

Herman H. Annen Dies, Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 21.—Funeral services for Herman H. Annen, 85, who died at the home of his son Henry early Monday morning, were held from St. Mary's Catholic church Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. Father Lide-phonse read the requiem high mass and Rev. Father Placidus presided at the organ and gave the funeral sermon. The graveside services were held by Father Alcun.

Pallbearers were: Cletus Butsch, J. A. Kaiser, John T. Baum, Emil Zach, Jos. Sprauer, R. J. Berning. Mr. Annen was born in Metton, Germany, April 11, 1852 and was married there to Anna Margaret Brand in 1877. They came to the United States in 1882 and settled in Beardsley,

Miss. In September 1898 they moved to Mt. Angel, where they lived ever since.

His first wife, the mother of his six children, died October 15, 1916, and his oldest son, Herman Jr., died in 1927. Those surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elisabeth Keller-Annen; five children, Elster M. Ida, teacher at Mt. Angel Normal school, Mrs. Mary Nathman of Salem, Henry and William Annen and Mrs. Margaret Schaffer for all of Mt. Angel; and 17 grandchildren.
