STAYTON, Jan. 29.—In accord with other sections of the country, Stayton residents this week are answering the appeal of the Red Cross through radio, press and requests of local leaders, for funds to care for victims of the flood areas in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys.

Henry J. Eiler Funeral Is Held

AURORA, Jan. 29.—Funeral services for Henry J. Eiler, 63, who died Tuesday morning at the old family home on the banks of the Willamette river at Aurora, were held at 10:30 a. m. Thursday at the Miller funeral chapel.

From 1907 to 1911 Eilers was the foremost piano dealer in the United States, having at one time a chain of 60 stores covering the Pacific coast and also one in Detroit, Mich. Whole train loads of pianos were bought by the company which reportedly did a million dollars a year business. The company had its own warehouse at 15th and Pettygrove streets, while in Portland Eiler was a chamber of commerce worker and a prominent Rosarian.

He was born in Germany in 1871, and had never married. He leaves three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Lanther of Portland, Mrs. Caroline Tomlin, Mrs. Paul Pellatz and Gerd Eiler of Aurora.

A number of articles of furniture and some clothes were saved by quick work. The fruit room and tank house were also saved by the bucket brigade formed by the Atwoods and several neighbors.

Mr. and Mrs. Atwood and three children are with friends until the old house on the premises can be put in condition for their occupancy. The house was on the farm belonging to Earl Smith of Albany. The Atwoods have lived there 15 months.

Stayton Pastor to Discuss Juvenile Delinquency and to Present Remedy

STAYTON, Jan. 29.—Rev. Don Hucklebee is going to use as his sermon subject Sunday morning for the Methodist church services "Juvenile Delinquency and the Community Responsibility." All residents of the community and leaders in the various organizations of the district have been asked to attend the service.

Apparent delinquency of many of the children of the community, which is being condoned by parents and civic leaders, calls for serious consideration and immediate action, Rev. Hucklebee said today. The situation which has existed in Stayton for several years, is growing rapidly worse, he declared. "I firmly believe that we are being challenged to take a definite stand in the matter and this is necessary if the conditions are to be corrected."

Rev. Hucklebee will suggest Sunday morning that a council, composed of representatives of all religious, educational and civic organizations be formed to outline a program for development of child life in Stayton.

Steelhammer Rites At 2 p.m. Sunday

Well-Known Silverton Man Is Called; Served as Party Head

SILVERTON, Jan. 29.—A. G. Steelhammer, a resident of Silverton since 1892 and for many years chairman of the Marion county republican committee, died here at 5:30 o'clock this morning. He was 90 years old January 6.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Ekman funeral home here, with Rev. F. Lester Fields officiating. Pallbearers will be George Hubbs, Dr. M. E. DeGuire, Dr. A. W. Simmons, Bert Terry and C. B. Anderson, all of Silverton, and Tad Shelton of Salem.

Born in Sweden.

Mr. Steelhammer was born in Carlstad, Sweden, January 5, 1847, and came to America in 1861, settling at New Boston, Illinois. He later went to Wilona, Minn., where he was married January 6, 1871, to Christine Anderson. They later went to North Dakota and in 1882 came to Silverton. Mrs. Steelhammer died here February 20, 1936. Three of their nine children are deceased, Carl, Rudolph and Oscar.

Mr. Steelhammer was a member of the state legislature in 1911.

Surviving children are John S. and George of Silverton, Mrs. A. P. Allen and Arthur of San Francisco, Dr. H. W. of Portland and Louis R. of San Mateo, Calif. Surviving also are 15 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Additional Lands Bought Near Falls

SILVER FALLS, Jan. 29.—Nearly 250 men employed under the resettlement project in this district have been unable to work for three weeks because of weather conditions. The work, which includes forest improvements, relieving fire hazards, preparations for a future addition to the state park, will be resumed as soon as possible.

Latest purchases under this project are the entire property of Mrs. L. T. Bent, Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Mulliken, and several acres of the Sam Matheny property. Mr. and Mrs. Mulliken have bought a small piece of property in Silverton on Second street where they are now residing. Mrs. Bent will reside on her property for a short time.

ALBANY, Jan. 29.—Plans for the institution of the Albany aerie, fraternal order of Eagles, were made at the meeting Wednesday evening and the date has been set for February 11. Officers of the Corvallis Aerie will be in charge of the initiation that night, assisted by the degree team of the Eugene Aerie.

Heavy Snowfall Reported In Section About Liberty

LIBERTY, Jan. 29.—From four to six inches of snow was on the ground here Friday morning and on the hills it was much deeper. One Prospect way the snow has always been deeper than on the more level ground hereabouts. During the repeated snows and thaws the snow has remained longer in the hilly sections and some of the surrounding hills were white for days when nearby places were brown and muddy.

PIONEER, Jan. 29.—Nearly two feet of snow lays on the ground here this morning and travel is virtually impossible. School was closed for the last two days of the week due to the influenza and bad weather.

Lloyds Given Prison Term

3rd Brother Serving Time and Fourth Hanged, Records Show

DALLAS, Jan. 29.—Scarcely more than 24 hours after attempted robbery of Guy's Hardware store here, justice had been meted out to Clarence Lloyd and Tom Lloyd, brothers. The men, appearing before Judge Arlie J. Walker in circuit court here this morning, were sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary.

The attempted robbery took place about 2 a. m. Thursday. The men were arrested when Night Officer Dave Warren became suspicious of the actions of the men. Sheriff Hooker obtained a confession from them yesterday afternoon.

Confess Yamhill Crime.

The Lloyds were slated to be taken to McMinnville this afternoon to answer charges in connection with a \$300 robbery of merchandise in Yamhill county. They confessed to this robbery before Sheriff George Manning of Yamhill and Lieutenant Groatell of the state police, these officers visiting them while they were in jail here. Deputy Sheriff Williams states it is likely some of the merchandise taken in Yamhill county will be recovered.

Tom Lloyd has a wife and infant child living in Portland.

When the Lloyd brothers, sentenced in Dallas, were dressed in at the state prison here late yesterday, they joined their brother George, who came up in October, 1934, to serve seven years on a larceny count.

Incarceration of Clarence and Tom Lloyd brings two sets of three-brother teams in prison here, the three D'Autremont brothers being in prison for life for hold-up of a mail train in the Siskiyou and murder of its crew 12 years ago.

One Lloyd Hanged. In fact, the Lloyd menfolk have gone the D'Autremont trio one better as far as prison records go—for Clarence, Tom and George's brother, W. R. Lloyd, was hanged in prison here November 30, 1935, for murder of Clint Baun, Independence taxi driver, near Buena Vista in September of that year.

Both Tom and Clarence have served prison time previously. Tom was received from Lane county in July, 1925, for burglary, with a year's sentence over him. Clarence was sentenced to a year from Crook county, the charge being larceny in a dwelling.

Lewis J. Flint Is Called to Beyond

CORVALLIS, Jan. 29.—(P)—Lewis J. Flint, 45, prominent farmer at Lewisburg near here, died of pneumonia Wednesday after a brief illness of several days. He was recently elected master of the Mountain View grange.

Funeral services will be held here Saturday afternoon. Interment will follow at Junction City. Flint, born at Irving, Ore., is survived by his widow, who is also ill of pneumonia. Other surviving relatives include two sons, a brother, Gus Flint of Junction City, and two sisters, Mrs. Mildred Smith, Harrisburg, and Mrs. Helen Kinzel, Antioch, Wash.

Sadie Elizabeth Yost Funeral Services Held At Church in Sublimity

STAYTON, Jan. 29.—Funeral services were held Thursday morning from the Sublimity Catholic church for Sadie Elizabeth Yost, 74, who died Monday. Father Scherbring officiated.

Mrs. Yost was born in Germany, December 15, 1862. She came to the United States 65 years ago and in 1912 moved to Sublimity where she has resided since.

She is survived by seven children, Christine Bendt of Portland; Reine Eiler of Sublimity; Sadie Lyons of Blackley; Elizabeth Hemery of Reno; Fred Yost of Sublimity; Frank Yost of Portland and George Yost of Pratum.

Olson Funeral Service Will Be Held Monday At Pearson's, Portland

KEIZER, Jan. 29.—Funeral services for August Olson, Keizer resident who died in Portland Wednesday, will be held Monday at 2 o'clock at Pearson's funeral church, 301 N. E. Knott street at Union avenue. Interment will be in Rose City cemetery.

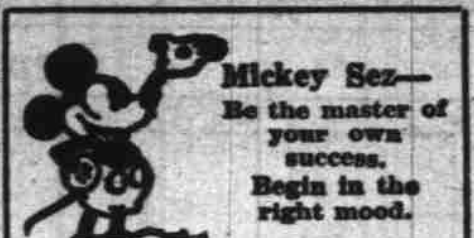
Hubbard Asks Support, Red Cross Relief Fund

Albany People in Automobile Wreck

ALBANY, Jan. 29.—Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hofflich, prominent citizens of Albany, are in the Albany general hospital as the result of an automobile accident in which they figured Wednesday afternoon 3 1/2 miles south of Halsey on the Pacific highway. Hofflich suffered a broken leg above the knee, a broken wrist, and severe lacerations on the face.

Mrs. Hofflich apparently is less seriously injured, although she is suffering from severe cuts on the face and body. She also had four teeth knocked out. Two young couple in the car with which the Hofflich car collided are said to have believed to have escaped serious injury. The names of these were not learned but it was ascertained that the car in which they were riding was from Eugene.

Both cars were badly damaged. The accident happened, it is understood, when the steam from a passing train obscured the view of Hofflich and he apparently drove directly in front of the other car. The Hofflich car turned over and went into the ditch. Mrs. Hofflich was thrown clear of the car but he had to be taken out through the top after the accident.

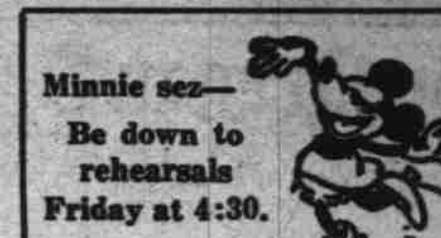
