

Project Here Has Approval

Small Allocation Sought For This Year, Means More Later, Belief

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The project calls for improvements ultimately costing \$2,430,000 in the Willamette basin of northwestern Oregon, as follows: Willamette river, both banks, 13 to 175 miles above Portland; along the Tualatin river; on Muddy creek and Mary's river near Corvallis; on both banks of the McKenzie river east of Eugene; on the Santiam river for about 30 miles above its mouth; on the Molalla river for 30 miles about its mouth; and on the Clackamas river for 24 miles above its mouth.

Columbia and lower Willamette rivers below Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, Ore.—\$230,000, of which \$50,000 would be for new work embracing dredging of channels at St. Helens, and the remainder for regular maintenance, including \$10,000 for dredging between Vancouver and the mouth; \$200,000 for dredging in Willamette channel between its mouth and Broadway bridge, Portland; \$30,000 for repairs to existing dikes.

Clatskanie river—\$4,000 for maintenance dredging.

Multnomah channel, near St. Helens—\$6,000 for maintenance dredging and snag removal.

Yamhill River To Get Control Work

Willamette river above Portland, and Yamhill river—\$124,000 for maintenance, including dike and revetment repairs, dredging snagging and operation and care of Yamhill river lock and dam.

Willamette river at Willamette falls—\$36,000 for maintenance, including operation of locks.

General surveys and contingencies—\$25,000.

Second Portland, Ore., district: Columbia river at Bonneville, Ore.—\$6,574,000 for new work, including \$1,040,000 for purchase of fishway equipment and \$2,960,000 for railroad revisions and protection by settlement, all in connection with construction of the Bonneville dam.

The state supreme court had upheld the conviction. In foretelling language, Hughes held that while DeJonge was a member of the communist party, he was not charged with advocating criminal syndicalism, or subversion, or committing unlawful acts at the meeting or anywhere else.

The states, the decision said, are entitled to protect their institutions from being overthrown by violence, but "none of our decisions go to the length of sustaining such a curtailment of the right of free speech and assembly as the Oregon statute demands in its present application."

Recognition of Union Refused

Single Bargaining Agency Opposed; President Is Watching Closely

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istration's ace mediator—told John L. Lewis, head of the committee for industrial organization, the labor department was ready to help arrange an amicable settlement of the dispute. The U. A. W. is affiliated with the Lewis combine in its attempt to bring auto craftsmen into one big union.

Gov. Frank Murphy of Michigan, center of the car manufacturing industry, informed Homer Martin, president of the U. A. W. union, he was willing to assume the role of mediator.

4. The "strategy board" of the C.I.O. and U. A. W. considered steps to enforce demands for a general collective bargaining act with General Motors. The board has been authorized to call a general strike.

5. A General Motors official said approximately 125,000 corporation employees would be jobless by the end of the week unless a settlement were reached. He figured full suspension would cost workers \$2,000,000 a day in lost wages and the company \$230,000 a day in net profits.

6. A police lieutenant and two pickets were injured in a clash at the strike-bound Fisher Body plant in Cleveland.

7. Despite a court injunction, 500 strikers remained in two Fisher Body plants at Flint, Mich.

8. Representatives of the General Motors stalemate shut down or curtailed production at supply factories, among those laid off were 9,000 at the Delco-Remy unit at Anderson, Ind., and at the Great River Bearing company at Harrison, N. J., 700 at the Michigan Bumper corporation at Grand Rapids and 1,000 steel workers in the Youngstown, O., district.

9. At Philadelphia, 1,800 employees started a "sit-down" strike at the Electric Storage Battery company. They sought higher wages.

Train Derailed, Engineer Killed

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 5.—(P)—One man was killed and four were injured early today when the engine and tender car of a Missouri Pacific passenger train were derailed within the city limits.

Noge of the coaches left the tracks. G. A. Rothman, about 60, the engineer, was crushed to death. He lived at San Antonio.

O. J. Hinton of Austin, fireman of a switch engine, was scalded about the feet and legs when he ran to the scene. His condition was critical.

Chang Pardoned; Under Discipline

NANKING, Jan. 4.—(P)—Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, fully pardoned by the highest civil authority for his recent rebellion in northwest China, tonight remained "subject to severe military discipline to be decided by the military affairs commission," a government mandate announced.

This came a few hours after the council of state had granted a pardon cancelling the ten years' prison sentence handed down last week by the military affairs commission sitting as a court martial.

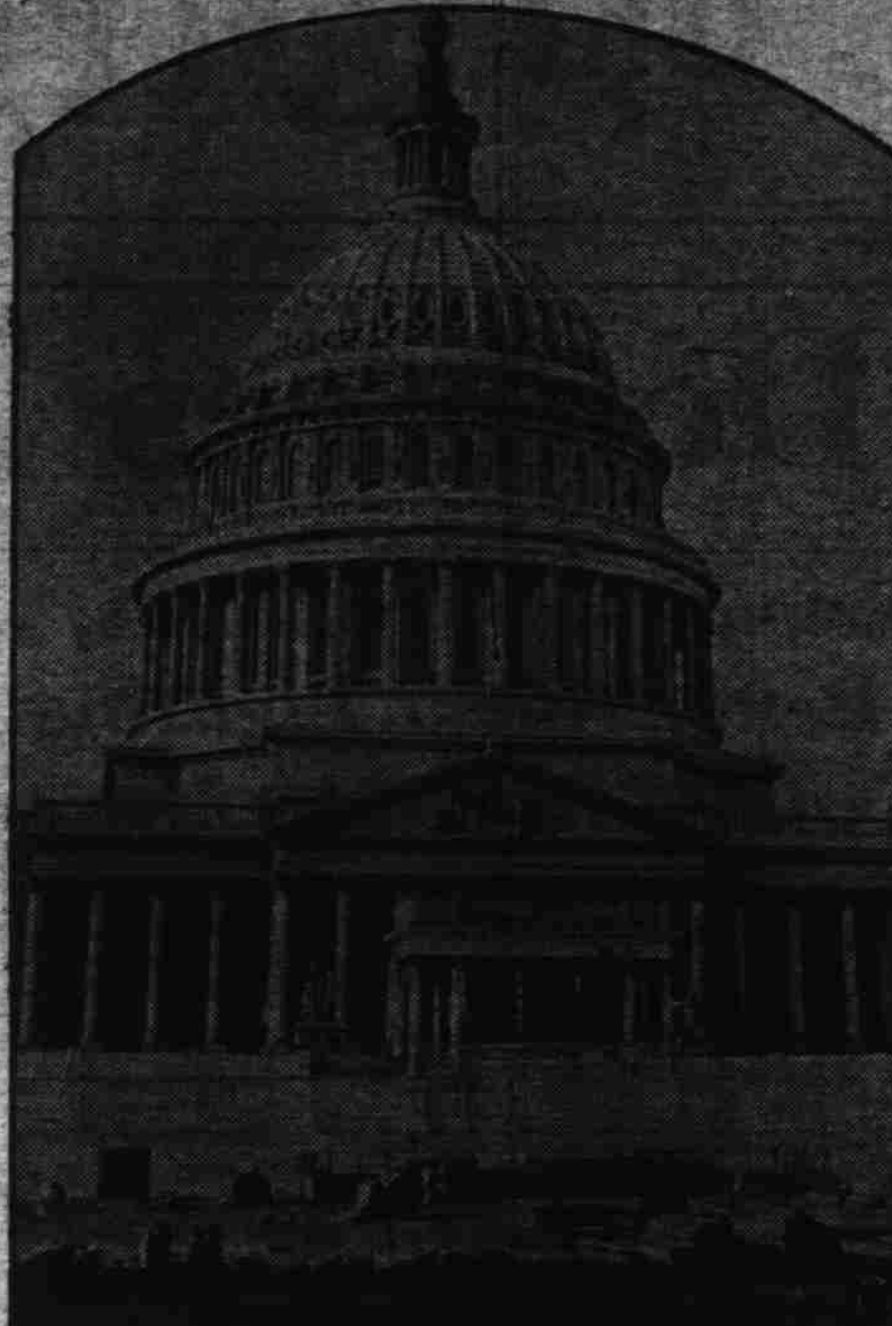
Visiting in Frisco

Small Loan Act's Validity at Issue

The state supreme court has set January 7 for hearing the appealed suit brought by Clifford C. Wronn of Portland attacking the validity of the state small loan act. This law permits loans of \$200 or less by companies charging as high as three per cent interest a month.

The circuit court for Multnomah county held the small loan act valid.

Wronn alleges that the act is unconstitutional for the reason that it violates the section prohibiting the legislature from passing special or local laws in relation to interest on money. Appellant claims the limitation of loans to \$200 is special act applying to a distinct group of small borrowers.

The brief further sets out that the law is invalid since the subject of the act is not expressed in the title.

Secondary Roads To Receive Share

PORTLAND, Jan. 4.—(P)—Secretary of Agriculture Wallace reported the apportionment of \$3,573,601 for highway projects in the three Pacific northwest states, it was learned here today.

Projects will include federal aid highways, improvement of secondary farm market roads and elimination of grade crossings.

Oregon will receive \$2,035,319, Washington \$3,171,443 and Idaho \$2,302,339.
