

### Goodrich Offers New Type Heater

#### "Boiler" Has Some Novel Features; Hotter at Higher Speeds

A new type automobile heater, the Goodrich "boiler type" hot water heater, with several features not heretofore seen in these products is announced by Mr. Walter Zosel, manager of the Goodrich-Silverton store, located at 198 South Commercial street.

Foremost among the outstanding features of this unusual heater is the exclusive hot water trap which has been made the basis of a patent application. With this device the heater operates like a hot water boiler, working on the same principle as a home heating system.

In ordinary heater construction increased car speed boosts the speed of the water pump, sucking water through the heater so fast it cannot do its heating job. The new Goodrich water trap keeps the hot water from being sucked out, and the faster the car is driven, up to 55 miles an hour, the greater the actual heat produced. It also gives quicker heat at the start.

Another feature is the patented Universal Deflector. Because of the design and mounting of this deflector, heat may be thrown in any direction.

This deluxe heater comes in two finishes, walnut brown or grey crackle. It is also equipped for the attachment of a special rubber defrosting tube to quickly defrost windshields and allow wipers to work. The defroster can be removed and either suspended under the dash or placed in the compartment or pocket of the car.

### All Five Bridges Crossed on Trip

#### Salem-Coquille Loop Made in Graham; Storm Not Noticed Inside Car

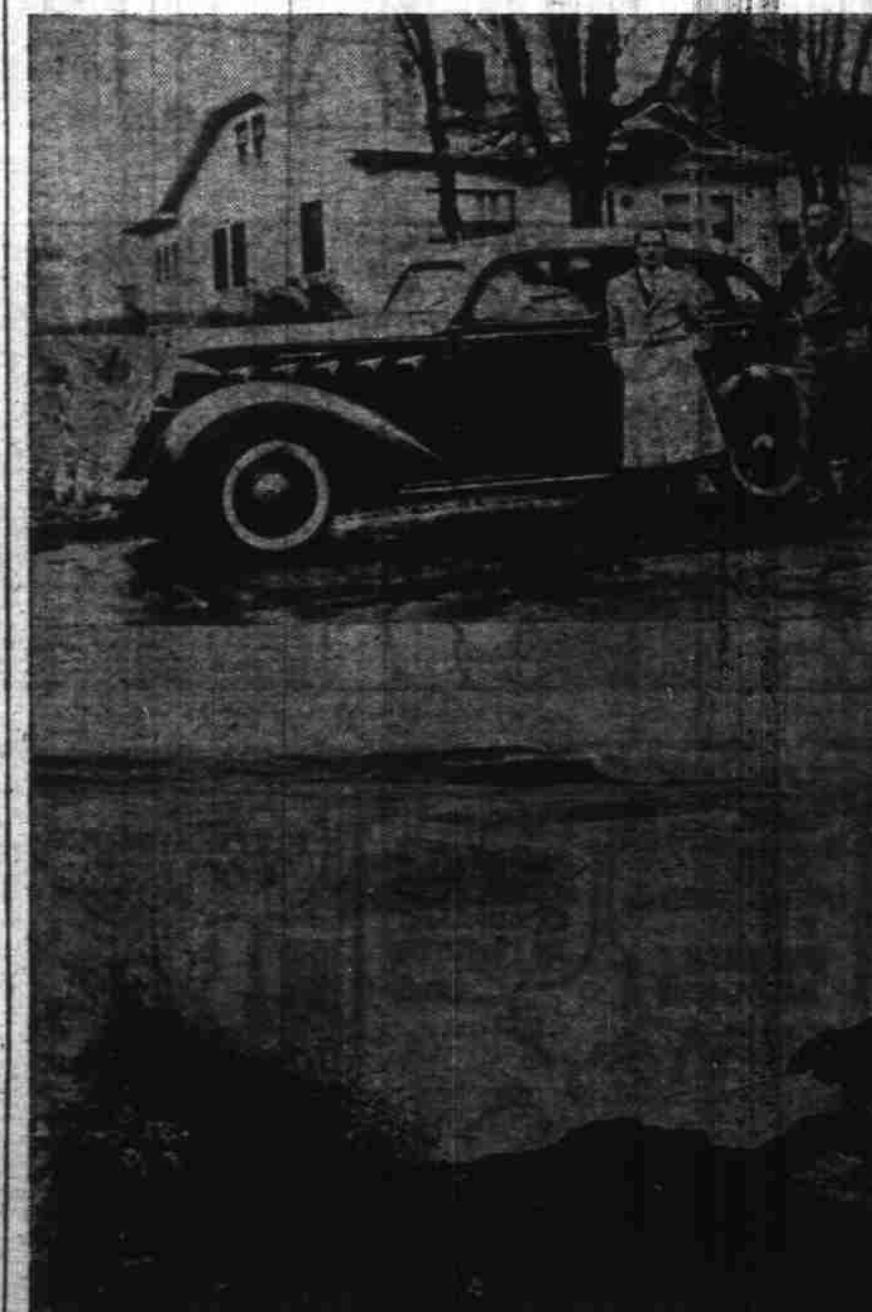
A loop trip of 438 miles which includes all five of the new Oregon coast highway bridges was described by Russell Jenkins of Loder Brothers who made the tour in a Graham Supercharger, accompanied by a Statesman representative.

Leaving Salem at noon Friday, they arrived at Coquille at 5:30 o'clock that night. The first of the bridges was that at Newport, which Mr. Jenkins pointed out, affords an excellent view of Yaquina bay and the ocean.

The day was stormy with heavy rain and strong winds which made the ocean extremely rough, although the storm outside was not noticeable inside the Graham because of its low center of gravity. Bridges at Waldport, Florence and Reedsport were crossed in succession and finally the mile-long span at Coos bay. Crossing it at night afforded an interesting view of the ships in the harbor, numerous now because of the coast strike.

The two Salem men were guests at a meeting of the Coquille Lions club that night and started home at 10 o'clock by way of Drain and Eugene. Because of the adverse weather conditions the trip was not conducive to a favorable test of gasoline consumption. The car averaged more than 16 miles to the gallon, but under normal conditions would have gone over the 21-mile mark.

### Term Exams Face Students at O.S.C.

#### Registrar's Check Shows Marion Third in Roll of Students

CORVALLIS, Dec. 12.—All classes ended yesterday and general campus activities ceased as students settled down to study for the ensuing week of examinations. By the latter part of next week the 2732 Oregon State college students will have disbanded and gone to their homes.

A check of the official record supplied by E. B. Lemon, registrar, shows that Marion county ranked third in number of students enrolled in school the fall term. Multnomah was the first with 994 students, Benton second with 622 and Marion county third with 122 registrations.

109 Salem Beavers. Salem ranked high among the cities of Marion county with a total of 109 students on the college roll. Statistics contained in the registrar's report show a decided increase among students from Oregon counties—622 over last year's figure. Twenty-one more students came from other states to school this fall, 26 states being represented over 24 last year. Six foreign countries are represented including Canada, Chile, China, Germany, Iran-Arabia, Japan and Korea, all having from one to six students enrolled mostly in graduate work. China leads the group with six, four men and two women. Fewer students came to school this fall from territorial possessions of the United States, a decrease of three being noted in the registrar's report.
