Garbo, Taylor Elsinore Pair

"Camille" Opens Today at Local Showhouse; Has Praise of Critics

"Camille," with Greta Garbo and Robert Taylor as its sensational co-starring team, brings mutual distinction to Hollywood's two most glamorous stars.

The picture from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios opens today at the Elsinore Theatre, beginning a four day engagement. George Cukor, the director of "Romeo and Juliet," again displays the genius of his power in his superb direction of "Camille."

The notable supporting cast includes Lionel Barrymore, Elizabeth Allen, Jessie Ralph, Henry Daniell, Lenore Ulric and Laura Hope Crews, and there is not a performance among the group that does not deserve praise. The Dumas love classic of "The Lady of the Camellias" provides a peculiar brilliant vehicle for the glamorous Garbo. She gives an unforgettable intensity to the most dramatic role of her brilliant career, Taylor, whose amazing success in a brief two years on the screen has made him an international figure, comes into his own as a dramatic actor of rare talent in the exacting role of Armand.

The story is too well remembered to require description, but the glory of Paris in the period of Dumas is recreated with magnificent artistry and the dramatic love of Camille and Armand is portrayed with all the power of the original.

Cagney Comes In 'Great Guy'

State Theatre Offers New Film of Popular Star With Mae Clarke

Described as typical "Cagney Entertainment" and affording the popular redheaded star an entirely new background for his fast-moving adventures, "Great Guy" opens at the State theatre today as James Cagney's first Grand National picture.

Drummond Sequel Comes to Capitol

All-English Born Cast in Mystery Film; Milland Has Leading Role

A brilliant cast of English-born players appears in the fast-moving English detective story, "Bulldog Drummond Escapes," latest in the popular series of mystery films, which begins today at the Capitol theatre.

Heading the cast as Capt. Hugh Drummond, master sleuth and soldier-of-fortune, is Ray Milland, the handsome young Englishman who climbed to popularity after his appearance in "The Big Broadcast of 1937." Milland was born in Wales and spent most of his life in the bright spots of London and continental Europe. He is a former army officer, an excellent shot and in every way the personification of the famous McNeillie and Fairlie character who has charmed readers, theater-goers and movie audiences for years.

Appearing with him as Inspector Nielson of Scotland Yard, his friend and rival, is Sir Guy Standing, London born and bred, and member of a prominent English theatrical family.

The girl in the story, pretty Heather Angel, whom Milland rescues from a band of counterfeiters and murderers, is, like Milland, from Wales, as is E. R. Cline, who has an important role in the film.

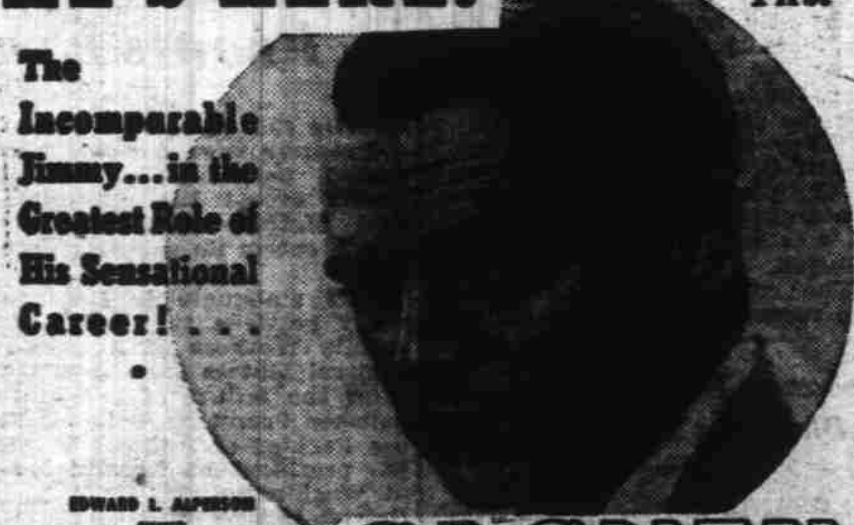
