



# Tax Lien Issue Is Raised Here

Hewlett Held Real Buyer Contrary to Statute Barring Officers

The question of a county officer acquiring title to tax liens was raised yesterday in plaintiff's reply to defendant's answer and cross-complaint in the circuit court case of W. J. and Marie Wilitams vs. William Powell, Leroy and Jane Doe Hewlett, The reply accompanied a motion to permit filing of the reply after the usual time had expired.

The reply contends that Hewlett, county commissioner, paid \$240 in taxes and took a county quit claim deed for Salem property in the name of William Powell, Mrs. Hewlett's father, allegedly without Powell having knowledge of the property involved The reply charges Hewlett took the property in the name of Powell to circumvent the statute which prohibits a county officer from acquiring title to tax liens.
