\$1087 Larceny Charge Filed

Clayton Oehler Released on \$2500 Bail; Jones Trial Is Today

Complaint charging Clayton Oehler with larceny by bailer of \$1087 was filed in justice court yesterday by L. B. Barwick. Oehler was arrested in Portland on the warrant and released when he furnished \$2500 bail set by M. B. Hayden, justice of the peace. The defendant is charged with breaking his trust April 26, 1936.

Oehler is to be arraigned here Monday, January 11 at 10 o'clock. Control James Jones is to have a jury trial in justice court at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon on a charge of failing to give right-of-way to an emergency vehicle. Jones was arrested December 24 after he allegedly failed to observe a siren warning of State Officer Spaulding with the result that the officer was forced into the ditch and his car badly damaged.

In circuit court today the trial of Gottfried Paulus will be completed with the state putting on Roy Beckman as its final witness and the defense presenting their case. Paulus is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. The case is being heard by Judge L. H. McMahon without a jury.

County Clerk Fee Total Increases

Fees taken in by the county clerk's office during 1936 exceeded the 1935 receipts by \$1798, a report compiled by U. G. Boyer, county clerk, and was released yesterday. Included in the fees received is \$6290 from dog licenses, expenditures of which are handled by the dog license board. Exclusive of these fees the office took in \$17,280, segregated as follows: circuit court filings, \$5523; circuit court trial fees, \$1083; probate fees, \$3019.50; county commissioners' court fees, \$659.50; marriage licenses, \$1230; miscellaneous filing fees, \$2560.50; library fees, \$850.76. Out of the fees for circuit court filings \$1574 goes to help pay the salary of the circuit judges, and \$1120 to help pay the salary of the district attorney, the balance of their salaries being paid by the state. Out of the total \$13,244.50 goes into the general fund of the county.

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Pontiff's Illness Causes Concern at Vatican



Because of his advanced age and affliction with Bright's disease, considerable concern has been felt of late for Pope Pius XI whose infirmities have made it necessary for him to modify his customary demanding schedule. Born in Milan, the pope of a silk mill manager, Damian Achille Ratti received

his first post at the age of 22. Primarily a student and scholar, he served the church in the capacity of librarian and translator until 1915. After three years as papal nuncio at Warsaw, he returned to the office in the church in April of 1922.

State Militia Reports Personnel Increase; Camp Is Improved

The personnel of the Oregon national guard increased 194 during the past two years, according to the biennial report of the state military department filed with Governor Charles H. Martin here yesterday. Copies of the report will be placed on the desks of the lawmakers at the 1937 legislative session.

"Major activities of the military department during the past biennium centered upon training," the report said. "Drills have been held regularly and the attendance was satisfactory. During the period covered in the report members of the guard have completed extension courses of 10,501 hours."

Major General White said the training methods and standards maintained in the Oregon national guard probably were far in excess of the actual requirements by the federal government.

The report showed that construction of 17 state armories received approval of the works progress administration at Washington. The largest of these armories, slated for construction in Portland, would cost \$805,000. The two other most costly armories would be in Corvallis and Salem.
