

High Court Says Picketing Lawful

Unions Win in Opinions on Two Multnomah County Cases

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ceded their picketing authority for the reason that there was no labor dispute between the employers and the employees.

The opinion continued: "It is not for this court to say that the standards advocated by the defendant are so unreasonable as to indicate a purpose to injure the plaintiffs rather than to promote the interests of the labor organization."

"Under such circumstances the policy of the state, as expressed in the law, is noninterference in this conflict of interests, so long as neither side resorts to unlawful methods in seeking its objective. It may be the statute, in its application to the plaintiff employers, operates harshly, but the matter rests with the legislature and not with the court."

Intimidation Not Permitted "Crowds of union men or sympathizers should not be permitted to loiter in front of business places as such might intimidate customers. Mass picketing is unlawful. There must be no interference with employees who wish to work nor with the public desiring to transact business with the plaintiffs. The non-union man has a right to go through a picket line without being subjected to intimidation or violence."

"This court has recognized the right of peaceful picketing, but it must be such in truth and in fact. If the defendants do not practice peaceful picketing in the light of what this court has said, plaintiffs may apply for injunctive relief."

"The decrees of the lower court granting injunctive relief are reversed but the suits will not be dismissed pending the picketing. The lower court will retain jurisdiction to grant injunctive relief, in the event that picketing is not conducted in a lawful manner."

Justice Kelly, commenting on the Starr case, concluded: "Peaceful picketing has been approved by this court. It is labor's agent of defense against oppression. The acts of violence and interfering with customers, engaging them in long discussions, following them, and attempting to prevent them from leaving their automobiles to enter plaintiff's place of business, are wrongful and unjustifiable."

"If such wrongful conduct cannot be prevented by the peace officers within the time fixed by the order of the court, injunctive relief should be accorded."

French Senate Approves Big Budget; Deficit to Be Over \$250,000,000

PARIS, Dec. 30.—(Wednesday)—The French senate early today adopted the 1937 budget after a debate which evoked grave warnings of the danger of war.

The vote was 286 to 2. As adopted, the budget lists ordinary expenses as \$8,146,525,573 francs (approximately \$2,247,000,000) and receipts of \$7,891,789 francs (approximately \$1,996,500,000) and the deficit as \$254,736,784 francs (more than \$250,000,000).

British Indian Survives Hanging; May Be Holy Man And Receive Court Pardon

SHANGHAI, Dec. 29.—(P)—A fast thinking lecturer who survived a hanging today when the rope parted, may recover from his injuries to find himself venerated as a holy man by his thousands of compatriots here.

What is of more substantial benefit, he may find his life spared by British justice, which had condemned him to die for the murder of a fellow policeman.

Norblad Says He'll Not Relinquish Commission

She was an early British suffragist, publicist, philanthropist and widow of the late Sir Robert Houston.

Lady Houston became England's wealthiest woman when she inherited 5,000,000 pounds sterling (about \$25,000,000) in 1926.

She was a spectacular giver, most of her gifts going to hospitals and charities although she once presented the British government with \$12,000,000 "just on an impulse."
