

### Mileage Prorate Of Funds Opposed

#### Giving up 35 Per Cent of Gas Tax Funds Would Be Unwise, Claim

Pro-rating of 35 per cent of the gasoline tax funds to counties on a mileage basis would end all construction on secondary highways and reduce the amount of federal funds allocated to Oregon by as much as \$1,000,000, according to a statistical table released by the highway commission Saturday in connection with this legislative proposal.

The commission declared adoption of such a program would mean that \$3,314,500 would be distributed to the counties annually instead of the present fixed amount of \$1,600,000. The commission had announced Friday its approval of a \$400,000 increase, thus putting the probable allocation to counties next year at \$2,000,000.

Multnomah To Lose  
Harney county, under the mileage basis, would receive \$194,146.64, as compared to \$8,628.75 received at the present.

Multnomah county, on the other hand, would drop from \$603,562.88 to \$61,678.23.

Marion county would enjoy a slight increase, from \$103,394.67 to \$117,377.71 but this increase would not be as large as under the present system of county allocations.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 23.—Application and interpretation of the 1936 agricultural conservation program as it applies to the state of Oregon will be the principal business of state AAA committeemen, members of the technical committee and the central extension staff when they meet with C. C. Conser, assistant to George E. Farrell, western AAA director, on the college campus Monday and Tuesday.

### Meyers Chairman For Flood Relief

Judge George Rosman as chairman of the Marion county Red Cross chapter yesterday announced the appointment of Milton L. Meyers as chairman of a committee to raise the county's \$800 quota in the national flood disaster fund being set up to aid stricken families in the central states. Meyers immediately announced that contributions would be received at any of the three banks and at the Red Cross offices, 147 North Commercial street.

The Red Cross has set \$2,000,000 as its goal for this work, according to a telegram received yesterday from Cary T. Grayson, national chairman. The telegram declared 270,000 men, women and children had been driven from their homes by flood waters and were depending upon the Red Cross for emergency food, shelter, bedding, medical attention and warm clothing.
