Snell Asks Study Of \$10 Truck Fee

Consideration by the 1937 legslature of a serious situation af-fecting more than 25,000 motor rehicle owners in Oregon, has been urged by Secretary of State Snell in a letter addressed to the roads and highway committee of the senate.

Snell referred particularly to that section of the motor vehicle act requiring payment of a \$10 flat registration fee on all vehicles which have a combined weight, vehicle and toad, of 4000 pounds or less, when designed for and used for carrying, conveying or moving of any freight, property, article or thing. Snell's letter said:

"The outstanding objection to the present license fee on va-hicles of this classification is made upon the basis that such vehicle on the average do not exceed as to gross weight or miles operated that of the average passenger car, which may be licensed for an annual fee of




