Wagon Train Dies

ALBANY, Dec. 28—Funeral services were held today for William Kertus Price, 87, who died at his home here Christmas day from the Fort Miller Funeral home. Rev. Virgil Halbig was in charge. Burial was in the Masonic cemetery.

William Kertus Price was an Oregon pioneer, crossing the plains with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nimrod Price, when he was but two years of age. He was born in Danville, Ill. January 19, 1849 and in 1861 his parents left for the west in one of the largest wagon trains of the year. Mr. Price is believed to be one of the last survivors of this train.

The early years of his life were spent in Linn county in the Price neighborhood, a few miles from Albany. Later he lived in Crook county where he engaged in farming and stock raising. While residing in Albany during his early manhood he was a member of the Albany Volunteer fire department No. 1. In the Bannock war of 1878 he served as quartermaster. In 1885 he moved to Jackson county where he remained for the next 23 years, returning to Albany in 1908 and since then had made his home here. While liv-
