, or when they tackle the big fellows. From their ranks each year professional teams gather talent that often steals the big league show.

With the exception of Norman Cooper, captain of the Howard (Ala.) team, "Little All-American" center, the selections were made from colleges with a student body well under the 1,000 mark.

Two in the West
The east fills four places on the "Little All-American" eleven. The south, middle west and far west occupy two places; the southwest one.

Lone repeater is Trinity's Mickey Hobrosky, powerhouse back of Hartford (Conn.) college. His running mates are Dick Riffe, backfielder at Albright (Pa.) college; Douglas Locke, of St. Mary's of Texas; and Dick Weisgerber, 215 pounds of ball-carrying dynamite who has picked up the "Little All-American" trail where his teammate Johnny Oravec, left off at Willamette university in Salem, Ore.

Weisgerber was on a scoring spree all season in the Pacific northwest, passing for long gains between his touchdown dashes.

Santa Clara's Pride Topples

Sam Baugh Pitches Texas Christian to Victory to Sully Record

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Behind the amazing throwing and punting of Quarterback Sammy Baugh, Texas Christian smashed to a 7-0 victory over the previously undefeated, untied University of Santa Clara today in an intercollegiate football game played before 40,000 fans.

It was a bitter blow to the greatest Santa Clara team in history, already selected to meet Louisiana State in the New Year's day Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans.

The Texans chalked up their upset victory through a second period touchdown and a third period field goal for their third annual triumph over Santa Clara.

Only in the matter of scrimmage were they outplayed but they made up for this deficiency with accurate passes, great punting and air tight defense against the aerial bombardments of the Californians.

Enthusiastic followers of Texas Christian made a rush for the goal posts immediately after the final gun. They engaged in scuffles with the police, were driven back many times but finally achieved their goal. The uprisings came tumbling down, landing on the heads of many in the dense mob.

Baugh, the Big Gun
"Slingshot" Sammy pitched, punted and ran with the ball occasionally for 60 minutes of bitterly fought battle. He was the big gun, the powder charge and the lightning spark in the terrific attack laid down by the Horned Frogs.

Behind the clever quarterbacking of this rascally field general, the Texans stopped the once proud gridiron machine built up by Santa Clara during a season which brought it seven victories, neither defeat nor tie.

Outplayed in the first period, and short-handed at the kickoff, Texas Christian turned the tide of battle in its favor with startling suddenness in the second quarter.

Glenn Roberts, 170-pound fullback, opened the way for his team's touchdown. It was Bear the close of the second period when he leaped up to snag a Santa Clara pass on his own 32.

Baugh sized up the situation and decided the aerial lanes held the answer, and shouted to his teammates "let's go."

Five plays later Texas Christian chalked up a touchdown.

"Dutch" Meyer, nephew and namesake of his coach, came in to try the extra point, but he failed.

Young Meyer redeemed himself later in a big way. With Texas Christian holding the ball on Santa Clara's 13-yard marker, Meyer, who meanwhile had played a bangup game at left end, dropped back for a field goal try.

The ball split the uprights to make the count 7 to 0. He kicked at the 22-yard line.

The balance of pigskin power is so evenly distributed nowadays that it is becoming more and more difficult for a team to chalk up an undefeated season. The day of super teams and super coaches appears to have definitely passed, as the immortal Rockne once predicted.

According to the records, the South can lay claim to a slight edge over the other sections of the country in the 1936 ratings of championship teams. Two of the three unbeaten major teams come from Dixie, while Duke, champions of the Southern Conference, had but one upset reversal marring an otherwise perfect slate.

Alabama, under the stoutish Frank Thomas, brought the Rockne system to the fore again. The Crimson Tide rolled on without a single halt, though the powerful Tennessee eleven held them to a draw.

Schmeling to Battle Champ

Title Fight Set For June 3, Long Island Bowl; All Parties Agree

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—It looks like a merry Christmas for Max Schmeling. He got his first present today in the form of a title fight with James J. Braddock.

Almost before the gallery realized what was going on, the New York state athletic commission got the two fighters together and signed them for a 15-round championship battle in Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl next June 3.

The garden and the 20th Century sporting club will be joint promoters. The contracts call for Braddock to receive 37 1/2 per cent, and Schmeling 12 1/2 per cent of the gate, but private agreements will raise these figures to 42 and 20 per cent, respectively.

In sharp contrast to Friday's bitter wrangling, today's session was a love feast. It required less than an hour to reach an agreement.

Can't Fight Louis
A clause in the neither Braddock nor Schmeling is to meet Louis before the June fight was inserted in the contracts signed today, in addition to a stipulation that the winner must post \$25,000 as a guarantee to defend his title here within six months.

The likelihood is the Schmeling Braddock winner will fight Louis in September.

Under the terms of the contract signed, both Schmeling and Braddock become free agents after the June fight and may negotiate with any promoter for future bouts.

Also, both may fight as many tune-up bouts as they desire for less than 15 rounds, except, of course, against Louis.

Braddock will box a six-round against Jack McCarthy of Boston at Buffalo, January 28.
