

Timely Rains in Southwest Areas Brings Over Wheat Prices

Six Cent Drop Seen in Week

Falls 3 1/2 Cents Overnight in Rapid Drop From Top Season Mark

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Wheat prices fell today because of timely moisture relief for dry districts southwest. The Chicago market was 6 cents below the season's high.

An overnight maximum fall of 3 1/2 cents a bushel was witnessed here, with lowest prices of the day registered at the last. The drop of 6 cents from the season's top price record has been all in the present week.

At the close, Chicago wheat futures were 3 1/2-3 3/4 cents under yesterday's finish. May 132 1/2-3/4, July 115 1/4-3/4, Sept. 112 1/2-3/4, corn 1 1/4-1 1/2 down, May 106 1/4-3/4, July 102 1/4-3/4, Sept. 95 3/4, oats 1 1/4-1 1/2 off, May 48 3/4-1/2, and rye showing 1 1/4-3/4 loss, May 109-109 1/4. In provisions, the outcome was unchanged to 12 cents lower.

Corn, oats and rye were all depressed by the action of wheat. Provisions gave way with grains.

Steel and Copper Up 1 to 3 Points

But Profit Selling Throws Other Issues Off of Balance in Mart

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Leading steel and copper tipped the stock market scales for gains of 1 to 3 points today, but many other issues were thrown off balance by profit-selling.

Anacosta was one of the most active tapers at 64 1/2, but Kennecott ended off a shade at 64 1/2. Bethlehem Steel shot up to 94 1/2 and U. S. Steel ended at 114 1/4.

The total volume of transfers was the best for a two-hour amounting in five weeks, amounting to 1,484,730 shares compared with 1,371,060 last Saturday.

Westinghouse yielded 2 1/2 at 154. Among lesser losers were General Electric at 60 1/2, General Motors 66 1/2, Chrysler 130 1/4, Western Union 74, and Goodyear 39 1/4.

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Water Now Used To Inflate Tires

Farm Tractors Prevented From Bouncing Through This Novel Method

Pneumatic tires are now being partially filled with water to improve their grip on roads, reports W. H. Zosel, manager of Goodrich Silverton store, 198 South Commercial street.

Not the tires you use on your automobile, of course, nor those on your truck, if you own one.

But in farm tractor tires, those huge rubber casings which roll over the fields, pulling plow or harrow doing the work horses once did, according to engineers of the B. F. Goodrich company, Akron, Ohio.

After several years of experiment with tires on farm tractors and other farm implements, one of the greatest problems was to keep the tires from bouncing around, and thus losing their traction, while they were pulling heavy equipment over rough, uneven ground.

Other Means Tried

Metal weights were in many cases attached to the wheels to weigh them down, but these were an additional expense to the tractor operator. Putting them on and taking them off was a constant inconvenience.

So the Goodrich engineers, after more than a year's experiments, now recommend the use of water in farm tractor tires.

The water provides normal cushioning without rebound or bouncing of the tractors or other equipment. They give the tractor greater tractive ability and better riding qualities.

To facilitate putting the water into the tires, the Goodrich engineers have developed a simple, inexpensive "adapter," one end of which is fitted to a garden hose and the other to the tire valve.
