Twenty eight hundred pounds of dried and canned fruits were shipped from Salem this week by the Marion county chapter of the Red Cross for the flood disaster relief concentration warehouse at St. Louis, Mo.

The shipment, including 25 cases each of beans and prunes donated by the Hillman Packing company and 600 pounds of dried prunes given by Miss Mary Reynolds, is the only such relief donations made here. The Southern Pacific railway is carrying the relief shipment east free of charge.
