## Mutual Telephone Board Is Reelected

Scio Company, With 212 Patrons, Enjoys Good Year

SCIO, Jan. 4.—R. R. Borovicka, president; Ed Kalina, John Shelton and Byron Bates were re-elected Saturday by acclamation to serve as board of directors for 1937 at the annual meeting of stockholders of the Scio Mutual Telephone association. Joe Monhart, sr., was chosen to fill the vacancy left by O. A. Hall, resigned.

Dues collected for the year 1936 were \$1492.66, long distance calls \$799.97, and cash on hand \$87.76, making a total of \$2369.39 income, according to Mr. Frank Barton, Jr., secretary. Disbursements for the year just past totaled \$2247.83.

Stockholders voted to repair telephone lines within the city limits at the expense of patrons of these lines. President Borovicka urged all rural patrons to keep in repair their respective sections of line.

212 Phones Get Service  
A total of 212 phones new receive service from the Scio operator. 46 at \$8 per year within the city limits, and 166 at \$7 per year on rural lines.

Rates for 1937 will be fixed at an early meeting of the board of directors. An operator and a secretary will also be chosen by the board. Mrs. J. N. Weddle and Mrs. Frank Barton, Jr., have served in these capacities for the past several years.

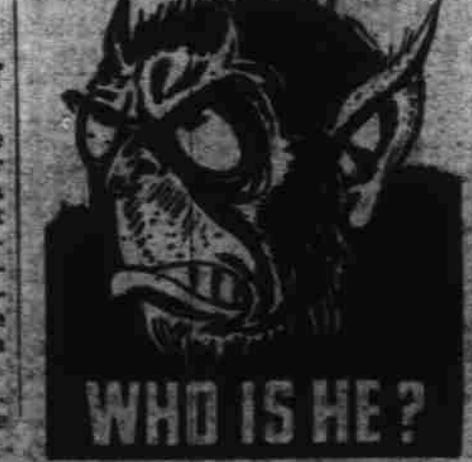

## Murdock Host For Employees

Co-op Creamery, Warehouse Makes Big Growth In 17 Years

MONMOUTH, Jan. 4.—F. E. Murdock, manager of the Monmouth Cooperative Creamery and Warehouse association for the past 17 years, was host New Year's eve at a stag dinner at the Monmouth hotel in compliment to the 15 employees of the plant. The affair was given in recognition of the loyalty, cooperation and fine service to the interests of the organization which the personnel has given.

All but two of the employees began at the bottom in the work. Clarence Grund, now foreman of the warehouse and in charge of the warehouse staff, began washing the cans, served as tester, butter-maker, and, when the grain warehouse was acquired by the cooperative company several years since, he was made foreman. Orval White, head butter-maker, has served the company since 1920 and has won many prizes in statewide butter competition.

Last Warehouse Staff  
The warehouse staff numbers eight, with Fred Cody in charge of feed mixing; Ben Friesen as official door man; Clay Bush, longest with the warehouse organization, handles grain spouts and has charge of the grain bins; Cyril Wilson has charge of the grain elevator at Independence; Leroy Wilson is general utility man; Percy Buss and Joe Smiley are warehouse assistants.

Murdock, manager of the creamery, began 17 years ago as a cream tester and bookkeeper. The plant then employed but four men. The possibility of doing a \$300,000 turnover of business annually, was undreamed of then, he says. With purchases of the warehouse business increased tremendously.

The creamery staff also includes: George Dickinson, feed man and collector; Earl Conkey, cream tester; Perry Powell, head bookkeeper; Ralph Wagers, stenographer and assistant bookkeeper; Lowell Drilling and Ivan Williams are truck drivers, making local runs, and the Allen-Silex run, respectively.

In the warehouse, 1936, has been the biggest year of business history. In the creamery, the year just passed has been one of the poorest. Less butter has been made largely because there is a lack of butter in the price of whole milk and butterfat. Also, the cow population is shorter. Fewer heifers were raised following the low price of milk products three years ago; and thousands of Oregon cows are being bought to replenish California herds.

Manager Murdock attributes much of the organization's success to the fact that everyone working there is willing to take responsibility. He says he has always asked his helpers to regard the plant as their own business, with the same relation to them as any private business; and he urged them to feel fortunate and unfortunate in being able at any time to help with any angle of the company's work irrespective of just whose "job" it might officially be. He also has always been willing to give a hearing to any employee with an idea.
