

Storm Clouds Gather Over House, Rulings Result in Dispute

Pension Bills Arouse Furor

Referring to Committees Draws Protest; Acts Of Speaker Hit

The house of representatives yesterday experienced one of the stormiest sessions it has held since the opening of the present assembly. The battle on the floor which waxed warm for a short time brought out clearly that the surface smoothness which has characterized the session to date is likely to break at any moment.

The worst flurry came over the pension and taxation measures. Speaker Harry Bolvin, in assigning the bills to committees, split the measures, sending one to the Olen committee of assessment and taxation and referring the gross income bill to the taxation and revenue group.

When Olen asked that the tax measure be re-referred to his committee, Speaker Bolvin ruled him out of order and declared that an appeal from the ruling of the chair must be taken. Representative Allen joined in the appeal.

"Railroading" Charged

Representative Barnes, speaking on the appeal, declared that legislation was being railroaded and cited the closing of debate on the lieutenant governor bill. Representative Fuhrer, who moved the previous question, closing the debate on that measure, objected, saying that he could explain the move, but no explanation was given.

Barnes also accused members of filing the procedure of the house in an effort to kill the pension tax measure. Representative Olen later tried to withdraw his appeal but Representative Allen refused to withdraw his second. The vote, taken vocally, was close but was ruled to be in favor of sustaining the speaker's assignment of the bill.

Representative Walter Norblad precipitated another close vote when he moved that the lieutenant governor bill which passed the house Thursday by a 32 to 27 vote, be withdrawn from the senate. Norblad declared that some members did not know how they were voting when they passed the measure. The motion to recall lost by a 33 to 24 vote according to the official record.

"Vote Recorded" Wrongly

The lieutenant governor measure seems to have a jinx in the house. Yesterday, two members, recorded as voting "no" on the recall, declared that they had voted "aye." Wednesday the record was confused when Representative Dawson asked to have his vote changed on the same measure but the request was refused.

The session started off yesterday morning in ill humor when members refused to dispose with the reading of the previous day's session. W. F. Drager, chief clerk, read the complete record. The reading took almost half an hour.

One house measure and three senate bills were passed during the day. The house provided that the superintendent of public instruction may issue special teachers' certificates in certain cases. Two of the senate bills related to the consolidation of school districts and the other was a validating act of some Seaside refunding bonds.

the constitution and one seeking the establishment of a national cemetery in Oregon.

Want Larger Board

A measure sure to excite much debate should it reach the floor of the house was introduced yesterday by Representatives Roth and Barnes for an increase in the membership of the liquor commission from three to five members. The committee on mining sponsored the governor's mining bill creating a state mining department, with an appropriation of \$50,000 for its operation.

Eight other bills received first reading in the house during the afternoon. They were measures: To outline salaries of county commissioners of Deschutes county; to appropriate \$6000 for the maintenance of the Medford experimental station; to raise the salary of county judge in Jackson county; to create a veterans memorial commission, appropriating \$5000 for the salary of director and stenographer of the commission; to make September 17, 1937 (150th anniversary of the national constitution) a legal holiday; to restore civil rights to discharged felons; to change the boundaries of the Canyon Creek game refuge; and, to regulate hunting therein.

Introduced at the morning session yesterday was a bill by Representative Norton providing for the creation of consumers' cooperative membership of which would be confined to housekeepers and owners of eating and lodging houses. It is similar to a New York co-operative act and will permit the purchase of commodities at reduced prices.

Other measures provided for the division of counties in the election of state senators and representatives, an increase of circuit judge filing fees from \$50 to \$100, transfer of \$25,000 from the World War sinking fund to the revolving fund, authorization for school boards to close schools by vote of the electors; a \$10,000 appropriation for soil investigations by the state college and two measures increasing county salaries in Columbia and Sherman counties.

Session Radio Review Given By Statesman

Each night promptly at 9 o'clock while the legislature is in session, The Statesman is presenting over radio station KSLM a summary of the day's activities in the two houses. These broadcasts will not be presented Saturday nights unless there are sessions of the legislature on Saturday.

More Fish Bills Coming in Today

Two measures to regulate fishing on the lower Siuslaw river are to be introduced in the lower house of the Oregon legislature today by the joint senate and house Lane county delegation.

Limiting of clam and oyster digging on the Siuslaw river and Bay to three dozen for personal use and 15 dozen for commercial sale was provided in one of these measures. The second bill provided for fishing with set-nets of a mesh not less than five and one-half inches and not more than six and one-half inches on the Siuslaw up as far as Martin creek for salmon. Fishing under slough for salmon. Fishing under these provisions would be limited to the period between May 15 and July 1.

These measures were framed by a delegation headed by Earl Hill of Cushman, and were said to have the united support of both sportsmen and commercial fishermen in western Lane county.

Another measure under consideration for introduction into the legislature would create a game reserve for all wild life, excepting fish, which would extend from the south bank of the Siuslaw river to the north bank of the Umpqua, and from the Pacific ocean to the Coos Bay railroad.

Retirement Bill Hearing Delayed

Proponents and opponents of house bill 65, by Representative Norton, which will make retirement of teachers at age 65 compulsory, have requested that a public hearing on the measure scheduled for Monday night be postponed.

The request has been made because of the illness of several members of the school board and of the teacher groups. Representative Norton said that the hearing will probably be put over for their convenience.

Power Memorial Hearing Planned

Set Wednesday; Jones and Hosch File in House; Policy Outlined

As forecast in The Statesman Thursday, the grange joint memorial to congress on the power question was introduced in the house Thursday bearing the names of Representatives J. F. Hosch of Deschutes county and Ronald Jones of Marion.

The power memorial refers not only to Bonneville but to all federal plants. The grange committee, however, declared itself in favor of considering Bonneville as a separate unit for fixing of power costs.

Points in the power memorial included:

1. Permanent government ownership of dams now owned or under construction or contemplation.
2. Construction of transmission lines by the government.
3. Wholesale distribution to cities, towns, co-operative associations and other public agencies at minimum rates necessary to amortize that part of the investment charged to power in 40 or 50 years.
4. Distribution to the ultimate consumers on yardstick rates, or rates based on cost of the purchase and distribution of power.
5. Opposition to the pooling of public power or transmission facilities with private power and transmission facilities except on short term contracts.
6. Rural electrification on a national scale.
7. Adoption of the allotment plan or loan and grant plan, now used to supply funds (through the PWA) to municipalities, for the extension of rural electrification.

The utilities committee of the house of representatives set Wednesday night for a public hearing on the memorial.

The memorial also contains provisions for the creation of consumers' cooperative corporations, limits membership to those engaged in agriculture, keeping or conducting eating or lodging places. Designed to permit cooperative purchase of commodities and sale to its members.

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H. B. 121, by Hosch—Sets maximum for salaries of county commissioners of Deschutes county.

H. B. 122, by Kimberling—To allow bow and arrow hunting in Canyon Creek game refuge.

H. B. 123, by McAllister, Stephenson and Sen. Dunn—Appropriates \$6000 for maintenance of the Medford experimental station.

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H. B. 130, by McAllister, Stephenson and Sen. Dunn—Raises salary of county judge, Jackson county.

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Bandon Relief Voted, Senate

Pick-Up Truck License Fee Reduction Passed; Two Labor Bills Filed

The senate yesterday passed the first of the bills for the relief of Bandon. The bill by Carter and others for the remission of state taxes in Bandon for seven years received a unanimous vote. The amount involved was said to be not over \$600 annually. Similar relief was extended to Astoria after its fire.

The McKay bill reducing from \$10 to \$5 the license fee for pick-up trucks was passed. It affects cars and trucks with a combined weight of not over 4000 pounds.

When the resolution seeking creating of the office of lieutenant governor came over from the house it was referred to the committee on resolutions. It proposes to submit a constitutional amendment to the people.

Two Labor Bills

Among senate bills introduced today were two by Sen. Duncan of Burns dealing with labor relations. One bill defines the term "labor dispute" and provides against picketing unless there is an actual bona-fide labor controversy between employer and employee at the place picketing. Another bill calls for a mission of labor disputes to the state board of conciliation and requires 30 days elapse before picketing may start, pending settlement of the dispute.

Senator Best introduced a bill for the state's participation in the Golden Gate exposition, providing for a non-salaried commission of five appointed by the governor, and making an appropriation of \$60,000 for a state exhibit.

A bill by Sen. Eays would give from the proceeds of the racing commission sums not exceeding \$10,000 to the Portland Rose festival, \$5,000 to the Astoria Regatta, and \$2,500 to the Lakeview Roundup and Redmond potato show.

Bills for tuberculosis hospital buildings were presented by Stadelman for a new building at the Dalles, with appropriation of \$54,450, another by Angell for a tuberculosis hospital in Portland with an appropriation of \$200,000.

New Milk Bill Looms

Senator Lessard, whose bill for repeal of the milk control law was repealed, will present today a measure limiting the price-fixing powers of the board to the producer's price only, allowing distributors free competition.

A joint ways and means committee bill was presented calling for an appropriation of \$4500 for eradicating injurious and disease-carrying rodents.

House Bills

H. B. 119, by Norton (by request)—Provides for creation of consumers' cooperative corporations. Limits membership to those engaged in agriculture, keeping or conducting eating or lodging places. Designed to permit cooperative purchase of commodities and sale to its members.

H. B. 120, by Feland and French—Permits transfer of \$25,000 from the world war veterans sinking fund to the revolving fund.

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
