Two Go to Chair, Brooklyn Murder

OSSENING, N. Y., Jan. 7.—(P)—Theodore Didonne, 31, and Joseph Bologna, 24, were sentenced to Sing Sing prison tonight for the slaying of Edwin Esposito, 32, a subway coin collector shot to death in a \$240 robbery on Sept. 2, 1935, in Brooklyn.

Didonne said, "This is where injustice triumphs."

It was his only remark; and was made while he was seated in the chair, just before the current was turned on.

Bologna said, "I want to speak to the reporters. Newspapers have made a fine mess of things, calling me 'tough Tony.' I have always been a good kid. Ship my body to Mrs. Mertz."

Later he said: "I am innocent."

Gov. Herbert H. Lehman, from the executive mansion in Albany had ordered that first three, then four, of the 12 men condemned to die for a homicide murder be executed.

Broker-Jockey Is Libel Suit Victor

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(P)—Crawford Burton, New York stock exchange trader and gentleman jockey, was awarded \$2500 damages by a federal court jury today in his libel suit against the Crowell Publishing company.

Burton charged he was subjected to ridicule as a result of the publication of a cigarette testimonial for which he posed. The jury deliberated five hours.

Coroner's Jury Unable To Fix Air Crash Cause

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—(P)—A coroner's jury of nine aviation experts decided today it was unable to fix the cause of the crash December 27 near Saugus of a San Francisco-Los Angeles airliner, killing 12 persons.

"We are unable to place responsibility for this accident on any person or persons," read the verdict.

White House Will Continue Relief

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(P)—Senator Bone of Washington state predicted today after a White House conference "the administration would see to it that adequate funds are provided to meet relief needs in all states."

The delegation voted unanimously to invite the Idaho, Oregon and Montana delegations to work jointly on problems of "common interest," particularly relief and reclamation.

The Washington delegation also voted unanimously to work as a unit for a high Grand Coulee dam.

Thin Man Sequel Opens Here Today

The mixture of comedy and drama which W. S. Van Dyke unfailingly injects into a mystery picture is evident again in his latest effort, "After the Thin Man," which starts today at the Elsinore theatre with William Powell and Myrna Loy in the starring roles.

Sequel to that cinema mystery, "The Thin Man," this was written by the same author, Dashiell Hammett.

Returning from their New York venture to their home in San Francisco, Nick and Nora, of the remembered original, crash into the mad excitement of historic Nob Hill and by way of contrast into the singular maiestrom of Chinatown. There is murder, of course.

William Powell, as the ace detective, Nick Charles, excels his performance in "The Thin Man," and Myrna Loy reaches a new high as his worried wife. The supporting cast is excellent throughout and the story is entirely up to the standard of Dashiell Hammett who ranks among America's foremost mystery writers.

campaign and seems to have the inside track; and that is another facet in the democratic falve.

The republicans are also disturbed over indications that the list of committee assignments which Bolvin is carrying in his pocket, gives them only one-fourth of the chairmanships though they constitute more than one-third of the membership and feel they are entitled to better treatment especially in view of the fact that their ranks include a greater percentage of experienced legislators.

But votes count, and the republicans, who have not yet had time to learn how to operate as an effective minority, are not likely to create much rumpus at the house caucus, for fear that any concerted drive on their part might tend to unite the loose-ly-tied democratic majority.
