Two Arraigned For Car Theft

Pair Arrested After Wild Dash Fail to Produce Bail, Still Held

William McClain and Elmer Davis, arrested by city police Wednesday night after a wild chase through the city streets, while they were driving a stolen car, yesterday entered pleas of not guilty to charges of larceny when arraigned in justice court. They stated that they wanted to consult their parents and an attorney before going to trial. Preliminary hearing was set for Monday at 10 o'clock.

Both men were put under \$750 bail which they failed to furnish and were committed to the county jail. Davis had been released from the penitentiary Wednesday morning after completing a second two year term for car theft. McClain was released August 21. He had been serving a two year sentence for burglary, not in a dwelling, before M. B. Hayden, justice of the peace, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, O. H. Stapp, Los Angeles, entered a plea of not guilty. He failed to furnish \$500 bail and was held in the county jail. Complaint against Stapp was signed by C. Edward Taylor who claims to have taken a \$40 check of the defendant for merchandise and given change for a balance. The complaint says the check was not accepted by the bank. No date for hearing of the case was set.

'36 Tax Turnover Near Two Million

Two tax turnovers from the sheriff to the county treasurer December 30 brought the total turnover for 1936 to \$1,752,251.85. County Treasurer D. G. Drager announced yesterday. The current roll was \$1,510,695.

The tax turnovers were for \$14,275 and \$20,111. The last figure was made up entirely of payments on delinquent 1932 taxes.

Landsbury Lists Education's Aims

CHICAGO, Dec. 31.—(P)—Persons who seek knowledge for knowledge's sake were called "intellectual misers" today by Dean John J. Landsbury of the University of Oregon school of music.

"Liberal education should help the student solve his problem of finding the universe and his place within it," he said in a talk at the closing session of the Music Teacher's National association convention.

"But that is not enough. Language, science and arts must be aimed to develop a wholesome emotional life for him."

He criticized music history courses which emphasize dates and names as "barren."

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Short Wave Radio Equipment Set Up

State Station Soon to Be in Operation; Three Agencies to Use

Equipment for the 1000-watt state short wave radio station here was being set up yesterday in the state highway sign shop building southeast of the state penitentiary. The exact date on which it will be placed in service is undecided as yet.

The station equipment will consist of two main transmitter units, each custom-built by a large midwestern radio manufacturer, a special communications receiver and expensive testing equipment.

Six red and white aviation warning lights recently were installed on the 130-foot aerial mast mounted near the station building.

The transmitting room will be connected with the new state police office by a door in order that orders for officers may be dispatched quickly.

Not only the state police but also the state highway and forestry departments will use station. Identical equipment is being set up at La Grande and Klamath Falls while several stations of lower power are in place at intermediate points.

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
