

Parting Guest Isn't Speeded

Heckford Admits Count of Defrauding Innkeeper, Sentence Delayed

When Walter Heckford was practically ready to leave the city yesterday, he found Sergeant Inspector Don Nicholson waiting for him with a warrant charging him with defrauding an innkeeper. Taken to justice court, Heckford entered a plea of guilty to a complaint charging failure to pay a \$14 board bill.

The complaint was signed by David Terhune. The case was continued until 10 o'clock today for sentence. Heckford was committed to the county jail in default of \$150 bail.

R. E. Davis was bound over to the grand jury yesterday by M. B. Hayden, justice of the peace, on a charge of larceny of a diamond ring by bailie. His bail of \$500 was not furnished and Davis was committed to jail.

Robert Edwin Keyes, 16, was fined \$5 on charges of illegal lights and improper license plates. The fines were remitted and Keyes placed on five years probation. He was certified back to the justice court from the juvenile department.

Haskin entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of assault and battery on a complaint signed by Abe E. Smith. His trial was set for December 24 and he was released on his own recognizance.

ing rapidly to the fact that the industrial warfare of the employers with the strikers is costing them millions of dollars daily.

"Rejecting Mr. Plant's suggestion we shall press more ardently than ever to organize other cities to demand immediate resumption of strike negotiations, replacement of present negotiators with new men, careful and considerate of the public. We shall insist that the force of public opinion be mobilized immediately to stop this strike."

"Incidentally Mr. Plant's ill-tempered telegram reveals quite clearly some of the difficulties which beset negotiators who attempt to arbitrate matters with such a self-righteous individual."

A group of merchants and publishers will be called together in the next few days to decide whether or not a committee shall be formed to join the Coos Bay strike.

"We will see what interest there is here in the plan and if it is favorable, probably form an organization to obtain the necessary funds," he added.

coming applications to the license committee, a move urged from the start by Aldermen W. H. Dancy and W. D. Evans.

The application of Albert Kufner, Capitol Inn, 1510 North 23rd street, was rejected. Those of Safeway Stores, Inc., and Piggy-Wiggy were held over for investigation as to their status under the disputed resolution.

Before the council decided not to act immediately on the parking ordinance, it went into committee of the whole to consider amendments extending the boundary of the proposed 30-minute parking area from Court street northward to Chemsaketa. The committee finally gave up trying to solve the problem of where 30-minute and where two-hour parking should be in force and authorized the special study. The committee, named by the mayor, consists of Goodenough, Ross Goodman and Walter Fuhrer of the traffic committee, Dancy and Van Wieder, the latter street committee chairman.

A proposal to make Chemsaketa a through thoroughfare from 14th to 24th streets was referred to the traffic committee.

Turkey Slaughter Issue Is Renewed

The turkey slaughtering business, of which the aldermen thought they had rid themselves two weeks ago by refusing to lessen restrictions on the business, returned again last night in a petition by L. A. Smith and 22 other residents of the west and of Union street against turkey dressing operations in their vicinity. The matter was handed to the health and sanitation committee.

The Workers Alliance received no favor from the council, which the organization had requested to sign a petition to Oregon congressmen for WPA wage increase, union labor wage scales, expansion in crews and recognition of the Alliance as a collective bargaining agency. The petition was returned without signature.

Hearing no protests, the council ordered the vacation of an unused portion of East Nob Hill street beginning at Park avenue and running one-half block north.

Tribute to the faithfulness of C. O. Rice as city treasurer for the past 22 years was paid by Alderman David O'Hara as the council moved to meet two short-ages aggregating \$36, which O'Hara explained, occurred through no fault of the treasurer, who retired from office on December 31. One shortage was caused by a worthless check and the other by a salary advance made by a past city recorder and never collected.

Payment to \$6160.41 on the new city reservoir, \$1100.92 on the Stayton Island wood pipeline and \$3214.25 for pipeline easements was unauthorized.

White to Return Here, Then Serve Washington Term

MONTESANO, Wash., Dec. 21.—(P)—Guy White, 53, who had successfully evaded capture since his escape from the Oregon state penitentiary in 1925, today was sentenced to 30 years in the Wala Wala penitentiary by Superior Judge William E. Campbell. White, arrested in Tacoma, pleaded guilty to theft of tools from the Standard Oil plant at Quinalt.

White first will be returned to Salem, Oregon to finish out five years of sentence remaining at the time of his escape. Then his term at Wala Wala begins. White served once at Folsom, California, and twice in the Oregon prison.

Plumbers Seeking Inspection Change

The proposal to separate plumbing inspections from the city building department and to merge them with the duties of the sanitary inspector, disclosed recently by The Statesman, reached the city council in formal form last night. This action was requested in a petition from the master and journeymen plumbers of Salem, of whom a long list signed their approval of the proposition.

The change was requested not in criticism of the building inspector, E. C. Bushnell, but because that official is pressed for time to make plumbing inspections, the petition declared, it also suggested that an experienced plumber should have this assignment.

J. H. "Jim" Patterson, a plumber, recently was canvassing for council votes for the sanitary inspectorship, long held by Batty Cooper. The job pays \$1750 a year.

Cecil Moore, 36, of Oswego, died before reaching a Salem hospital after he had fallen beneath a moving truck trailer on the Salem highway half a mile out of West Salem shortly before noon yesterday. John W. Krents, 45, and John Lucif, 55, were injured at 2:30 p. m., Sunday in a collision between cars driven by B. F. Lane, Haystack, and Jacob Zorn, Portland, on the Pacific highway two miles north of Salem, Zorn notified Salem police.

Mrs. Jessie Cole, 62, died at a local hospital Monday, Dec. 21. Born in Galba, Illinois in 1874, Mrs. Cole has been active for many years as a worker in W. C. T. U. work. She was one of the state officials in California and was associated with Carrie Nation, outstanding woman prohibitionist leader in Kansas. Here in Salem she took a strong interest in the local chapter and was also an active member of the Jason Lee church.

Surviving Mrs. Cole are her husband, E. W. Cole, two sons, D. George and Roy, and a daughter Francis. Funeral services will be held at the Jason Lee church Wednesday, December 23 at 2 p. m. Interment will be at Stayton.

Minto Hotel Has Rushing Business

Three hundred thirty meals were served and 148 men given a night's lodging during the first five days of the operation of Hotel de Minto, transient station opened in the city hall last week. Alderman Frank P. Marshall reported to the city council last night. The council authorized expenditure of up to \$150 per month for three months to maintain the station. Marshall said private contributions would pay a considerable portion of the operating expense.

The Salem chapter of the Oregon Food & Beverage Dispensers has contributed \$35 to the Hotel de Minto fund, the city recorder announced.

Board to Reject Bids on Gasoline

The state of Oregon will not enter into a contract with gasoline dealers for its 1937 supply on the basis of 15.5 cents per gallon. It was determined definitely at a meeting of the state board of control Monday.

Purchasing Agent Fry declared that gasoline for this year was purchased on the basis of 12.55 cents per gallon. He said all bids for 1937 were identical. Similar prices were quoted in Washington and California, Fry reported.

"You try and beat down the 1937 quotation," Governor Martin told Fry.

Secretary of State Snell and State Treasurer Holman agreed that quotation was out of line with the price quoted for 1935.

Fry said it was not necessary to enter into a contract immediately as the state could purchase gasoline in small lots at a price no higher than the 1937 quotation.

The state will use approximately 2,500,000 gallons of gasoline in 1937, Fry said.

Final State Teachers' Examinations Held But No Applicants Appear

DALLAS, Dec. 21.—Although the state teacher's examinations were scheduled to be given this past week in Polk county, no applicants appeared to take them, says County Superintendent Joseph Willis. After January 1, 1937, no more teachers examinations will be given in Oregon and teachers certificates may only be obtained by graduation from a standard normal school, college or university.
