# New Interest Develops in Northwest Prunes as Strike Ends

Hungry Auto Strikers Get Food

**Being Filled January Shipments Totaled** 728 Carloads, With

**Back Orders** 

**39 in Oregon** 

Northwestern dried prune packers are working near top pace in order to fill orders booked during the waterfront strike. Some of the orders are of three months standing, having been specified that shipments were to be made via water. New interest has developed since the settlement of the strike, and recent inquiries

have resulted in additional sales. There has been some disappointment in that foreign markets are not showing the interest anticipated as soon as shipping was resumed. Some packers are of the opinion, however, that this outlet will be forthcoming within the near future. Government orders recently purchased for relief purposes are filled, permitting the present packs to be used in filling commercial orders.

#### Prices Unchanged

Prices during the past week have made no change, but packers report a stronger tone to the market and, with other commodities advancing in price, anticipate larger returns for dried prunes.

Present quotations, packed in 25-pound boxes, F. O. B. Portland docks, are as follows: 30-40s 614-6 1/2 c; 40-50s 4 1/2 -4 % c; 50-60s 4-4 14 c: 60-70s 4c: 70-80s 3-3 % c. Prunes packed in sacks are generally quoted 1/4 c per pound less.

Growers having unsold prunes report little inquiry at the present time. The few sales made by them to packers were around the following prices: 45-50s 3c; 50-55s 2%c: and 55-60s 2%c per pound, f.o.b. loading stations.

Shipments of dried prunes during the month of January totaled 728 carloads, originating as follows: California 682, Oregon 39, and Washington 7.




