

Pile-Driver Theft Charges Are Filed

William J. Haskins Taken Into Custody; Denial Posted in Court

Already under indictment on two other counts, one of grand larceny and one of receiving stolen property, William J. Haskins, operator of a local junk yard, was arrested by state police yesterday on a charge of stealing a 1700 pound pile-driver from the Bush school property.

Haskins posted \$100 cash bail in justice court yesterday after pleading not guilty to the charge. Preliminary hearing was set for January 29 at 2 p. m.

The pile driver, recovered from Haskins' junk yard, 2096 Turner road, was the property of Rufus E. Boatwright, 869 South 20th, and had been used in the construction of the Bush school.

Haskins, who has served a sentence in the state penitentiary on a larceny count from Lane county, is under indictment in Lane county for the alleged theft of machinery from the Butler Haskins and door company of Albany and has posted bail on a Marion county charge of receiving stolen property.

Stanley Peterson Takes Bank Tasks

ALBANY, Jan. 21. — Stanley Peterson has been elected assistant cashier of the Bank of Albany to succeed Wallace Burkhardt. Burkhardt recently resigned to take a position in a Portland bank.

All other officers of the bank were reelected. T. B. Williamson is president; E. B. Williamson and M. D. McPherson, vice presidents; and C. E. Williamson, cashier. These men, with the addition of Fred Forster, form the board of directors.

Among other business to come up at the meeting was the ordering of five per cent dividend to be paid on the \$100 par value stock.

The bank which opened for business on Oct. 12, 1932, shows a healthy condition according to the cashier. The December 31 report of the bank showed resources of \$1,100,028.40. The bank carries a capital account of \$50,000; a surplus of \$15,000 and undivided profits of \$24,928.72. Deposits totalled \$1,006,225.68, a gain of \$163,907.42 over deposits on hand Dec. 31, 1932.

Rebecca B. Small Funeral Saturday

ALBANY, Jan. 21. — Mrs. Rebecca Beckner (Small), 57, died at her home in North Albany Tuesday afternoon. Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Fortmiller funeral home. Rev. T. D. Yarnes will have charge of the service. Burial will be in Riverside cemetery.

Rebecca Beckner was born April 5, 1849, in Rush county, Ind. On Nov. 8, 1866, she was married to William Penn Small at Carthage, Ind. Previous to coming to Oregon the deceased had lived in Kansas for a time. She had been a resident of Oregon for 56 years. Mr. Small died Jan. 21, 1927, in North Albany. Mrs. Small was a member of the Methodist church of Albany, and of the Ladies of the G. A. R.

Surviving are three sons, Herbert Small, Ephraim Small and Burley Small, all of Albany. She is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Hanna Havens of Indiana, seven grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

534 Arrested For Traffic Violations

There were 534 arrests in the traffic division of the state police department during December, 1932. Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police reported Thursday.

Twenty-six arrests were drunk driving and 41 for reckless operation of vehicles. Fines aggregated \$575.40.

Arrests in the general law enforcement division totalled 250 with fines aggregating \$3044.10. Twelve of these arrested were for burglary and 41 for drunkenness. Eleven persons arrested by the state police in this division were held for other law enforcement agencies.

There were 98 arrests in the commercial fisheries division with fines of \$3352.05.

The state troopers investigated 239 complaints during the month of which 129 were classified as cleared.

Harold B. Tronson Victim of Stroke

Paper Converting Company Official Has Active Career, Recalled

Funeral services for Harold B. Tronson, 73, prominent Salem paper company official, who passed suddenly yesterday after a heart attack, had not been set up to last night, the W. T. Rigdon Mortuary, in charge of the body, announced last night.

Tronson, credited with having done much toward putting Oregon apples on the map, had been office manager of the Western Paper Converting company here for ten years. He was a bachelor, and only known relatives are a sister in England and a cousin in Canada.

A slight paralytic stroke suffered several months ago and a knee injury incurred in a fall ten days ago, may have been factors in connection with the sudden heart attack. Death occurred at his home, 1149 Court street, where he had been confined since injuring his knee.

Fought Indians

Member of an aristocratic English family and first cousin of the late Earl of Balfour, Tronson was an early settler in Canada. Chief of his activities there was in aiding quell the Red Indian rebellion.

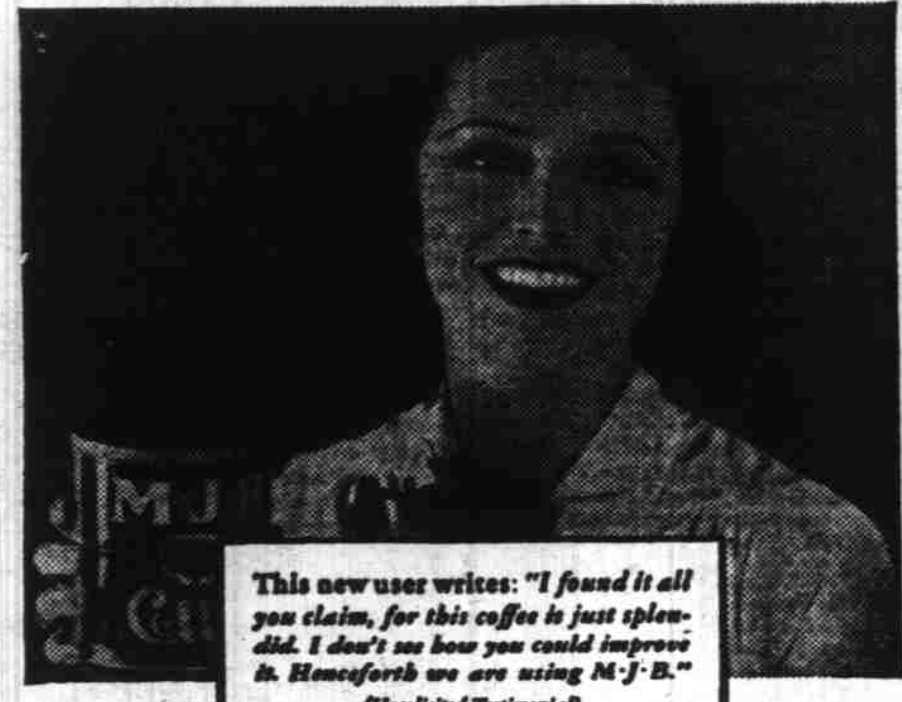
He was associated with the Balfour-Guthrie company in Portland for many years after moving to the United States, but left that organization to form the Neville bag company. He made many friends while selling burlap to hop growers in this district.

Tronson and young Guthrie later went to Medford, where they planted apple orchards, playing an important part in publicizing and developing that industry which has helped make Oregon famous the world over.

Some 14 years ago he left the apple country to become associated with the Portland Railway Light and Power company, now the Portland General Electric company, here in Salem. His shift knee injury incurred in a fall ten days ago, may have been a strong developing factor, followed four years later.
