Expect Amount of Subsidy to Be Made Known at Tuesday Session

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 16.—The Mt. Angel Flax Growers' association will meet Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. in the Mt. Angel Cooperative Creamery hall.

This will be the first annual meeting of the association, organized here last spring. Two directors will have to be elected as the terms of Albert Roehrer and Ed Overlund are expiring.

R. C. Butts of Washington, D. C., was here checking tonnage at the local plant this week. Checking of the tonnage of the other two plants, at Springfield and Canby, followed after which an estimate of the amount of subsidy allotted per ton can be made. It is expected that by next Tuesday's meeting the amount of the subsidy will be made known. According to Mr. Butts it will be about February 1 before payments can be made. The subsidy will be paid out of an appropriation of \$250,315.00 made by the government for that purpose in an effort to get the flax industry started in Oregon.
