

Bearcats Seek First Win Over Beavers Since 1929 Here Tonight

Spec to Start First String

Bill Anton Back After Ankle Injured; Ike Wintermute Plays

Never a victor over Oregon State in basketball since 1929, "Spec" Keene's Willamette Bearcats will be out to win when they meet the Beavers on the Willamette floor at 8 o'clock tonight.

Willamette's big quest, practically the same team that lost to Oregon State by one point last year, has vowed to make an end to Oregon State's winning streak which has gone to eight games since Willamette won 24 to 21 in 1929.

Both teams started out with losses to independent quintets this week. While the Multnomah club was taking the measure of Willamette 32 to 23 Monday night, Union Oil was defeating the Beavers 35 to 29.

Beaver's Mike Palmberg, this year without the sterling services of Wally Palmberg, the Beavers have not had the scoring punch they boasted in the last two years. It was Palmberg who last year dropped in the deciding basket in the last minute of play to give the Beavers a win in the hardest fought game the Bearcats played all year.

"Spec" Keene will probably give his lanky first string players the first chance at the Beavers although their showing against the Multnomah club was not impressive.

With knowledge that Bill Anton's ankle injury, received Monday, was only superficial and that he will be able to play tonight, Beavers coach rose considerably. Anton, until he hurt his ankle Monday, was outpacing Multnomah's big Charley Patterson consistently and should have the edge on Earl Conkling, Beaver center.

Errol Gustin and Laurence Nunnkamp will start at the forward post for Willamette with Charley Versteeg and Walt Weaver at guard positions.

Wintermute to Start

Ike Wintermute, a former Salem high player, will start at one of the forward posts for the Beavers teamed with Art Merryman. Conkling will take the center job while Howard Lyman, brother of the Mose Lyman who aided in the Bearcat downfall on Monday night, and Elmer Kolberg will have guard assignments.

Bellfountain high, state B team champions, will meet the Willamette Bearkittens in the preliminary, starting at 7 o'clock. The giant-killers are coached by Bill Lemmon, Willamette ace of several years ago.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 5.—When Oregon State's northern division basketball entry team meets the professional series with the Willamette university hoop toppers Wednesday night on the Bearcat court, Salem fans will have another chance to see Ike Wintermute, former Salem high star, in action.

This time he will be the starting lineup, pinch-hitting for Hub Tuttle, regular forward, who injured his ankle more than a week ago, and is not likely to be in playing condition until after the opening Cougar series next week.

Stearns in Lineup

Wintermute sparked the Beavers in their last week's victory over the strong Union Oil quintet by caging four field goals and a couple free throws to give his team 10 corners and net himself high point honors.

Nello Vannelli, ex-Commerce high of Portland player, and Mal Harris, Glendale junior college transfer, are the other alternates for the injured Tuttle's post.

Probable starting lineup for the O. S. C.-Willamette tilt will be Wintermute and Art Merryman, forwards; Earl Conkling, center, and Elmer Kolberg and Sir Howard Watson Lyman, guards.

Guard Posts Not Closed to Solons

Orville Waller of Eugene is not barred from serving as a member of the state legislature because he holds a commission as a lieutenant-colonel in the Oregon national guard, attorneys declared here yesterday.

"This thing of questioning the qualifications of legislators has gone so far that it is silly," a prominent attorney in the state service remarked.

Major General White said Waller merely receives pay for drill attendance and is not on a salary.

A similar question was raised in the case of James A. Foe whose right to serve both as a circuit judge and lieutenant in the national guard was referred to the attorney general.

Attorney General Van Winkle ruled that Foe did not hold a lucrative office in the capacity of a guard lieutenant.

Train Fares Cut For Inauguration

Reduced roundtrip fares from points in California, Nevada, Oregon and Arizona to Washington, D. C., have been authorized by the Southern Pacific for the presidential inauguration January 20, it was announced today.
