

Bearcats Make Best Showing, Defeat Mt. Angel Quint 42-25

Gastineau and Anton in Form

Angels Handicapped, Lack Tall Center; Lead Is Held All the Way

MT. ANGEL COLLEGE, Jan. 20.—Led by long-limbed Jerry Gastineau and Bill Anton, a swift passing, ball-handling William basketball team defeated the Mt. Angel Fighting Angels 42 to 25 here tonight.

The Bearcats, who left Coach "Spec" Keene at home with the flu, displayed their smoothest ball of the season as they swept into an early lead and were never threatened by an Angel club whose clever ball-handling was not enough to stop the Bearcats.

It was the second win of the season over the Angels for Williamette which edged out a 35 to 23 victory at Salem. The Angels were probably stronger in that game, having the services of lanky Al Haiser, regular center, who was out of tonight's contest with the flu.

Both Anton and Gastineau hit their top scoring marks since the holidays as they led the fiery Bearcats on a scoring rampage. Anton connected for five field goals and dropped in five free throws for 15 points while Gastineau got five field goals and two free throws for 12.

The Bearcats took the lead before the first minute was over when Anton doled out one of his favorite pivoting push shots from the foul line and they never headed after it. They held a 6 to 4 lead after four minutes and with Anton and Gastineau doing the heavy work led 17 to 8 with five minutes left in the half.

Far Ahead at Half
The score at half-time favored the Bearcats 22 to 12 and they made it 27 to 12 before the Angels scored in the second half.

Nolan, freshman at M.A.C. from Eugene, was again the chief trouble-maker for the Bearcats and accounted for 12 of Mt. Angel's points.

The Bearcats, with Don Brandon doubling in as a coach and player, staged their best ball-handling exhibition of the season and had all the fire and fight they showed last night at Salem against the University of Portland.

Besides putting Coach "Spec" Keene out of commission depriving Mt. Angel of its tall center, the flu also had Coach Fred Galer of Mt. Angel heavily swathed in extra shirts, underwear and overcoats. Galer got out of bed just before the game to handle his team.

About 200 spectators watched the contest from the bleachers of the new Mt. Angel gymnasium. Perry of the Mt. Angel Preps vanquished Gervais high 19 to 15 in a preliminary game. The Preps led 14 to 7 at half-time.

BEAUPRE LOSES TO FINNS' WHITE HOPE
NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Gunnar Barlund, slugging importation from Finland, won his fourth straight fight in the white hope field trials at the Hippodrome tonight by winning a decision over Tom Beaupre, Dallas heavyweight, in 10 rounds.

Beaupre, who came to New York with a record of only one defeat in 84 professional starts, was badly beaten by the glassy-eyed Finn, who won seven of the 10 rounds. The Texan weighed 193 to Barlund's 196.

Barlund, the aggressor during the fight that drew boos from the small crowd of 4,500, battered Beaupre's nose to a bleeding mass and kept hammering at the vulnerable target throughout.

The only round Beaupre won was the second and that was by a foul.

Season Series All Square As Oregon Loses 42-28; Nelson Is Top Scorer

PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Washington State college seized a commanding early lead and turned the basketball tables on the rangy University of Oregon quintet here tonight, 42 to 28.

The winners led at halftime, 17-8. The contest ended the four-game 1937 series between the schools at two apiece, Oregon won here last night, 40 to 38.

The Cougars took the play away from the towering Oregonians and shattered the zone defense which proved so effective last night. Oregon switched to man-for-man defense after 10 minutes but was unable to check the rampaging Cougars.

W. S. C. continued its spectacular pace in the second half to pull at one time into a 35-14 lead on a run of 15 points while the Webfoots were scoreless.

Capt. Bill Dahlitz was the spark-plug of the Cougar play, while Ivar Nelson, center, was high scorer at 10 points. The burst carried Nelson back into the northern division coast conference scoring lead, two points ahead of Dave Stogard of Oregon, forward, who had taken the lead last night. They were even at 37 apiece at the opening of the two-game series.

between Portsmouth, Ohio, and Louisville and for three or four weeks below Louisville.

Heavy snow drifted over roads in Minnesota and the Dakotas. Snow reached depth of two inches in New York. Rain trickled off silk hats at President Roosevelt's inauguration at Washington. A sleet storm left 200 square miles of ice in Chicago but it turned to sleet in a subsequent drizzle. Air lines here were fog-bound.

Flood waters swashed in eight states—Ohio, Indiana, Missouri, Illinois, Arkansas, Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina. Hundreds joined in the exodus from bottomlands along the Ohio and Wabash in Illinois and Indiana.

Farmers and sharecroppers joined 800 workmen seeking to save levees along the St. Francis and Black rivers in southeastern Missouri and northeastern Arkansas.

Backwater from the Mississippi spread over lowlands in western Tennessee.

Flu Thwarts Meet Of Capitol Board

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Influenza postponed the regular meeting of the capitol reconstruction commission here today and only informal discussion of the statehouse's decorative features was held.

Illness prevented assembling a quorum. Chairman J. A. McLean of Eugene called another meeting for Tuesday.

The five commissioners who attended the session expressed general approval of the inclusion of approximately \$65,000 of alternate suggestions in the contract signed with Ross B. Hammond, Portland builder.

Commissioner Robert W. Sawyer of Bend was instructed to confer with Dr. H. E. Alexander of Scripps College, California, and the history and English departments at the Oregon high schools on appropriate capitol building inscriptions and lettering.

Hammond contended the responsibility for decorative work belonged to the artists rather than the contractor.

Those attending the meeting in addition to McLean and Sawyer were Dr. H. H. Olinger, Salem, H. H. Lake, Portland, and Dr. Ernest C. Dalton of St. Helens.

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
