CHICAGO, Dec. 24-(AP)-In the most turbulent pre-Christmas trading perhaps ever witnessed, wheat prices today up nearly 4 cents a

Critical European diplomatic conditions regarding Spain were largely responsible, together with assertions that all North American export offers of wheat today to countries overseas had been eagerly accepted. Germany in particular was reported an active buyer, and talk was current that apparently all importing countries were being forced to bid prices up to obtain breadstuff supplies.

In Winnipeg, both wheat and rye soared the extreme limit allowed for any 24-hour period, 5 cents a bushel.
